**FEDERAL GOVERNMENT OF UNITED STATES TO GRAPPLE WITH OUT-OF-WORK PROBLEM**

Washington, Feb. 19.—The country will soon have exact information as to the number of unemployed men in the United States. Announcement is made by President Wilson's recently appointed industrial commission, that it will immediately undertake an investigation into conditions of this character, notably in New York city, where it has been estimated that 850,000 men are now out of work.

This extraordinary investigation is to be taken for the purpose not only of ascertaining the facts, but also with a view to recommending federal legislation, especially a measure establishing a federal bureau to serve as a clearing house of public and private employment agencies and to direct the movements of "industrial workers." This is a brand new departure in federal activity, and un-

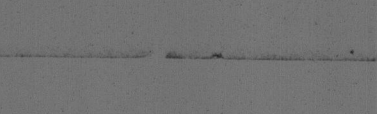

There was a large gathering of men in the school room of the Mission Church last evening to discuss parochial matters as well as to enjoy themselves socially.

Stefansson, leader of the Canadian Arctic expedition, gives further details upon the disappearance of the Karluk. Though far from sanguine, that the Karluk will be saved, he has little doubt about the ultimate safety of those on board, but whether any of the material aboard the Karluk can be saved depends upon its distance from shore and the roughness of the ice."

Stefansson has made new plans for the exploration of the Delta, of the Mackenzie River and the region lying west of Hank and Prince Rupert, in the winter of 1913.

MOST CRITICAL PERIOD IN THE HISTORY OF CHURCH OF ENGLAND

(Continued from page 1) In protesting against the enactments of the Welsh church bill interfering with the constitution of the convocation of Canterbury, the Archbishop of Canterbury explained that the protest previously made, was against the bill as a whole, this one being aimed at the particular provision whereby bishops and the clergy of the Church of Wales would cease to be members of the convocation.

The Bishop of Oxford characterized these proposals in the bill which were made without the consent of the convocation, as a serious violation of spiritual liberty.

The Bishop of Hereford, one of the three bishops supporting the government, dissociated himself from the resolution declaring that parliament had the right to legislate according to the will of the electors. He denied that there was unwarranted interference on the part of the state. This statement was made before joining of the lower house.

As a joint meeting, a resolution in the sense of the Archbishop of Canterbury's remarks, was adopted nem con. Resolution of Viscount Halifax

London, Feb. 20—The Kikuyu controversy was considered at a crowded meeting of the English Church Union last night at Westminster. Viscount Halifax, who presided, submitted a resolution re-affirming that no one was a lawful bishop or priest, except by episcopal consecration.

It was to be feared that the proposals made at Kikuyu would not tend to the establishment of an ideal native church, built on the rock of a Catholic faith, but to a sect undominational in its principles, and that the scheme for federation was one which it would be impossible for members of the church to accept.

Lord Shaftesbury thought the movement was a revival of the attempt of the seventeenth century Puritans to capture the church, and under the guise of Christian charity to break the barriers constituting the church. The resolution was unanimously passed.

Many Support Bishop of Zanzibar The Montreal Herald's London correspondent cables: "The Montreal Herald's London correspondent cables: The Upper House of Convocation at Canterbury, England, in view of the Kikuyu incident, has expressed grave anxiety as to the future of the Church of England, in view of the Kikuyu incident."

This action indicates that the Bishop of Zanzibar has a strong body of supporters and much increases the difficulty of settlement and the possibility of a schism.

What Rev. Dr. Symonds said here. Rev. Dr. Symonds, in his address this week before the Canadian Club of St. John, referred to the Kikuyu incident as one of great significance in relation to the breaking down of some of the barriers that divide the Christian church, and observed that it affected not only the Church of England but was of deep interest to the members of all churches. It might even, he declared, mark the beginning of a new era in religious history.



**TORIES PLANNING A GERRYMANDER**

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—The personnel of the committee named by Premier Borden in the house this afternoon to work on the details of the redistribution bill makes it very evident that the intention of the government is to put through a gerrymander, if it is at all possible to do so.

