BRITISH BATTERIES TURN BACK COUNTER ATTACK

First American Troops Landed In France U.S. TROOPS

GUNFIRE OF BRITISH CHECKS ATTEMPT OF THE PRUSSIANS TO RECAPTURE LOST GROUND

Haig Quickly Stops Movement of Enemy Against His New Positions Along the Arra's Front-Successful Raid Is Made at Oppy.

London, June 27 .- British gunfire checked in its incipiency a German counter-attack attempted early today upon the new British positions on the Arras front northwes of Fontaine-les-Croisilles, it was officially announced in today's war office report.

Otherwise only raiding operations along the British front are covered by the statement, which reads: 'Another counter-attack, attempted early this morn-

ing against our new positions northwest of Fontaine-les-Croisilles, was prevented from developing by our artillery. We made a successful raid west of Oppy and captured a few prisoners. A raid attempted by the enemy southwest of La Bassee was stopped by our fire.

TIGHT MEASURES OF PROHIBITION SUITS **AMERICAN SENATORS**

Sub-Committee Has Rewritten Food Control Bill.

MAY PASS THIS WEEK

Will Allow President to Permit Manufacture at His Discretion.

WASHINGTON, June 26 .- The adbeen opposing the original draft of the legislation that both advocates and opponents tonight predicted passage in the Senate by Saturday.

As a substitute for the House prohibition sections, which, without qualification, forbid the manufacture of foodstuffs into liquor, the sub-committee adopted provisions which would prohibit manufacture during the war of all intoxicating beverages, and empower the president to commandeer existing supplies of distilled spirits, but would authorize the executive in his discretion to permit manufacture of malted, fermented and vinous beverages and fix their alcoholic content.

Opponents Converted.

As re-written, the sub-committee draft will be considered tomorrow by the agriculture committee and probably will be reported at once for Senate discussion without material change.

Senators Gore, Smith of Georgia and others prominent in the bitter fight against the legislation have announced their support for the redrafted measure. For the House prohibition plan the sub-committee substitute provides:

"That from and after thirty days from the date of the approval of this act it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to use in the manufacture of purposes any perishable or between the president of the providence of the provides:

non-perishable feeds, foods or food materials.

President Can Rule.

'Whenever the president shall find it unnecessary to conserve the perishable products named, he is empowered to permit the use of such products in the manufacture of vinous liquors.

"Whenever, in the judgment of the president, the public interest would be subserved, thereby, he is empowered to permit the limited use of the materials mentioned in the manufacture of malt or fermented liquors and to prescribe the alcoholic content thereof."

Another section adopted would authorize the president to take over any or all distilled spirits now in bond, upon payment of a reasonable and just price to distillers, for re-distillation into alcohol fer war, industrial or other non-beverage purposes.




