Italy Third Power To
Ratify German Treaty

Some Formalities Yet But Enough Have Acted To Make Pact Effective—Austrian Treaty Also Ratified

Paris, Oct. 7.—(Havas Agency)—King Victor Emmanuel of Italy yesterday signed a royal decree ratifying the German and Austrian treaties, according to a Milan despatch to the Eclair.

This virtually completes the steps necessary for putting into effect the pact between Germany and the Allied powers, which was signed at Versailles on June 28 and which stipulated it would become operative when ratified by three of the great powers. The British parliament has already ratified the treaty and the document now awaits only the signature of King George before becoming effective in Great Britain.

Cincinnati today greeted her returning victorious baseball team while every thing was in readiness for a resumption of the world's series at Redland Field this afternoon.

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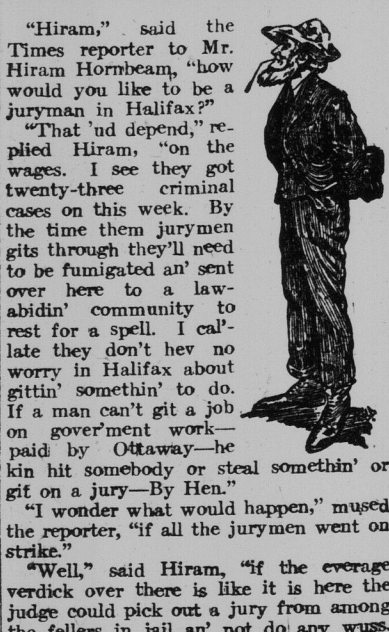

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Important Railroad Centre Seized By Nationalist Leader, Who Has Half Million Troops—Massacres Following Anarchy are Feared

Paris, Oct. 7.—Turkish nationalist troops, said to number upwards of 800,000, commanded by Mustapha Kemal, seem to have precipitated in Asia Minor on a major scale a crisis similar to that which arose in Dalmatia when Captain Gabriele D'Annunzio seized the City of Fiume.

There is a feeling that the situation in Asia Minor has gone beyond the control of the Turkish government, and that the Allied powers are helpless at present to do anything to bring military pressure to bear and afford any appreciable relief.

Konieh, an important railroad centre, is in the hands of the Turkish nationalist troops. Its capture appears to indicate that Mustapha Kemal is in control of the region stretching from Konieh on the southwest to Erzerum, the principal city of Turkish Armenia, a distance of about 425 miles.

Paris, Oct. 7.—General Aliriza Pasha, new Turkish grand vizier, has opened negotiations with Mustapha Kemal, Turkish nationalist leader, whose troops recently took possession of the strategic city of Konieh according to a despatch in the hands of the Turkish nationalist press.

According to the intrinsigant, the resignation of the cabinet of Damad Ferid Pasha was the result of an ultimatum from General Mustapha Kemal who has set up a new government at Erzerum and has issued a call for elections to a new national parliament.

The other bill has to do with the same matter. It affects the exchequer court and is designed to give the government wider powers in dealing with receiverships such as that of the Grand Trunk.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—Constable Emile Legault, charged with the murder of J. J. Clark, a returned soldier, was yesterday freed by a jury in the court of king's bench, Mr. Justice Desjardins presiding.

ELECTIONS NOVEMBER 3 IN NEWFOUNDLAND

St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 7.—The Newfoundland legislature was dissolved today and a general election ordered for Nov. 3. As it had been announced some time ago that this action was contemplated, a vigorous political campaign has been in progress for several weeks.

The present government, headed by Sir Michael Stollin as premier, is opposed by a party headed by Hon. Richard Squires, who was attorney-general in the cabinet of Premier Morris, immediately preceding the government now in power.

FORMER PREMIER OF AUSTRALIA DEAD

Sydney, N. S. W., Oct. 7.—Alfred Deakin, former premier of Australia, died today.

Mr. Deakin was prime minister of Australia from 1908 to 1909 with the exception of a short period when the Labor party was in power in the Australian federal parliament in 1904.

Mr. Deakin again assumed control of the federal government in June, 1909, at the head of a coalition of free traders, protectionists and anti-Socialists formed against the Labor party.

He was completely defeated in the general elections in April, 1910, and resigned as premier.

