



Toronto has entered on a Provincial bye lection. How much easier it is to conduct such a contest than to carry on an election for the Dominion Parliament. Under the Dominion Franchise Act bundreds of voters can be disfranchised by technicalities, as we in London know, tither by counting had votes or by keeping off good votes, while hundreds of men who have moved away can come back and swamp the legitimate electorate. Under for centuries been shrewd politicians. the Ontario law, passed by the Mowat Government, there is no non-resident vote, and little trouble in bringing the resident voters to the poils. The list is complete: every year by municipal officers, and revised by a judge, but if he plays the partisan his decision can be appealed against. The one man one vote residenting suffrage is indeed a great improvement upon the system decreed in Dominion elec tions. We wonder at any honest citizen upholding the cumbrous and expensive law, so capable of abuse, that has been forced on the country by unscrupulous men.

LONDON'S PRESSING NEED.

The London Board of Health has de reed that when its inspector and his assistants go on a pilgrimage through the city, with the object of compelling dilatory residents to clean up, they shall be accompanied by a policeman. This presupposes that there may be some citizens who are unwilling to aid in the preservation of the public health by a due respect for sanitary laws. Doubtless there are in London, as in every city of any size, men and women who are neglectful of the laws of nature, and need to be urged, even to the extent of pressure, to take reasonabl precautions to keep themselves and their families from being attacked by diseases nurtured in filth.

But the health authorities of this city, while zealous in their endeavors so far as they go, are handicapped through the system adopted, or rather lack of system, or the removal of kitchen and other refuse. The present method is not only detrimental to the public in point of efficiency, but afar. most expensive as well. Every householder. every man of business, is compelled to keep his premises clean. The individual effort is only made once inayear - in the spring or early summer. For the remainder of the year, so long as no infectious disease breaks out on the premises, the householder or man of business is permitted to accumulate as much kitchen and other refuse as he sees fit-always provided his surroundings do not develop into a positive nuisance.

This system is all wrong. It has been abandoned by every city of any size and progressive tendency, as costly and inefficient. The proper system of cleansing is that which proceeds upon th co-operative plan, the cost being defrayed out of the civic revenues. What Londoner would think of making every citizen responsible for the mud-scraping, sweeping, or repairing of the roadway opposite his property? Or of making every man light the street in front of his lot? In all these matters, the taxpayers wisely pursue a system of co-operation that is found to work equitably. There is a growing tend-ency to enlarge municipal management in every direction where the welfare of the whole people can be better served by concentration of management than by in-dividual effort. There is just as much reason for the co-operative system in maintaining cleanliness as for monopolizing natural opportunities such as public lighting and public water supply. 
