IT IS MANSLAUGHTER.

Close of Samuel Rowatt's Trial on the Charge of Murder.

Toronto, May 1.—The trial of Samuel Rowatt, for the murder of his wife Agnes, on June 12, 1896, was begun on Thursday before Judge Street, and

closed last evening.

The alleged murder was committed about 11 o'clock in the morning at 76 Victoria street, where Rowatt was living with his wife. Rowatt is said to have fired three shots at his wife, one of which took effect, entering at the left breast and passing through the spinal column, eventually causing death, though Mrs. Rowatt did not die until March 3, 1897. In her ante-mortem statement Mrs.

Rowatt said: The shooting happened on Friday, June 12, at 276 Victoria street, at 11:30 a.m. Her husband shot owing to the receipts from the gas ner in the back with a revolver. She fell to the floor, and, turning toward shot striking her in the left arm. He then went out and she began to yell "Murder!" There was no one in the room except themselves. Early in the morning he went out and came back in about three hours, when he said:
"Are you in any better humor?" She
replied that she was just the same. He was in the room about five minutes when he shot her. She was going to

In cross-examination Mrs. Rowatt said she rented the room, and had not lived with Rowatt for two or three weeks. They afterwards "made it up." 

As a plain matter-of

advance, reference may be made to Jules Verne's story, "Around the World in Eighty Days," published more than twenty years ago. such a feat has been doubly discount ed, and even without the resources and fertile expedients of Verne's famous traveler it is now possible to go around the globe in 66 days, or, when the Siberian Railroad is completed three or four years hence, in 33, or even in 30 days

however, science no longer concerns itself. It is a mere working out to their fuller application of facts long ago made more commonplace. What the wizards of the laboratory are thinking of and dreaming about today are discoveries and advances by means of which the practical achievements of this century will hereafter be also commonplace. Thus Edison in his laboratory is speculating about the possibilities of the X-ray, possibilities that are startling even when compared with the actual achievements already accredited to the strange light. My next ecclesiastical venture was the rare old Church of St. Mary's in Mortlake. For an antiquarian, that is worth a journey across the to see. Built in 1348. (that's from the guide book), it was rebuilt in 1543. In the mossy and quiet old churchyard surrounding it lie men who were buried long before Columbus discovered America. The older graves are easily distinguished, for every one of them is covered with a mound of cement, with the usual head and foot stone, and most of the lettering obliterated. How happy those old Britons ought to be, four centuries removed from all the cares and worries of life! Eastern question does not bother them. They cannot even be dug up, because they are not there. Nine Charges Against the Goderich Postmaster.

The Commissioner Finds Most of Them Sustained.

Goderich, Ont., May 1.-Commissioner Seager, who recently investigated the charges preferred against Postmaster Campbell, of this town, de-livered his finding in the case in the court room yesterday afternoon, the presence of a large number of spectators. Following is a brief summary of the finding:

Charge 1—It was charged that Post-master Campbell had acted impropertoward Miss Hays, of Seaforth, a Collegiate Institute student, one evening, and thereby insulted her and Miss Jeckyl, who was with her on the oc-The charge was held to be sustained.

Charge 3-This charge was that the

postmaster had unwarrantedly taken hold of Miss Inglis, while she was coming through an inner door of the postoffice, after he had asked her and a lady friend to visit the inside department. Held to be sustained. Charge 4-The postmaster

charged with insulting Miss Dancey while she was engaged in writing a card in the private office, by clasping her from behind and putting his hands breast. Charge held to be sustained. Charge 5-This was a charge of opening a letter addressed to one

Charge 6-It was charged that the North American Chemical Company was compelled to post their letters and rate cards at the railway station for a length of time, owing to the fact that the postmaster was a sales agent for a rival firm. It was proved that Mr. Campbell had acted in such a capacity for several years, but had now dis continued connection with the salt

Charge 7-A complaint was made by Robt. Bell. a marble workman, that he also had to post his letters at the railway station because Mr. Campbell was the financial manger of a rival marble works business. The evidence proved that this state of affairs had

existed. Charge 8-Mr. Vanstone, of Wingham, another marble works man, had sent a letter to a customer named Johnston, Goderich P. O., and finding it had not reached its destination, called at the office to make inquiry, when he was handed the letter, and told it had been opened by mistake. The plea given by the postoffice attendant was that there were so many Johnstons the letter had been opened, and closed up again with a margin of postage stamps, but no memorandum had been made that it had been opened by mistake, nor by whom it had been opened, contrary to the rule of the Postoffice Department.