PRINCE ON SHOOTING TRIP; TO WINNIPEG AT END OF WEEK

Regina, Sask., Oct. 7.—After an inspection of the military and mounted police barracks yesterday morning, the Prince of Wales left for Edenwold, from which point he will embark on a shooting trip over the Qu'Appelle Lakes, until Thursday night. This expedition is in the nature of relaxation, and there will be no functions of any kind during the next few days.

The royal party will reach Portage La Prairie and Brandon on Friday for short visits to the Manitoba cities and will then proceed to Winnipeg for a four day stay there.

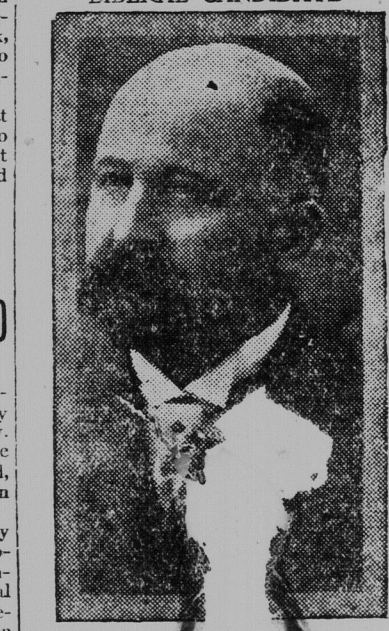
BURIED TODAY.

Gleason Saddens
Chicago, Oct. 7.—Manager Gleason of the White Sox, before leaving for Cincinnati for the sixth game of the world's series with the Reds, said he was "sick at heart" over the way his men had played the game.

"I don't know what the matter," said Gleason, "but I do know that something is wrong with my team. The team I had fighting in August for the pennant would have trimmed the Reds without a struggle. The bullpen I have now could not beat a high school team. We hit something over 280 for the season in the American League. I am sure we could have the best hitting any club ever had in the history of baseball. The way those 280 hitters acted against Ellis, they couldn't make a place on a high school team."

"I am convinced that I have the best ball club that ever was put together. I certainly have been disappointed in it in this series. I think that the boys who were supposed to be the best have not been. There is only one chance they can win now."

"You know it doesn't seem possible that this team that worked so great for me all summer could fall down like this. I told you I am absolutely sick at heart. I thought all of them were my boys. I felt like a school teacher might feel toward his pupils. I loved those boys for the way they fought for me this summer."

Reads Admit Loss of Dvinsk

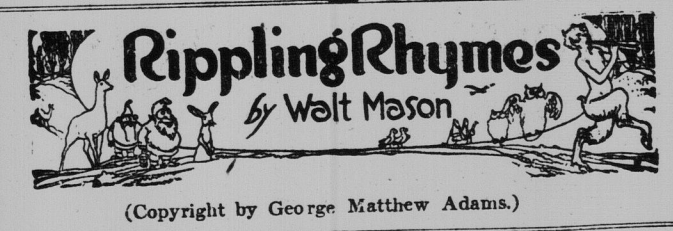

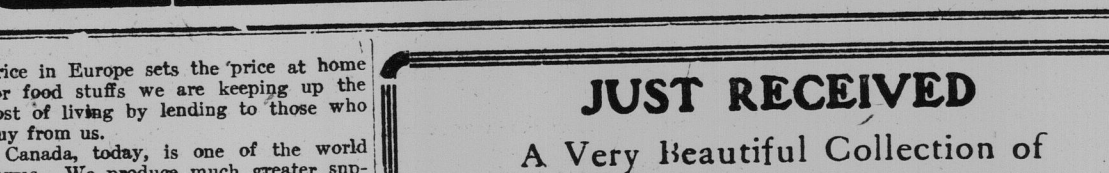

Mail-order houses send most of their packages by parcel post, Mr. Koons said, adding that deliveries had been so prompt that one big house asked for delivery in the service so that the packages would not arrive before invoices out at night after dispatch of the packages during the day.

Organized First Lodge Outside Borders of U. S.

