The times in the above table are to be added to or subtracted from the time of high water at Halifax, according to the directions there given. Example—To find the time of high water at Cape Sable, May 4, 1831. The time of high water at Halifax, May 4, by the calendar is 0 hours 19 minutes; to this add 30 minutes (time set against Cape Sable in the table) and you have the time of high water at Cape Sable, 0 hours 49 minutes.

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ECLIPSES in 1831.

There will be four Eclipses in the year 1831, in the following order :
The first will be of the Sun, February 12th.

Beginning 0h 21m.
Ecliptic Conjunction 0h. 43½ m.
End 3h. 9m.
Digits eclipsed 1½ on the Sun's lower Limb.

As the Sun's apparent Diameter will exceed that of the Moon more than 45 seconds, it will appear like a ring, extending about two thirds the distance round the moon. In the greater part of the American States the Eclipse will be annular.

The second will be of the Moon, February 26th at 35 minutes after 12, in the afternoon, invisible.

The third will be of the Sun, August 7th, at 5h 48m afternoon, invisible on account of the Moon's southern Latitude.—Moon's Lat. 39½° S.

The Fourth will be of the Moon, August 23d. in the morning ; the beginning will be visible if the Air is clear.

Digits eclipsed, 5° 48' on the moon's northern Limb.

As there are many who do not well understand the terms used in describing Eclipses, it may be observed that an Eclipse of the Sun is seen over a small part of the Earth only, at any particular point of absolute Time, and that all the Eclipses which are visible to any part of the Earth are noted in Almanacs ; thus the Eclipse of the 7th August which will be invisible here, will be a total Eclipse in the South Sea, near the Society Islands. The Moon's Latitude North, or South, signifies that the Moon is at that time higher or lower when south than the Sun ; and as the Moon's parallax always makes it appear nearly a degree lower than its true place in the heavens no Eclipse of the Sun can be visible at Halifax, if the Moon has considerable southern latitude.

The Ecliptic Conjunction signifies the time at which a straight line from the centre of the Sun to the centre of the Earth would pass over the centre of the Moon. Consequently in that part of the Earth where the middle of the Eclipse (or time when the centres of the Sun and Moon approach the nearest to each other) falls exactly at noon, the middle of the Eclipse must be at the time of the Ecliptic Conjunction ; but in all places west of that point it must be before, and in all places east of it after it.

The Time of high water being given but once in 24 hours, it should be observed that it is the afternoon Tide at the Time of New Moon and the morning tide at the time of full moon, the word "moon" is once marked to explain this.

☞ Venus will be an Evening star to the 8th of October ; from that time to the end of the year a morning star.

☞ The Sun's Declination is for Noon at Greenwich.

New Discovery in the Preparation of Flax.—A French paper states, that an inhabitant of Chateau Thierry has discovered a mode of giving to prepared hemp and flax the fineness, softness, and whiteness of cotton, by impregnating these substances with oil, and then exposing them during fifteen or twenty days, to the action of frost, between two layers of snow. By this means, all the inconvenience of the ordinary and tedious process of steeping them in stagnant water will be avoided.

Burns.—In cases of burns and scalds, one of the best applications is flour. It ought to be applied from a flour box, and dredged upon the part affected until the pain ceases, and renewed in the same manner as often as it returns. The doctor adds, that the crust formed by the flour ought not to be disturbed or unnecessarily removed.

Cattle which swell in consequence of eating green Clover may generally be relieved by putting a speckled Frog so far down their throat that they are compelled to swallow it alive.

Corns on the Toes may be frequently cured by cutting them thin; and applying a soft rag covered with Tallow which should frequently be renewed; should this fail, the following, it is believed will not; half roast a clove of Garlic, work it soft and spread it on a rag, making a plaster just the size of the corn; apply one every night for a week,

Onions should be sowed in drills six inches apart; they will not ripen well if sowed very thin. The ground should be sheltered from southerly winds—well manured with fresh stable dung, but not dug more than five inches deep, for their fibrous roots will strike so deep in a very deep soil that they will not ripen, their growth being retarded by the cold.

