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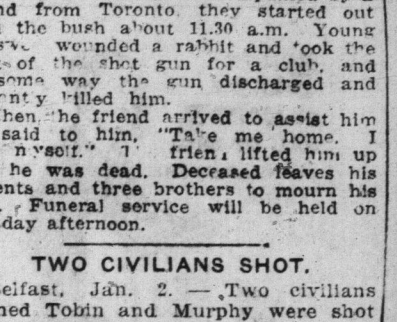
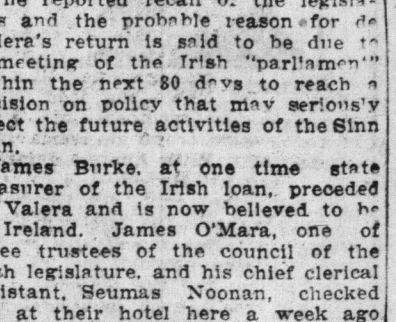
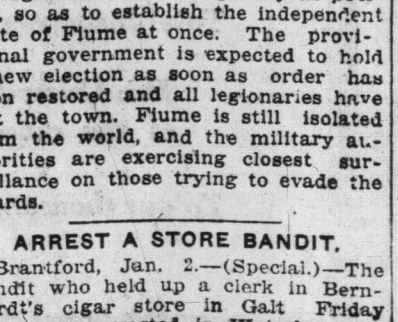

## WORLD BULLETINS DRAW ELECTION NIGHT CROWDS

"No! I don't want to go to the theatre. This is the best show in town tonight. This was the remark made by a young lady to her gentleman escort on Saturday night as they stood outside The World building watching the cartoons, bulletins and slides which were flashed upon the screen. The screen in question was draped across the front of the building opposite and the slides were projected from the second floor of the World office.

Altho the weather was rather nasty with a dismal drizzling rain, the crowds were so dense that the police had to station officers at Yonge street, and Bay street, to divert traffic. The speakers after election information, seemed

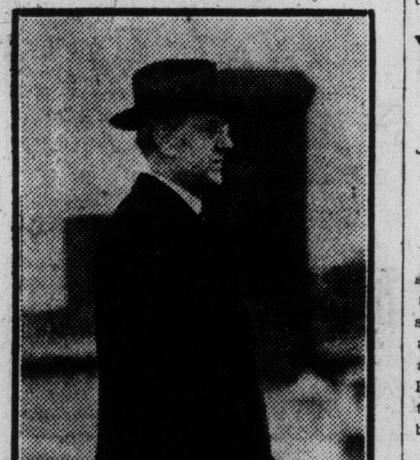

The speaker stated that industry during the past two centuries has been too greatly concerned with the development of natural resources, oblivious of the truth that a certain standard of human life was essentially fostered by the conditions under which man labored.

During the month of December, the Children's Aid Society of Toronto, received and investigated 92 cases, and made 155 calls concerning 155 children.