JOAN BEAMISH IS DEAD

Aged Citizen, Long a Member of Postal Staff, and Holder of Imperial Service Medal, Has Passed Away

The news of the death of John Beamish which occurred last evening at his home, 44 Winter street, will be received with regret by a wide circle of friends but particularly by members of the Pythian order by whom he was regarded as the founder of the order in the British Empire. He had been ill for some time but up to the time of his taking sick had attended regularly at the meetings of his old lodge, New Brunswick Lodge, No. 1, in the town of St. John, Canada, largely through his efforts and his far-seeing vision that the bringing of the Order here from the United States would be helpful. The Knights of Pythias were established soon after the close of the American civil war for aid in the healing of the breach between north and south in the states. They grew to large numbers. The order flourished exceedingly and Mr. Beamish and some others here conceived the idea that it could do good work in Canada.

From the little band whom he succeeded in interesting in the idea, and of whom he was the first to be initiated, the membership in the order has increased under the British flag to a million but his home city, St. John will ever be known through his efforts as "the cradle of Pythianism" in the British Empire. He was familiarly known as "Uncle John" to all brother Knights. Not only was he an active figure in local Pythian circles but to the Lodge and at other centres in Canada he made many friends. In fact so well known a figure was he that he was invited to attend the annual convention of the order at St. John, N. S., when the Grand Lodge was in session that "this is the first year we have had a representative from St. John" it was true. He had been at the grand sessions even at times when he should not have gone because of ill health, but so attached was he to the order that he could not keep away.

Mr. Beamish also was deeply interested in the cause of temperance and was active in several temperance organizations in his younger days. He was also a member of the Foresters' order.

For fifty years Mr. Beamish was a member of the postal staff, serving as a letter carrier. As a result of an injury to his foot, he was forced to retire in 1908. Shortly after his retirement, he received from the Home Office in Whitehall, London, the Imperial Service Medal "for faithful service," accompanied by the usual command of presentation from the king.

Mr. Beamish was well known throughout the city and entered the home at an esteem of all who knew him. Sincere sympathy will be extended to his wife and four daughters who survive.

The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon, a private service for the family will be held at the home at one o'clock and the body will be taken to Castle Hall, the Knights of Pythias headquarters, in German street, where the public service will be held. This is the first service of this nature to be held in the hall and this course has been decided upon as a mark of respect to the memory of the man who was responsible for establishing the order here.

BOARD OF TRADE URGES EXTENSION OF BREAKWATER

At the regular meeting of the board of trade last evening a resolution was passed urging the government to proceed with the required breakwater protection of the harbor without delay. The resolution follows:

Whereas, the progress of Canada demands that national ports on Canadian soil should be provided and equipped both for summer and winter use as speedily as possible; and

Whereas, the Government of Canada stands pledged to the development of St. John as a national port along comprehensive and efficient lines; and

Whereas, it is essential to the safety of this harbor that further breakwater protection should be supplied, and it is most desirable that this protection should be afforded before the work of development of the inner harbor has been entered upon; and

Whereas, this board has been assured

by the minister of public works that such breakwater construction would be a charge upon the government of the country and not upon the traffic of this port, and in consequence would not form a part of the plan of harbor commission that is now under consideration; and

Whereas, the further assurance has been given that the establishment of necessary breakwaters here and the development of the harbor would be proceeded with immediately upon the close of the war; therefore

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this board and of the citizens of St. John that the pledges and assurances which have been given with regard to this port should now be fulfilled; and it would, therefore, respectfully urge upon the government of Canada that it take such steps as are necessary to secure the immediate commencement of the required breakwater protection at this port, so that the development of the harbor might be proceeded with without any further delays; and

Further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Right Honourable Sir Robert Borden, Premier of Canada, to the Minister of Public Works and to the federal representatives from this constituency.

In the discussion which followed, Allan Wetmore, Capt. A. J. McLeachy, W. F. Hatheway, J. G. Harrison, R. B. Emerson, W. F. Burditt and F. A. Dykeman took part. All the speakers referred to the necessity of immediate action in this matter and Mr. Dykeman said the resolution should be followed up

by the sending of a delegation to Ottawa to present the matter to the government. The resolution was adopted unanimously.

R. B. Emerson presided at the meeting and R. E. Armstrong, secretary, read a summary of the minutes of fourteen sessions of the council which had been held since the last board meeting. There was a large number of the members of the board present.

