Lendon, July 20.—The House of Lords passed the third reading of the parliament bill, otherwise known as the veto bill, without division today, after only three hours' debate. The revolt of the insurgent peers failed to materialize.

All the threats of the extremist lords to throw out the bill at this stage and precipitate a crisis, proved a bluff. One solitary peer, Baron Stanmore, raised his voice to demand a vote. He found no supporters in his role of Horatius at the bridge, Lord Morley of Blackburn, for the government, and Lord Lansdowne, leader of the opposition repeated some familiar arguments for and against the measure.