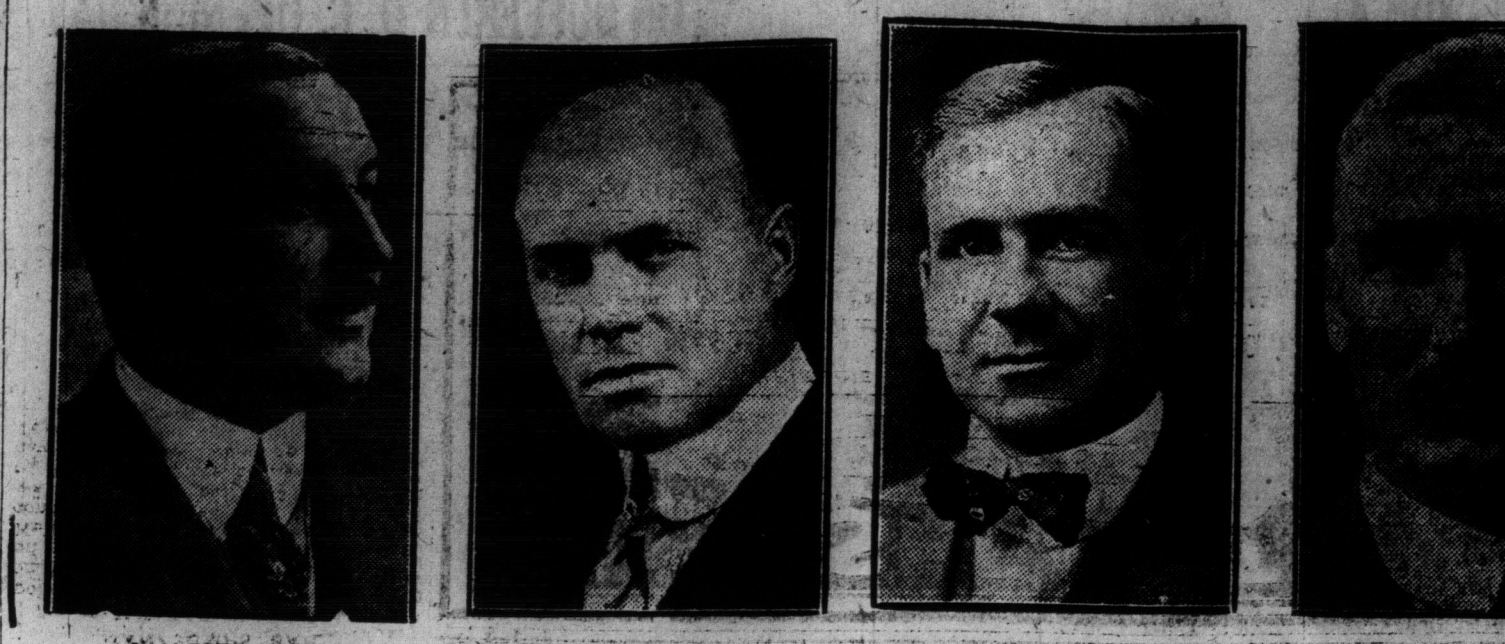
Sixteen children were admitted to shelter and 10 discharged. Including those in residence, on December 31st the total number cared for during the month was 51.

## VETERAN SUICIDES AT SCARBORO BLUFFS

**Suffered From Shell Shock and Was Under Treatment at London Hospital.**

Lying in mud about a foot and a half deep, with little streamlets of icy snow water trickling down upon his face, the body of Francis S. McMahon, a shell-shocked war veteran, whose home is at 435 Sherbourne street, was found late Saturday night under an overhanging clay precipice on the side of the Scarboro bluffs. McMahon, who was undergoing treatment at the London Military Hospital, was allowed to come home for New Year's Day, but disappeared from his home on Friday night.

Besides the body was found a note addressed to his brother, Henry Robert McMahon, 938 De courcourt road. It read as follows: "My time has come. I must end it all. It is better for the world that I should die."

Mr. McMahon, brother of the deceased, stated to The World last night that on Friday afternoon Francis was dressed in his best clothes with the intention of going for a walk with his father. The father had occasion to go upstairs and when he returned his son had disappeared.

Mr. McMahon immediately notified the city police of his son's being missing, requesting that they try to locate him. He feared that something might happen to him. It was not, however, until late Saturday night that the body was found.

County Constable Davidson was notified and went to the scene, but because of the position of the body under the overhanging clay cliff that might be dislodged at any minute, it was not possible to get to the body until late Saturday night. The county constable got into communication with Henry McMahon, brother who advised that the body be left in the place in which it was found.

**The Body Recovered.**

Yesterday morning a party of fourteen men, including County Constable Davidson, Henry McMahon, Superintendent of Transportation Johnston, of the D.S.C.R., secured the body. In order to do so they had to dig half a rubber boot and worked in continual danger as it was not known at what minute the cliff above would give way and bury them alive.

The body proved to be unrecognizable, and was taken to the undertaker's parlor of 84 Dovercourt road in 1915, was manager of the New York Tailors on Yonge street. He was recruited to Canada a victim of shell shock and admitted to the London Military Hospital where he has been receiving treatment ever since.

## NEWSBOY'S STORY WILL BE HEARD

**When John Doughty's Trial on Conspiracy Charge Is Resumed Today.**

"I do not investigate the statements made by the boy because I do not think that after such a long period of time that he would remember the exact hour exactly, or even the day."

The boy and his father, however, will give evidence this morning, and will, in all likelihood, be the only witnesses to appear.
