The Body of a Missing Man Found in the Reservoir With Cuts in the Neck and Stones In

the Coat Pockets The Remains Identified as Those of

Thomas Kimber - Was It Murder or Suicide?

MONTREAL, May 28.—The lamber mystery was unravelled in part vesterday by the discovery of the body of the missing man in the high level reservoir. Whether he came to his death by suicide or was the the victim of foul play, is an unsolved problem. The opinion of doctors and detectives is divided on that point.

THE DISCOVERY.

THE DISCOVERY.

The discovery was made by Antoine Bernichon, who, while going to his work, nassed the high level reservoir in the Mountain Park. He noticed something white and unusual in the water and then saw a human head. Bernichon called to a park policeman, and together they managed to get the body to the edge of the reservoir. They then notified the caretaker of the morgue, and the body charge by him. It had

the morgue, and the cots charge by him. It had THREE CUTS. in the left side of the neck, besides a long and deep cut across the throat. There was a towel marked "T. Styles" wrapped around the neck. In the pookets were stones weighing several pounds.

THE INQUEST.

Coroner Jones held an inquest. The caretaker of the morgue testified that he had searched deceased's clothing and found in the two coat pockets three stones which would probably average from six to eight pounds each. In the pants pockets were found two pipes, two tolacco pouches, a corkscrew and 15 cents in change. On the flannel undershirt was worked "T. S. Kimber," and upon the towel, which was bound around the throat, was stamped "T. Styles."

Dr. Mount said that on examining the body he found on the right side of the neck a cut five inches in length, which cut the skin and part of the musular membrane. On the left side of the neck he found three similar cuts, but they did not appear to be very deep. On his opinion being asked as to the cause of death, witaess said he could not give a decided opinion, as he had not made an autopsy of the body. He thought it was a case of suicide. He thought, however, that the cuts on the neck were sufficient to cause death, but could not say positively till an autopsy was held. There were no other marks of violence on the body. New York, May 29.—A Winnipeg tele-tram to the World says: An outbreak is eared among the Indians of Northern feared among the Indians of Northern British Columbia, who are in a terrible state of excitement over the burning of their burying ground. The practice of most of the Indian tribes is to dispose of most of the Indian tribes is to dispose their dead by hanging them up in large trees. The Siwash tribe had 300 of

their dead by hanging them at 300 of their ancestors hung up in this manner. White men accidentally set the forest on fire and the entire lot of bodies was burned. Most of the bodies were dried, and once the fire got among them they burned like tar barrels. The Indians were horrified and gesticulated in the wildest manner. Their grief was uncontrollable, as nothing is as sacred to them as their dead. Without taking the trouble to reason out the cause of the fire, they came to the conclusion that the white settlers along the Squamish had purposely brought it about, and so far did their feelings carry them that violence against these people was openly talked of. Indian agents, who have gone to the scene, are having a hard task restraining them.

DILLON'S DODGE

To Secure \$3,000 from an Inturance Company-Failure of the Plot.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 29.—James Dillon, of Tyrrell county, insured his life for \$3,000 in the Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company about a year ago. Some time after he fell from a boat half a mile from shore, and yelled loudly for help to a man a quarter of a mile away. When the man, responded Dillon secretly swam ashore and disappeared. The man whose assistance he had asked supposed he was drowned, and was pertectly willing to swear to it. Notice of Dillon's death was sent to the company. It refused to pay the insurance. Action was brought by Dillon's wife, and when the case stood for trial at the court last week the widow alleged that he was drowned.

Ten days ago a body was found near the place where he had been seen to sink in the water. The body was identified by 200 people as that of Dillon. At court counsel, for the widow took a non-suit because the body had been found. There is no doubt that the company would have paid the money, but last Tuesday, to the surprise of every one, Dillon himself returned s. fe and sound to Columbia. His statement is most remarkable. He says he swam ashore the day he overturned the boat, put his hat in it and left the boat half full of water. He determined to hide in the woods so as his wife could get the insurance money. 

He said that although the present meeting was a small one, he thought that the people were about to deal with one of the greatest questions of the day. He objected to being governed by anything like an absentee landlord.
