



IMMORALITY IN FAR NORTH

Winnipeg, June 9 .- The time of the eneral Assembly today was taken up ith a discussion of social and moral reorm and church union. The feature of form and church union. To one unfamiliar with the land and its old literature the sturdy spirit of independence and intense love of country that characterize the Icelanders may seem strange indeed, for the island, whose area is about four-fifths that of the State of New York, is rendered to a great extent uninhabitable by the devastation wrought by ancient and recent lava flows, and the rigor of the climate. The soil produces no vegetables save the coarsest, no fruit trees, no grain; is without anything that can be properly called a forest; the grass, owing to the shortness of the summer, while succulent, only attains a short growth—indeed, the possibilities for not merely generous independence, but even reasonable comfort, are scant in that Northern land. The population twenty years ago, at the time of my visit, ranged between sixty and seventy thousand. I