REFINERY MEN RETURN TO WORK

Agreement Reached Last Night on Basis of Eight Hour Day and Forty Cents Per Hour—Other Terms

The sugar refinery workers through the intervention of E. M. G. Quirk, representative of the minister of labor, decided last night to accept the terms of the company and to go to work this morning at 7 o'clock. The terms are virtually the same as those originally offered by the company granting an eight-hour day and a minimum wage of forty cents per hour, and providing that the company keep an "open shop." It was stated by representatives of the labor unions last night that the cause of disagreement had centered on the clause on working conditions. In the first terms submitted the company did not provide for an employee's grievance committee but eventually through the intervention of Mr. Quirk, the company agreed to recognize such a committee, when the terms were satisfactory and the men decided by secret ballot to accept them in their entirety and go to work this morning.

The following are the terms agreed to:

1. The working day will consist of eight hours.
2. The minimum wage for common labor will be forty cents per hour.
3. Time and a half will be paid for overtime, Sunday and holiday work.
4. Expert labor in all departments receive a minimum increase of five cents per hour over the rate paid prior to September 30, 1918.
5. The refinery will be conducted on a strictly open-shop basis and no discrimination will be made between union and non-union men.
6. The company will deal only with committees of its own employees in regard to matters of employees' welfare.
7. The right of engagement and discharge will rest entirely with the refinery management and its authorized representatives.

Substitute for clause 7—Atlantic Sugar Refineries, Ltd., will recognize an employee's grievance committee composed of bona fide employees of the company who, after investigating individual cases of complaint among employees, may appeal to the refinery manager for redress and after the hearing, should the individual or individuals in question be not working by reason of being laid off or dismissed, then if no justification is found for such dismissal or laying off, the employee of employees concerned shall be reinstated with full pay for time lost thereby. All complaints shall be investigated within three days of such dismissal or lay-off, the decision of the refinery to be final.

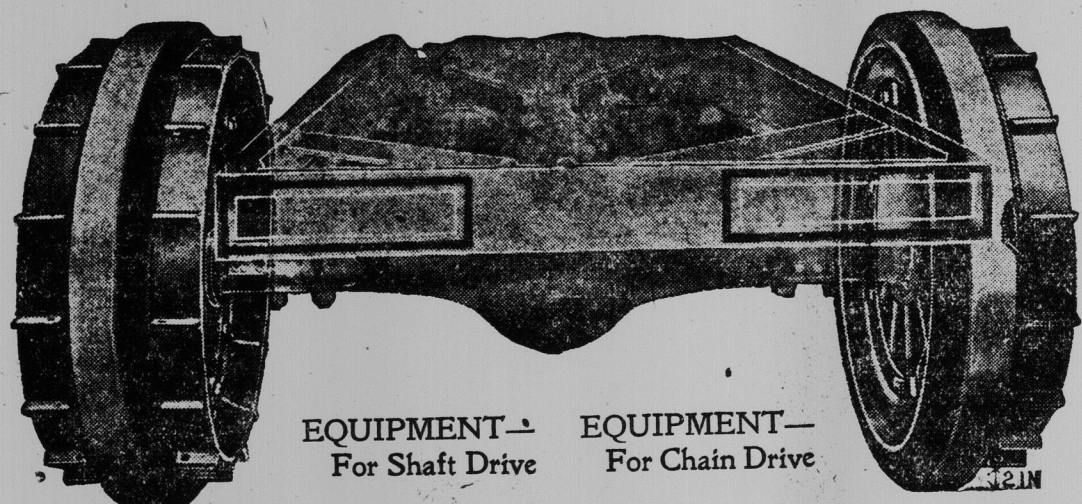

CONVICTION IN THE BRAYLEY CO. CASE

The long drawn-out case against the Brayley Drug Company, charged with sending Wilson's Invalid Port to Bathurst without proper labelling, was finished yesterday in the police court, the defendants being convicted. In consideration of the fact that the defendants had already had one conviction under the liquor act, the magistrate decided to award the maximum penalty and fined them \$100. Chief Inspector Wilson conducted the prosecution and L. A. Conlon appeared for the defendants. Mr. Conlon said that he would appeal the case.

Fred Paddock, charged with possessing liquor illegally, was again called yesterday afternoon but failed to appear. As this was the third time he had been called his deposit of \$200 was forfeited. Chief Inspector Wilson said he wished to have a warrant made out for Paddock's re-arrest.

The case of Charles Paddock, charged with allowing his premises to be used for illegal purposes, was then taken up. Inspectors Kerr and Linton gave evidence corroborating the evidence given by Inspector Merryfield at a previous hearing, telling of how they found the liquor stored in his cellar. Chief Inspector Wilson conducted the prosecution and E. S. Ritchie appeared for the defendant. The case was postponed until Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, the defendant making a deposit of \$80 for his appearance.