The Conservative majority on the committee includes Hon. Messrs. Rogers, Pelletier and Reid, the three men in the government whose chief recommendations for "sistemanship" are their knowledge of the arts of practical politics. The appointment of these three ministers to the committee makes it apparent that the dice will be loaded against anything like fair play or justice to the Liberals from the start.

In moving the second reading of the redistribution bill, Premier Borden said he adhered to the view that seven was a better number than nine, as a select committee to work out the details of the bill, but as the opposition appeared to attach considerable importance to this point, he would move that the bill be referred to a special committee of nine composed of Messrs. Beland, Bennett, of Calgary; Buchanan, MacDonald, Fairde, Pelletier, Reid, of Grenville; Rhodes and Rogers, four Liberals and five Conservatives.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier thanked the Premier for his courteous yielding to his wishes in regard to the number composing the committee. While he agreed that the principle of a small committee was a good one, Sir Wilfrid thought the different groups of provinces should all be represented, as would be the case in a committee of nine.

**LABOR DELEGATION HAS MANY REQUESTS**

The Trades and Labor Council met last evening in the Oddfellows' hall, with President James L. Sugrue in the chair and important questions affecting the labor organizations throughout the province were discussed by the large gathering. The choice of the Trades and Labor convention in the selection of James L. Sugrue as Labor candidate for commissioner was endorsed by the unanimous vote of the meeting.

A committee was chosen to wait on Premier Fleming and members of the legislature this morning for the purpose of bringing to the consideration of the government the following questions discussed at the meeting last night:

The workmen's compensation act, the factory act, the fair wage clause, the extension of the provisions of the bureau of labor act, and provisions for the establishment of free employment bureaus in the centres of industry throughout the province; the appointment of a fair wage officer to enforce the provincial fair wage clause; the provision of free school books up to and including the eighth grade; the abolition of the \$100 deposit required of candidates for the provincial legislature, and the substitution of the requirement that each candidate must secure a list of names of fifty voters; the revision of the provincial voters list and the use of the dominion style instead; the extension of the hours of polling and the keeping of the polls open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m.; the provision of a widow's pension act.

The bureau of labor act has been on the statute book since 1904, the labor men say, and it has never been enforced and they desire that it be made effective and that its scope be extended.

It was also decided that a trades and labor representative should be sent to Fredericton to follow the proceedings of the legislature during the session.

