#### COUNCIL WILL MAKE CLEAR SITUATION ON ST. RAILWAY QUESTION

Likely To Issue Statement Telling the Facts.

HIGHER FARES DOUBTFUL

Council Not Expected To Take Chance On Illegal Move.

To purchase or not to urchase; to inrease fares or not to urchase; to increase fares or not to increase fares, what to do to secure a satisfactory street railway service. These are questions which are occupying the minds of the city fathers these hot days, and some of them at least will be acted. of the city fathers these hot days, and some of them at least will be asked, and perhaps answered, at the meeting of the council on Monday evening.

The attitude of the committee which waited on City Solicitor T. G. Meredith yesterday is that, since the illegality of an increase in fares without the consent of the people, expressed at the polls, has been established, the public should be made acquainted with the city's limitations of power in this respect in order to made acquainted with the city's limita-tions of power in this respect in order to offset any possibility of using the coun-cil as a buffer between the public and the company, by making the issue ap-pear to be one of increased wages for the company's employees. To Tell Situation.

The committee will report to the council the results of its deliberations with the solicitor, and will incorporate in its report a recommendation that the mayor and city clerk prepare a compre hensive statement as to the exact situation with regard to street railway matters. A resolution also will be submitted by one of the aldermen, it is understood, calling for a conference with a view to discovering just what the street railway company is prepared to give in the way of increased wages and better service in the event of an increase in fares being authorized.

As already stated on the authority of Ald. C. G. Moorhead, if the company were prepared to make a reasonable offer Mr. Moorhead would be prepared to submit the question of increased fares to a vote of the people, and other aldermen are said to stand in the same attitude with reference to the matter.

Increase Unlikely.

That the council at its meeting on Monday will grant an increase in fares, "taking a chance" on the illegality of the proceeding, now seems to be very unlikely. Indications point to the probunlikely. Indications point to the probability that the council will rather endeavor to show to the public just where matters stand, in order that the public may not be misled into lending itself to what is called an attempt to cloud the real issue.

The special committee's report will also contain a recommendation that the

also contain a recommendation that the company be notified that a breach of its agreement has been committed, and that the service called for under the bylaws must be given. Whether compliance can be forced is another and a Purchase Feeling Grows.
The feeling in favor of purchase be the city of the street railway seems t be growing among the aldermen, and it

is altogether likely that the special committee will become active in the very near future with a view to ascertaining on what terms the purchase could be made without resort to expropriation proceedings, which would without doubt be lengthy, and which might, in the view of some of the aldermen, result in the city being saddled with a very ex-One alderman voiced his fear on this score thus: "The company has been not making money, but directly expro-priations were undertaken it is quite on the cards that the company might undertake to prove what a valuable asset the city was trying to acquire, and that the net revenue was much greater than had been supposed."

In any event, the prospects so far as Monday's meeting is concerned is that no decisive action will be taken, and that the matter will be left in what Mayor C. R. Somerville is fond of calling the "quo vadis" until the special committee has ascertained all the facts
