"During the night there was considerable artillery activity on our front south of the Ancre," the statement says. "We advanced our position northeast of Eaucourt l'Abbaye.

"Gas was discharged by us east of Loos and east of Armentieres. Three raiding parties successfully entered the enemy trenches in the Loos area, and two south of Arras.'

The von Tirpitz supporters offered this suggestion as a compromise. They urged that such a course would be in accord with the chancellor's announced determination of prosecuting a vigorous war against England and would cut off English food and ammunition supplies without endangering lives or property of neutrals. "I am not a prophet, but I can say that the spirit of the German soldier is The British alone have cap tured, since the first of July, upwards of 20,000 prisoners, with much material. One officer told me that within very small compass—a few hundred yards of trenches upwards of 2,000 German dead, and several hundred wounded, unable to escape, covered the ground. Another example, one regiment of Germans, which was wiped out by the Canadians the other day, had been formed only two weeks previously from remnants of ten crack German regi-ments, and yet they disappeared. Expects German Rebellion,

This war will be won by pounding, and it is a long road to Berlin. The German people, however, are becoming very restless. I believe before very many months a rebellion must break out against kaiserism throughout the length and breadth of the German Empire. "The urgent reforms in England, which I had planned last spring, and which were held in abeyance on my return to Canada at that time, have now been carried out. Owing to the fort great growth in the service, the prolongation of the war, and the desire for practical systems, certain important changes have been effected, with much and bladder diseases and rheum Some Reforms Accomplished.

"At the front we have the artillery; we have always "At the front we have the mastery in artillery; we have always had it in manhood. The result is that foot by foot, mile by mile, the allied buildog pluck and doggedness have proved too much for the Imperial Guards. I have been over mile on mile of German for tifications, surpassing in strength any ever, the Allies have to face breechloading rifles, bembs, machine guns, and all classes of artillery firing high explosives, yet everything goes down before the onrush of the soldiers of Britain, of France, of Canada, of Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Newfoundland, in fact, of all the Allies. I have seen German dugouts 30 and 40 feet deep, each capable of holding hundreds of men; yet these have been taken for mile upon mile. Such heroism and manhood have never before been experienced. Nothing can keep our boys from the firing line. The full story of the gallant deeds and the successes of Canadas on the Somme will be made public in detail in due time, but they stand out, as the Right Hon. Lloyd George and all under him, state, as second to none, and rivaled only by the historic British Guards.

"The men at the front expect much from the people of Canada. They are giving up their lives, and those at home must live up to the noble ideal set them by the gallant Canadian lads who are fighting for freedom on the soil of France. Canada must, therefore, continue to do her duty."

TEACHERS SHOULD **DEVELOP MENTALLY** AS WELL AS PUPILS

So Urges Dr. Braithwaite Before Middlesex Teachers.

MAKES SOME SUGGESTIONS

Western University May Organize a Summer School Next Year.

Addressing the East Middlesex Teachers' Institute Thursday afternoon, President E. E. Braithwaite of Western University urged upon his audience the importance of continuing their own mental development, while giving themelves to the task of training the minds and moulding the characters of chil-

"Unless you continue to develop," he said, "you will do worse than standing still." A laugh followed his next statement: "If you don't continue to develop, you will begin to look like teachers." Continuing, he touched upon the obstacles which stand in the teacher's way of self-development. First among these is the mental weariness which concentration upon the work of teaching involves.

Another difficulty named was the lack of outside stimulus. London teachers have been able to find this stimulus in university lectures, with a view perhaps, in the process of time, to covering the university degree course.

Hope for the Isolated Student. For the isolated student, hope was offered in the extra-mural courses offered by some of the larger universities through correspondence and a per-fection of system, which is practically

direct supervision.

Dr. Braithwaite urged the teachers to inpress upon their pupils, even the very youngest, the idea of working towards a university course. The fact that due consideration is not being given in Western Ontario to the value of college training, he stated, is shown by statis-tics, which show that a smaller per-centage of students go from the high schools of Western Ontario to any of the universities than from any other part of the province.

Advantages of Higher Education.

Advantages of Higher Education.

Concerning the advantages of higher education and university degree work, Dr. Braithwaite had forcible arguments to offer in the form of statistics.

"Some people will tell you," he stated, "that a university degree doesn't count for much in making progress in life. In the United States it was found on investigation some years ago that only one man in 140 had a university education. Of 500 members of congress at the time, 200 were university graduates, and the great majority of the rest had at least a partfal university training. It was found that two-thirds of the influential positions in the United States were held by college-trained men. Reduced to mathematics, the college man has one chance to fifteen of achieving an influential position, to one chance in 4,000 of the non-college man.

The vocation of teaching, Dr. Braithwaited termed, "one of the most ideal, from the fact that its field of operation is the realm of the mind of man, made but a little lower than God."

Personality important.
In conclusion, the importance was urged of the factor of "personality" of the teacher and the influence it may be a provide the property of the provided t the teacher and the influence it may exert in shaping the entire after-career of pupils. "You, yourselves, ought to be an inspiration to all that is highest and best," he concluded.

After Ms address, Dr. Braithweite stated a summer school had been under consideration for another year by the Western University authorities, provided it was found that there would be sufficient interest and support to justify.

"I am going to ask you," he continued, "how many of you here would be interested should such a school be organized for another summer. It is probable your attitude in the matter would be an indication of the attitude of other teachers of Western Ontario."

The right hand of the majority present shot up in response to the question. "Good," said the university president; "we must have the summer school."

Importance of Expression.

V. K. Greer, M.A., of the Stratford Normal School emphasized in connection with his practical talk on "Third-Form Language," that the keynote of English composition and grammar in the public schools is teaching adequate and correct expression of thought. In the public schools, language is taught not so much as an accomplishment and for its cultural value, as for daily use. It is of greater importance to teach the habit and appreciation of good use of language, not only in the classroom, but in the playground.





The War Tax for 1915 having been levied after the last Annual Statement was presented explains the deduction of two years' tax in this year's statement. It will be noticed that provision for this year's War Tax (\$50,000), leaves just \$3,141.51 of the sum which would otherwise have gone to increase the Surplus

The Company's Medicine Hat mill, destroyed by fire on April 29th last, is eing rapidly replaced by a more modern plant, which should be running before the end of the year. Plant, stock and dividend income were all fully covered by insurance, but the loss of the mill's output during a busy eight months was unfortunate.

It is even said that the mills could pay 20c to 25c for cotton and still make a profit. Reactions are bound to occur but the concensus favors buying on the good breaks.


