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The New Irish Land Bill, LONDON, June 8 - The new Irish Land Bill introduced by Mr. Trevelyan is in substance a generous measure by which the Irish peasant will be enabled to become absolute owner of his farm by paying yearly for forty years a sum less than what they now pay for rent, the government undertaking to advance a hundred millions for this purpose.

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WOOD ASHES - A reasonable application of wood ashes is very beneficial in a garden. But it is comparatively an easy matter to make the application too strong, especially if the ashes are unselected - Farm and Garden.

Whoever places much dependence on the strainer for securing clean milk will never make it of good quality. Allowing dirt to get in milk and then depending on the strainer to get it out is a poor apology for cleanliness. More or less of the dirt, especially everything of a soluble nature, and some that is not, will find its way through the meshes of the strainer.

In washing wooden dairy utensils use first hot water then cold, and lastly hot. See that they are well dried.

Among other pretty ways to finish the edge of a silk lounge quilt are these: Put a border of narrow ribbon on in stripes, make a point on the end of each ribbon, and under these allowing it to show a trifle; below them put a ruffle of lace. The other way is to omit the lace, and put a tassel or small ball on each point.

A hall window may be made very pretty by pasting on it stained glass paper, which can be purchased for a small sum of money and easily applied.

In a flat apartment much more room and a prettier effect may be obtained if the doors are removed and portieres of some Persian or Turkish stuff put on rods or brass rings.

Very pretty and inexpensive curtains can be made of cheese-cloth, and bordered rick-rack or cheap lace, ruffled. The cheese cloth washes nicely and should be stiffened with a little thin starch.
