GAME PRESERVATION

POPULAR history and historical fiction makes frequent to-do over the apparently savage penalties inflicted on poachers by the landowning classes of Europe during the Middle Ages. Even in later times, down to the present day in fact, there has been criticism, sometimes justified without a doubt, of the surviving condition of strict preservation of private estates. Both in Canada and in the United States one frequently hears half pitying reference to the people of Great Britain, to whom such a large proportion of woodland and moor remaining in the British Isles is closed under almost certain charge of trespass. Now comes the justification of the system from the pages of the New York Times. It records:

"The frequently criticized British land regime has found a friend at last. Ornithologists, who are deeply concerned over the excessive slaughter of European game birds, say that the big estates of Britain serve as the reservations for birds and that the big land owners who shoot the birds during the open seasons are the men who most effectively preserve them during the closed seasons. The richness of British bird life, they say, is therefore indirectly, and perhaps solely, due to the British land regime. 'As soon as these larger landed estates become broken up,' says Percy R. Lowe, British member of the International Committee for the Protection of Wild Birds, 'just so soon will the knell of all kinds of game and wild fowl have sounded, for then indiscriminate shoot-

SMALLER DOSES

"This serum is also used with re-markable effect in smaller doses to in-ject persons that have come in contact with actual cases of the disease for the purpose of preventing the development of the disease in exposed persons. Thus far in an experience of a large number of contacts so inoculated not one per-son has developed the disease. "The protection afforded by this in-oculation lasts only two weeks. If the contact continues to be exposed for a contact continues only two weeks. If the contact continues to be exposed for a longer period than two weeks he should be again inoculated. ANOTHER METHOD

"A method for protection of persons who have not been exposed to the dis-ease has also been developed. This is done by the injection of a scarlet fever vaccine which is injected at bi-weekly intervals for three or four injections. "This method of protection has proved to be of considerable value. proved to be of considerable value. About 90 to 95 per cent of persons so inoculated become immune to scarlet fever. This method is of particular value in younger children from one to ten years of age. Older persons so in-oculated some times show a little in-disposition for 12 to 24 hours. "It is therefore advisable that older children and adults desiring this pro-tection first be tested to determine whether or not they are already im-mune. This can be readily done and the result known within 24 hours.

THE TEST

"This test is known as the Dick test. Persons who are not immune as indi-cated by a positive Dick test should be immunized. This test and the various inoculations can be performed by the family physician or at the Health Centre
