

THE NEW ENGLISH GAME

SPRINGHILL, N. S., July 23.— The Springhill miners have decided to go out on strike next week. Pioneer Lodge, No. 13, the Provincial Workingmen's Association, met tonight and discussed the situation. The men are in the employ of the Cumberland Rallway and Coal Company and about 1,500 will be affected by the strike.

Mr. Neill's house is one of the finest in Fredericton, and is located in one of the choicest districts of the city. It is not very distant from the Legislative Buildings, and is quite large enough for the Governor's use.

The house is a wooden one, and is a fine piece of architecture. The grounds are also spacious. A new wing is now being added to the Queen Hotel, Fredericton, and a suite of rooms for the Governor will be laid off from the new part. Until a Government House is acquired the Governor will make his headquarters there during the session of the Legislature.