DENEKINE AND KOLCHAK ADVANCING STEADILY

Copenhagen, Oct. 6.—General Denekine's troops are within thirty miles of Orel, on the road to Moscow, and the Bolsheviks, who have been opposing are surrendering in great numbers, according to a wireless despatch from the Cossack anti-Bolshevik commander here.

Orel is slightly more than two hundred miles directly south of Moscow. The city has a population of about seventy thousand and is an important railway and commercial centre.

Denekine reports that sections of his forces, detaching themselves from the main body, are raiding the Bolshevik supplies and cutting the enemy's communications.

Another despatch reports that the north Russian army has captured the railway between Petrograd and Pihov, cutting off the communications of Petrograd to the southwest.

Omsk, September 28.—The advance of the Siberian armies under Admiral Kolchak, since the resumption of the offensive on September 1, has been carried out with a few reversals to a distance averaging seventy-five miles along the whole front. The advance of several portions of the line has been made against serious resistance, and counter attacks at the Kolchak troops having proved their mettle in this fighting.

JOHN T. HAWKE ADDRESSES THE BOARD OF TRADE

The necessity of advertising the maritime provinces was brought home to the members of the board of trade and the people in general by J. T. Hawke, editor of the Moncton Transcript, in an interesting and well delivered address last evening in the rooms of the board.

The address was delivered with a view to enlisting the support of the board and the citizens of St. John in an appeal to

the department of immigration to have the members of the National Editorial Association of the United States make a tour of the maritime provinces in the same manner in which they toured the west this year.

Mr. Hawke was the representative of the province during the tour through the west and last evening he carried those who listened to him through the series of marvelous sights which was presented to them. In eloquent language he pictured the charm and prospects of the

western areas which had so enthralled the visiting writers, but he pointed out that, with all the wonders of that section of the country, there was yet in the maritime provinces sights which would rival and even exceed some of those which were delineated to the United States newspapermen.

Mayor Hayes, Hon. R. J. Ritchie and others spoke in appreciation of the splendid address delivered by Mr. Hawke and assured him of co-operation in the work which he advocated. The mayor said

that the city of St. John, through its council and other organizations would only be too glad to assist the press to make the visit of these men interesting and profitable and to show them that the maritime provinces is more than just "small but noisy." R. B. Emerson, who presided, also gave him the assurance of the board of trade in this connection. F. B. 

AGAINST FUNERALS ON SUNDAY EXCEPT WHEN ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY

Ferhill Directors' Quarterly Meeting—New Method of Arranging Lots

The quarterly meeting of Ferhill directors was held in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon with the president, Colonel Sturdee, in the chair. The financial statement for the quarter was reviewed and it was found that labor charges had again increased \$1000 compared with the same period last year. The superintendent's report concerning his recent visit to the convention of cemetery officials of Canada in Toronto was received, and in conformity with the latest plan of the cemetery representatives at the convention, Mr. Clayton was authorized to lay out the new section of the graves to be level or fashioned in low rolling mounds. This system is adopted to save path weeding and the hand tramping which is necessary for squarely mounded graves, the low mounds being adaptable to machine work. It is thought that greater care can be given and better result obtained in this way, and if the plan proves successful it may be adopted in other sections of the cemetery. The meeting deprecated the holding of Sunday funerals except in cases of absolute necessity. Many modern cemeteries are ruling against funerals on Sunday.

A specification for individual sailor and soldier headstones, as adopted in other parts of Canada, was approved; the markers to be a horizontal gray granite slab to be set flush with the turf, a blue print of the same was secured by the superintendent while in Toronto. It was decided to purchase a power lawn mower at a cost of between \$500 and \$600. The operation of this machine was observed by one of the directors and the superintendent in cemeteries of Upper Canada and the United States. It is hoped that it will accomplish the work of five hand mowers.

LUSTY ROOSTER NOISY WITNESS

Brought Into Police Court And Makes Quite A Commotion—A Busy Morning

In the police court this morning a case against two lads, charged with breaking and entering and stealing goods from the store of T. Collins & Company, at rear of Bank of Nova Scotia building, Charlotte street, was resumed. Francis Collins, a member of the firm, told of finding the store broken into and goods stolen. He said also that the store had been broken into about seven times during the last six months. The lads were found on the roof of the building together with a quantity of cigarettes valued at about \$18.45.