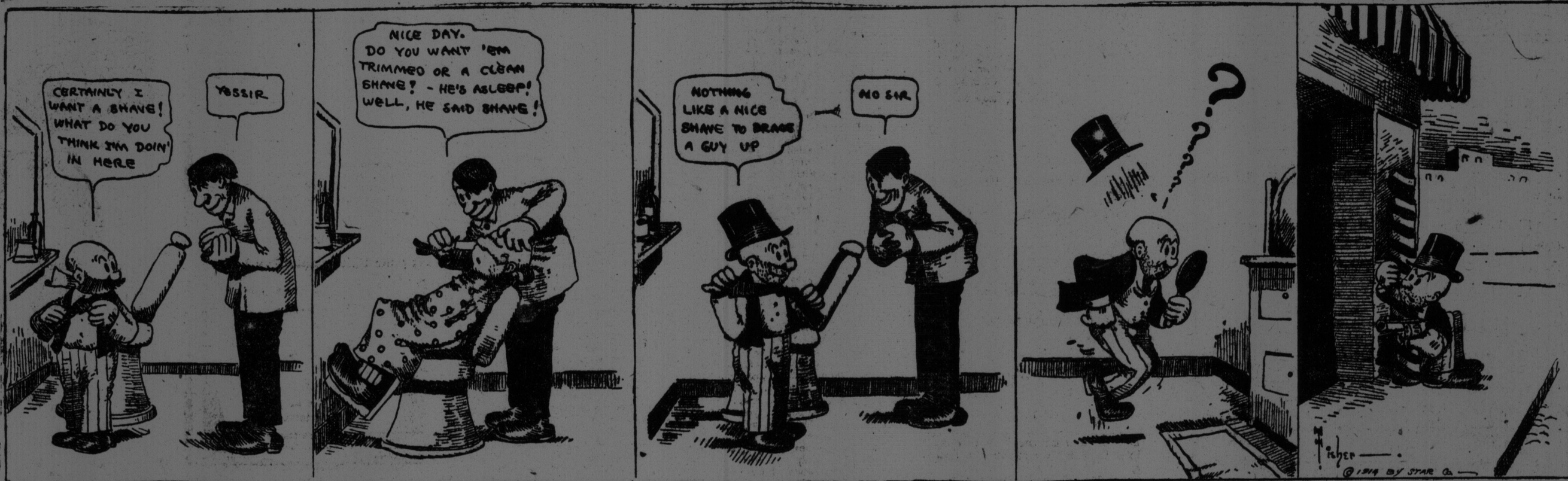

The sons are—Chas. R., of Esmont, Ohio; Eddy, of Danvers, Mass.; and Reuben of Bingham, Me. The daughters are—Elizabeth M., of Japan; Mrs. Jgs. Morse, Mrs. Arthur Davidson, in Washington, D. C.; Mrs. P. Alexander, of San Jose, Cal.; and Mrs. J. Percy Cruikshank, of this city. His wife, formerly Miss Anna Crockett, of this city, died about six years ago. The funeral will take place at Cedar Hill on arrival of the Boston train at Fairville tomorrow.

**NO TRACE YET OF THE SCOUNDREL WHO SENT IN FALSE ALARMS**

The members of the fire department were in no congenial frame of mind today when they were asked to be responsible for the four false alarms sounded last night, causing them useless runs to Pitt street, North West and twice to Bond street. Fire Chief Blake said this morning that he had been unable as yet to find any trace to one or ones of the scoundrels. He failed to see, if it were possible, for a joke, just where the fun came in. It is believed that whoever wished to give a demonstration of his fool wit by sounding the alarm was in a sleigh and drove from box box. Chief Blake held up two young fellows in a sleigh near the corner of Garden street and City Road and made some enquiries concerning their actions. They were driving and told him where they had been, giving their names. It is impossible to discredit their story and they were allowed to drive on.

More than one citizen today said that this foolish practice of sending in false alarms to the department was becoming too great a nuisance and it was time that stringent action was taken. One said that the promise of a reward by the city council for the apprehension of the brazen creature or for information leading to his arrest might be effective.

**IS HERE FROM OTTAWA ON FORT HOWE PARK MISSION**

Colonel Rogers, of the militia department, Ottawa, arrived in St. John today to look into the situation from the standpoint of that department in relation to the matter of converting Fort Howe into a park. Hon. Mr. Hazen wrote Rev. Dr. Raymond that Colonel Rogers would be sent down by the minister of militia, and he is now here. The militia department would, of course, wish to keep control of Fort Howe, but there is no reason why it should not be converted into a park. Rev. Dr. Raymond called on Colonel Rogers this afternoon, and that officer will also see the mayor and others, and get all the information necessary in connection with the whole matter.

**FISH TELLS HIS STORY ON STAND**

He told the story of his arrest and said he happened to be in Waterloo street when Policeman McNamee was assisting to quiet a man who was very much under the influence of liquor and was being taken home by a friend. He said the man was creating quite a disturbance and the policeman was asking one of the crowd to telephone for the patrol wagon. Fish said that he spoke to McNamee and told him that if he was in that condition McNamee would have immediately placed him under arrest. The prisoner also referred to what McNamee had told the court about him falling all over himself when he was brought to the station. Fish said that he would like to call upon Sergeant Hastings.

The sergeant was accordingly called to the stand and was asked by the prisoner if he (Fish) were not as straight as the policeman when they came into the station. The witness told him that he was fairly straight but was very drunk.
