London, Feb. 19—The first by-election necessitated by the recent changes in the cabinet resulted in the defeat today of C. F. G. Masterman, in the southwest division of Bethnal Green, by the narrow margin of twenty-four votes. The Unionist candidate, Major Sir M. Wilson, was elected, receiving 2,828 to 2,804 polled by Masterman. The Socialist, J. Scurr, polled 316 votes.

Mr. Masterman, in explaining the government's defeat, said that it was due to misrepresentation of the Insurance act.
