

### SEVEN TENEMENT HOUSES PLUNGE INTO A CLAY PIT: NEARLY A SCORE PERISH.

## Midnight Horror at Haverstraw, N. Y., When Entire Block Slides From Base and Drops 100 Feet.

Haverstraw, N. Y., Jan. 8. - Ten bodies burned beyond recognition had been taken early today from the smouldering ruins of the tenement houses, which, by a landslide, were carried into a clay pit, shortly before last midnight. Undermined by the shifting clay that had been softened by yesterday's snowfall, the several homes, with their threescore sleeping occupants, toppled over the brink of the pit and crumbled to pieces. The houses, which were of wood, were set afire from overturned stoves, and were soon a mass of flames. Some fifty or more tenants escaped with more or less serious in-Juries, while a number, variously estimated at from fifteen to eighteen, are believed to have been killed outright or burned to death.

#### Seven Houses Go Down.

The landslide occurred on Rutland street, in the east end of the town, where two blocks of houses are supposed to have been undermined by workmen digging clay for brick-making. The catastrophe occurred without warning, and while the victims were asleep. Seven houses went Freight Car on Canadian Northern down in the crash. Those supposed to have perished are: Mr. Nelson, furniture dealer; Benjamin Nelson; Mrs. Silverman; Mrs. Silerman's son; a Jewish rabbi; Mr. and Mrs. Cohen and five Cohen children.

The missing include Mrs. Bailey, two of the Mannion family, the entire Lanny family, and seven Hebrew laborers. The landslides came gradually at first. The ground, weakened by the rain and snow of the last few days, showed crevices near the edge of the street late in the afternoon, and in the evening portions of the bank began to give way. The street was not thickly populated, former dwellers

having left on account of the fear of just what happened. Many of the residents left their homes early in the evening before the final crash came. The Nelsons were endeavoring to move their effects, and the rabbi was assisting them. This was also the case with Mrs. Silverman When the final slide came, it came so suddenly that those who had

lingered in their houses had absolutely no opportunity to escape. The bank caved from twenty to sixty feet at the top, and for a istance of two blocks from Division street likewise fell. Those who lived in three houses at the end of the row, and which did not down in the wreck, were aroused by a frightful roar and crash, above which sound could be heard the shricks of the victims. Large forces of men who work in the brickyards by day were mustered to aid in the work of rescue, but their efforts were in vain. All the tenants of the houses still standing were driven out, as the structures are in momentary danger of following their fellows into the pit, The frightened tenants were cared for by neighbors.

During my stay here I have gone through the wheat elevators. They are that of the Canadian Northern at Port earth. This elevator is built right out in the lake. It consists of two mighty barn-like skyscrapers, with a great forest of herculean grain tanks between them. The skyscrapers contain machinery and some storage tanks. The forest is made up of mighty cylinders of tiles bound together with steel, each of which will hold 23 000 bushels of wheat. There are a hundred and sixty such towers, and in addition other tanks made by the interstices among them. The great tank forest covers several acres, and it rises to the height of an eight-story house, each tank being twenty-one feet in diameter or the width of an average par-

The elevator altogether will hold 7. 000,000 bushels of wheat, which is enough to supply a city of a million and a half-Philadelphia, for instancewith flour the year round. It cost \$1,-500,000 to build, and it can, I am told, handle wheat as rapidly as any elevator on the great lakes.

The wheat comes in in cars each of which holds about a thousand bushels. It is carried in bulk and is dumped the great buildings at the sides of the tanks. From here it is carried to the top of the elevator by endless buckets, elevator. There it falls into tanks

The wheat is not touched by hand til I wondered whether I had struck a like water save that the belts will concarry wheat at the rate of sixteen thousand bushels per hour.

The tanks are so arranged that by wheat is stored for the first fifteen days for three-quarters of a cent a bushel month thereafter


