The building was originally erected by a man named Taylor, and was known as the Taylor building. MARTINIQUE MOURNS.

No Less Than 250 Lives Lost in the Late Storm.

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Aug. 23.—A fearful cloudburst broke over Pottsville this afternoon and the water poured down in torrents for an hour. Fully 400 families were driven to the upper stories of their homes. The business portion of the town suffered greatly. It was the worst storm ever known in Potsville, and the damage is estimated at over \$100,000.

A Captain Shoots a Stoker.

New York, Aug. 22.—The story is told in shipping circles to-day of how Captain Bakker, of the steamship Obdam, which left this port July 18 for Rotterdam, two days later shot and killed one of the coal stokers. On his previous trip Captain Bakker shipped about twenty coal stokers at Rotterdam. On the trip over here there was some dissatisfaction among the stokers, but they were afraid to mutiny. When the ship left this port, however, to return to Rotterdam, the men grew sullen, and there were good grounds to fear a mutiny. Capt. Bakker was told by a man named Bol that such a move was ripe, and the captain went down in the coal hole and warned the men. One of the stokers picked up a fireman's comb, a heavy iron instrument, and made at the captain. The latter drew his revolver and shot the man dead. The man's name was Dozer. In Rotterdam Capt. Bakker was placed under \$10,000.

Our commercial contemporary need have no misgivings on the fact that the Red Parlor buys legislation, has bought the men who have had it in their power to grant legislation, and have exacted repayment from the public many times greater than its own outlays. It is indeed an evil of the greatest magnitude. The cure is to get rid of the rulers who have countenanced the bargain and sell, and who will continue to do so as long as the people are fools enough to give them the opportunity.

The country needs and must have honest

administration, and the men who have sold themselves to the Red Parlor cannot give it to them. They dare not.

WASTEFULNESS OF FENCES

The average farmer has too many fields upon his estate or certainly too many "snake" fences. From the land thus needlessly occupied he usually gets no crop, unless it be of brambles and weeds which inflict upon him a double loss. We have observed on some 50-acre farms more than one acre of good land unnecessarily taken up with fences and yet the owners complaining because they had not enough land. The fact of the matter was that they were not more than half working what they had. After going over some 40 farms this year entered for prizes offered by the Ontario Agricultural and Arts Association, one of the judges said to the writer that very few of them were at all entitled to the appellation "prize farms." In some cases capital was no doubt needed, but the great trouble with almost all was the lack of what is called "intensive" farming. In consequence of their loose methods the majority of those 40 farmers, he felt sure, were not making one-half the profit of which their farms were capable. 



WHOLESALE INFANTICIDE.

The Wonderful Confession of a Man Who Has Murdered Ten Children and Three Grandchildren.

Three Grandchildren.

New York Aug. 24.—The mails just in from Trujilo, by way of Panama, under date of July 25, bring details from the village of Lomos de Zamora, in the United States of Columbia, of a series of child murders committed by a peon named Marciano Medina. His wife and daughter, Remigia, are accessories to, if not accomplies in, the killing of thirteen infants.

Medina has made a full confession to the commissary of police. He says he killed his own ten children because he was too poor to support them, and killed his three grandchildren to hide his daughter's shame. He has, in spite of his wholesale infanticide, six sons and one daughter, and they all knew of his murders and deprecated them.
