London, Dec. 31.—The Daily Graphic asserts "on authority" that the British squadron was definitely instructed to assemble off Chemulpo to support a Corea on the dismissal of Mr. Mc-Leavy Brown, British superintendent of Corean customs, who, under the advice of the British consul, has twice returned the notice of dismissal served upon him. With regard to Port Arthur, the Daily Graphic asserts there is every reason to believe the Russians will adhere to their pledge to evacuate it at the end of the winter, and there is therefore no ground for complaint on the part of England. Neither does the government regard the occupation of Kiao Chau as calling for action, because British interests are not threatened. According to the Daily Graphic, both the foreign office and the admiralty are agreed upon

Disastrous Fire and Earthquake Visits Port-au-Prince.

Port-au-Prince, Hayti, Dec. 31.-At 11 o'clock Tuesday night a fire, which assumed considerable proportions on account of lack of water to supply the pumps, broke out and destroyed eight hundred houses, including a number of warehouses, a hotel, the Church of St. Joseph, and its parsonage. About 3,000 people were rendered homeless. Yesterday morning at 6:40 o'clock there was an earthquake, the disturbing half a minute and causing slight cracks in the earth. There were no accidents, but the population was greatly alarmed.

# The Dairymen.

Medical Health Officer's Milk Inspection Report.

The Quality of Milk Supplied to Londoners-Satisfactory Condition of the Herds and Dairies.

Dr. Hutchinson, city medical health officer, at the meeting of the board of health last night, presented a report of the inspection of herds and dairies, and of the quality of milk sold in the city during the last six months. The general condition of the herds, the report stated, was good-better than it has ever been before. No diseased cows were found. Of 157 samples of milk examined one was adulterated by the addition of water, and one had cream added. The average richness or percentage of butter-fat was a fraction The herds and dairies are classified in the order of merit-A, B and C. The milk in Nos. 1, 2 and 3 is graded as follows: That having a percentage of 4 and upwards is first class; that ranging from 4 to 3.5 is second class, and that from 3.5 to 3 is third class. In the month of October typhoid fever appeared in the family of a dairyman in London township. He was promptly stopped selling until all danger was past. Dr. Nansen Talks of Klondike Relief Plans-Cannot Feed Reindeer.

Binghamton, N.Y., Dec. 31.-Dr. Nansen, the Arctic explorer, was today asked for his opinion concerning the feasibility of getting relief to Klondike miners by means of reindeer brought from Norway. He said that it would probably be possible to get the deer to Alaska in time, provided they are taken overland across this country, and if the deer reach Alaska they would undoubtedly greatly assist in the relief work. The principal difficulty, he said, would be to get them to Alaska.

Reindeer, according to the noted explorer, will eat little except the moss which they find in the polar regions, starving to death before they will eat hay, grain or any other food. It would be almost impossible to gather moss enough to be used to feed any number of reindeer in transporting them from Norway to Alaska.

The final meeting of health for the year w night, and the medical health officer, Dr. Hutchinson, submitted his annual report on the health of the city for the year ending Nov. 1 the death rate, 12.1, was one point higher than last year, London still enjoys the distinction of being the healthiest city on the continent.

The report was as follows: The number of deaths year was 466. Two hundled and six-teen cases of infectious diseases were reported, of which 22 Broved fatal.



## THE GREYHOUND.

The Name Misapplied to Dogs not Grey at All. [Good Words.]

Up to about 300 years ago "greyhounds" were the shaggy, gray-colored dogs used in the chase of large game. After that the name was transferred, sufficiently absurdly, to the black, white and yellow, but generally spotted or bicolored, and never gray, dog that is now so popular for coursing hares. It is very odd that anyone, writing about the dog, should have insisted upon so obvious an absurdity. On the contrary, a great many writers who have written very wisely about the word "grey," have tried to explain away its simplest meaning by referring to Celtic, Gaelic and Saxon roots; but, considering these two animals were called indifferently "grey dogs" or "grey hounds"-in two words-when our language first came to be written, and that in those days "dog" and "hound" were absolutely synonymous, it seems to me as great a waste of wisdom to try and prove that "grate," "gray," or "grey," when it is joined with dog or hound, meant anything else but grey, as to say that grey-fly means a fly of princely extraction, or grey-beard a champion

If I were quarrelsome I should like to pretend that greyhound really means "badger-dog." At any rate, I should have sense of language on my side, for gray, grey, grate, or grei, are all names for the gray badger, and I would not be more absurd than the