Sergeant Scott said that in consequence of information received he went to the store with Policemen Dykeman and Linton. Before entering the store he told the policemen to go to the rear of the building. He went to the roof, where he saw the lads, one sitting near the edge of the roof, the other was hanging by his hands over the edge, preparing to drop on the ground. He also told of finding three boxes of cigarettes on the roof. He lifted the lad from over the edge of the roof and handed both boys to the policemen, who were waiting at the skylight, and they took them to the central police station. Policeman Dykeman gave corroborative evidence and added that one of the lads made a break for liberty, but was soon caught again. This case was again postponed for further hearing.

The magistrate said that if the lads had been arrested when they were seen in the street they would not be before the court on such a serious charge. He continued by saying: "Last night at 10:55 I saw girls, marching in battalion order," and when they came to a store, "right wheel," they marched up to a window, "hull" looked in, at the same time stopping pedestrians who wished to get by." He said the girls and boys should have kept off the streets at night, and there would not be so much crime.

Fred Keefe was charged with breaking and entering, and stealing hens from George L. Craig, Brussels street. The complainant told of missing from ten to a hen and a rooster from his henhouse on October 2. To prove property, a rooster, which had been lodged in jail, was ordered into court for identification. Policeman Linton, who made the arrest, brought the bird in and it created quite a commotion, and even the stern command, "order," given by the court sergeant, did not lessen its shrillness for liberty. The bird was identified as being similar to the missing one. Policeman Linton was then put on the stand and as his charge, now becoming accustomed to him, would not be kept quiet by anyone else, the policeman was compelled to give evidence while holding the bird. He said that on Monday night, September 29, while passing the Star Cafe he heard the noise of a hen or rooster, and on investigation found the accused with the rooster under his arm. He arrested him and took him to the police station.

Han Sun, proprietor of the Star Cafe, said that the accused entered and wanted \$100 to buy the bird. The case was postponed for a further hearing.

Inspector Merryfield, while walking along Chubb's street, accompanied by his wife last night, noticed a man walking along suspiciously. The inspector accosted him and told the man to move on, but noticing an enlarged hip, he slapped his hand on it and produced a bottle. The man was brought to the police station by the inspector. As a result, William Pierce, Moss Glen was charged with being drunk and having liquor in his possession. He pleaded guilty and said he got the liquor on the train paying for it. A fine of \$8 or two months in jail was imposed for being drunk, and \$200 or six months for having liquor in his possession illegally.

JOHN CANTY FOUND DEAD IN WEST END

John Canty, about sixty-five years of age, was found dead this morning at 6 o'clock on Wellington wharf, West St. John by Alice Nixon. Mr. Canty was employed as watchman on the dredge Beacon Bar, and was a native of Yarmouth, N. S. Dr. F. L. Kennedy, coroner, viewed the body. Mr. Canty had been a patient of Dr. Kennedy's for some time, being afflicted with heart disease. No inquest was necessary and the body was moved to Brennan's undertaking parlors to be prepared for burial. It will be taken to Yarmouth tomorrow for interment. Mr. Canty leaves two sons, Richard B. Canty of Britain street and Isaac L. Canty of 100 Princess street. A large circle of friends extend sympathy to the bereaved ones.

MUNICIPAL POLITICS IN LANCASTER STIRRING

The political pot over Lancaster is still boiling over the councillors' election which is to be held in the near future. Besides Wadden Wm. Golding and Councillor John O'Brien, the present members, C. H. Belyea is offered as the third man on the ticket.

Friends of Dr. M. Queen are anxious that he should run, saying that his business experience and the fact that he is a large property holder, would win him much support. Richmond H. Cushing, formerly city engineer, and a resident of Lancaster, is likely to be a fourth man for Mr. Queen. Yesterday it was said the latter had not definitely decided to come out for election.

J. J. Dwyer of Milford has been generally mentioned as a possible candidate, but it is reported that he has decided not to seek election this year.

Glendon H. Allan and Murray Campbell are actively on the job these days and are regarded as definitely in the race.

Meanwhile it looks as though Lancaster was bestirring itself for a merry election.