The Sun Flower.—It is said by experienced agriculturalists, that this plant, properly cultivated, is probably the most profitable of any ever cultivated. The oil extracted from its seeds, which are more oleaginous than those of any other plant known to us, combines the qualities, for eating, of the olive or sweet oil; for burning, of the best Sperm oil, without the smoke of the latter; and for painting of the flaxseed oil. The young flower cups of this plant are very esculent and agreeable to the taste, when prepared and eaten as artichokes. The stalks are an excellent substitute for hemp, in manufacturing pack thread. From its flowers, the most incisive and highly flavored honey is extracted. It is estimated that the plant will yield between 80 and 100 bushels of seed to the acre; which will furnish from five to seven quarts of oil to the bushel. We think it would be an object for some of our agriculturalists to make the experiment. The flower will flourish on ground unfit for any thing else.—[Statesmen.]

For the Hooping Cough.—Put a drachm of ground Spanish Flies into a gill of rum; mark the bottle as it is a dangerous Poison if swallowed; slightly rub this over the Breast of an Infant when the cough is violent, it will sometimes blister which is of little consequence to Infants they feeling no more pain from a blister than there really is, which is not a tenth part so much as many grown persons help themselves to by the aid of Imagination.

Directions for coming into Halifax Harbour, taken from the printed Directions in the Custom-House at Halifax.

SAMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W. From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E.; if it bears more easterly stretch to the southward till it bears N. E., and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please. Note—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outer most one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E. When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger. When a-breast of Chebucto Head, run N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. for the south point of George's Island. When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15. In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beach, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach. There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point. Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

New Light House.—As the Light House on the Tower at the west end of Mauger's Beach, at the entrance of Halifax Harbour, is intended only to lead vessels up the harbour, the greater part of the eastern side will be darkened, viz—from N. E. by N. to S. half E.—The following directions published by the Commissioners of Light Houses should be attended to:—“Vessels coming from the Eastward must keep Sambro Light open to the southward of Chebucto Head and until the Light opens on Mauger's beach, which will then bear N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.—they will then be to the westward of Thrum Cap Shoals, and may shape a course up the harbour, always keeping the Light on the Beach open, and on the starboard bow. Vessels coming from the westward will see this Light when they are as far to the eastward as Chebucto Head, by keeping it open, and on the starboard bow, it will lead them up to the beach. This Light will appear of a red colour, which will distinguish it from any other on the coast. It is fifty eight feet high from the level of the sea.”

BISCUIT MACHINE.—The navy board is manufacturing biscuits at Portsmouth by machinery. The first process is that of mixing the meal (5 cwt.) with a sufficient quantity of water, which is accomplished in two minutes; the second process is that of rolling the dough, which is placed on boards, to its proper thickness; and the third and last process is passing the dough, when rolled, under the stamping machines, which will stamp the extraordinary number of 360 per minute, or 21,600 per hour. The whole of these operations are performed without the dough coming into contact with the hand or any other part of the body, and the machines perform their respective duties with admirable precision, expedition, and cleanliness, and have fully answered the most sanguine expectations of their spirited inventor.

No, said the other, 'I have not forgotten it; but I cannot well spare time to go. I knew you would be there, and I am sure you are an honest man, and will say nothing but the truth. You will state the case fairly, and justice will be done.' And so it proved, for the farmer who went to the judge stated his neighbor's claims so clearly, that the cause was decided in his favor; and he returned to inform his opponent that he had gained the property.

Barking Dogs.—A correspondent of the London Times says:—It is surprising to me they have not introduced here the sort of muzzle in common use on the continent, as it is to be had in all the saddler's shops, even on the Calais coast; and that has a wire nose bag, which allows the dog full use of his tongue, and does not confine him, as the English muzzle does, and which is really calculated to drive dogs mad, by preventing the exit of the tongue, which is of the utmost consequence to the animal. With the French muzzle the dog can bark, bark, and do nothing but eat, but though roving about cannot possibly injure any one, neither is it so unsightly made as you might at first suppose."

The ladies of Bogota are adorned with emeralds of a peculiarly fine green, and without flaws, which is rare in these stones, and makes them very valuable. These emeralds are all from the mines of Mousa, where some of the largest in the world have been found, and are now in the possession of the King of Spain. He has one of so large a size that his Majesty uses it as a paper presser. I was told that the cure of Mousa had a waistcoat with small emerald buttons, the greater part of which had been found in the crops of fowls and turkeys, picked up by them in their rambles to digest their food.—*Hamilton's Columbia.*
