

Paris, Oct. 26 The military cross, with commendation in army orders, has been conferred on a long list of heroic women who, as nurses, stayed at their posts at Compiegne, Senlis and Villers-Cotterets, some during the German occupation and all under fire. Among them are two women belonging to the French aristocracy. Baroness Fain and Countes Pillet Will.

The baroness was at Chateau Compiegne when it was occupied by the Germans, and, in the words of an army order, 'faced difficulties of every kind with calmness, dignity and firmness, ready for all eventualities and constantive neocouraging the staff." The Countess Pillet-Will returned to Complegne after accompanying British wounded soldiers to Rouen, to find the Germans in occupation, but resumed her duties the moment they left, in spite of the continuous heavy bombardment.

Madame Carrel-Billard devoted herself unsparingly to the care of the wounded in an annex outside the Rockefeller Institute. Madame De St. Martin 'ran about the streets at Senlis in peril of her life, looking for a German doctor to attend the wounded."
