

Aviator John Bryant Was Instantly Killed While Making His Six Hundredth Flight [Canadian Press.]

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 7.-John F. Bryant, a Californian aviator, was instantly killed yesterday afternoon, while making his six hundredth

flight in the same machine. Bryant arose in his machine and circled the business centre of the city, and when over the city hall the aeroplane took a sudden swoon downwards, and made a couple of somersaults, but Bryant seemed to be hanging on gamely and trying to right the machine.

NEAR CANTON I. C. R. Dispute Has JUDGMENT RESERVED IN Been Arranged DORCHESTER ASSAULTING

Defence Claims Evidence of Child Witness Is Not To Be Relied Upon.

Judgment was reserved by Judge Macbeth this morning in the case of Percy Talbot, charged with assault upon Mrs. Apnie Levitt, of Dorchester. A decision will be handed down Friday morning at 11 o'clock

Mrs. Levitt and her 7-year-old son were the only witnesses heard who were present at the time of the alleged assault. Her husband offered evidence as to what occurred after his return from work. The prisoner, through his counsel, Mr. J. F. Faulds, refused to give evidence in his own behalf.

The woman's testimony practically corroborated this. The defence claimed that the evidence of the woman was not sufficiently corroborated by that of the 7-year-old son, and that it was dangerous to convict on the unsupported evidence of the prosecutrix in such a case. It was further held that if the woman had persisted in her outcry she would have been heard from the street or from neighboring houses. It was claimed that she had opportunity to do this, but did not take advantage of it. This, according to the defence, placed her in the ight of a consenting party.

PEACE SIGNED BY DELEGATES FROM BALKANS

Roumania Had to Threaten to Occupy Bulgar Capital at Once.

General Rejoicing All Through the District Devasted by Wars.

Bucharest, Aug. 7. — Terms of peace | tion yesterday morning. were arranged last evening, and the preliminary treaty to end the Balkan war was signed today by the delegates of Servia, Greece, Montenegro, Roumania and Bulgaria. The agreement was arrived at only after another exhibition of the utter helplessness of Bulgaria to face her ring of enemies.

Wednesday the discussions in the peace conference threatened to become interminable, but M. Majoresco, the Roumanian premier, and president of the conference, clinched matters by threatening that unless Bulgaria accepted the modified frontier proposed by the allies Roumania's army would occupy Sofia next Satur-

Agreement Reached. This threat had the desired effect, and the agreement was arrived after numerous private

sultations between the delegates. The new frontier as agreed to starts at a point on the old frontier west of the Struma River, follows the watershed to west of Strumnitza, thence runs almost through the Struma valley to the Belesh Mountains and thence easterly in almost a straight line to the Lesta River, thus leaving Strumnitza, the port of Lagos and Kanthi to Bulgaria and the port of Kavala to Greece. More than a hundred such immigrants are now detained at Canadian ports. Another practice that has been stopped is that of allowing immigrants on arrival in port to send to relatives in Canada and get sufficient money to pass the immigration regulations.

MR. GLAUBITZ HAS INSPECTION PLAN

Blames Watering Cart Drivers for Hydrants Being Out of Order.

City May Enter Business of Recharging Batteries at Horton Street Station.

General Manager Glaubitz is workand a report submitted at regular inmeeting of the board of water comissioners. Since the article printed n The Advertiser after the Beck fire, n which it was stated that many of the hydrants were not in good repair Mr. Glaubitz has had an inspection made of some of the hydrants in the outlying districts. Although only one was found that could not be turned, several were in bad repair Blames Watering Carts.

The blame for this, in his opinion ay with the drivers of watering carts, whose careless manipulation of the nydrants often results in breakages. is not to their advantage to repor hese, and the damage goes unnoticed until the hydrant is urgently needed, and then there is trouble. The scheme outlined by the general manager, was o have certain hydrants painted lifferent color from the rest, and set aside for the use of the watering-cart men. These could be fitted with special key to make them easier to operate, and to each would be attached a metal tag bearing a number. The numbers could then be listed on a sheet, and a report on each number made from time to time. It is probable the idea will be adopted.

Recharge Batteries. Matters pertaining to the Horton street station were also taken up. new electric truck for transporting upplies is to be purchased, and two utomobile firms are sending cars to the city next week to demonstrate. It was pointed out that the batteries of he electric cars could be recharged at he Horton street plant, and the busness of the plant could also be proitably extended to recharging batteries for private-owned cars.

Mr. Glaubitz reported that the pulnotor had been requisitioned three times by the police department, and while there was no objection to their borrowing it in the absence of one of their own, there was a danger of scmething happening at the powerouse while the pulmotor was away. debts, etc. Can a farm that is entailed be mortgaged? A .- Subject to the entail only, unless the next heir joins in it. What fees can an executor charge in winding up the estate? A.—Depends on the nature of the estate, and are fixed by the surrogate judge.

What is the cost in the courts to probate a will and wind up the other business of an estate? A.—It depends upon the nature and value of the estate. From \$50 to \$1,000. Consult a
