Washington, March 16 .- A little

Scheme Was Rejected.
The United States department wishes to land a "solar plexus blow" against the submarine campaign, the admiral said, "and suggested many schemes long before rejected by the Allies. Such a plan was that of sinking old battleships and cruisers in the entrance to all Ger-man submarine base harbors, Admiral Sims asserted, and only after he had polited out that the scheme would require the sinking of 40 battleships and 603 cruisers and six months of preparation, did the department agree to abandon the plan. It took seven months of effort to bring the Washington officials to the final conclusion, he said.

# CIVIL WAR MAY BREAK OUT IN IS CALLED FOR GERMANY AT ANY HOUR THURSDAY NIGHT TO FAILURE OF EBERT

President Ebert Demands Unc onditional Surrender of New Regime—Announces He Will Conduct Country's Affairs From Wuertemburg-Dr. Wolfgang Kapp Threatens Death To Any Who Strike and Interfere With the Operation of Public Utilties.

[By the Associated Press.]

Civil war seems imminent in Germany as a result of the refusal of the Ebert Government, now sitting at Stuttgart, to carry on negotiations with the reactionary regime which seized power suddenly ast Saturday morning. Unconditional surrender of the men directing the new government is demanded by President Ebert, who announces he will continue to direct the affairs of the troubled country from Wuertemburg. The German national assembly will meet in Stuttgart tomorrow afternoon at

Berlin is in the grip of a general strike, called by socialists and labor leaders as a counter stroke to the assumption of power by the government headed by Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, who has issued a decree threatening all strike leaders and pickets with death if there is interference with vital public services. Extreme measures will be taken under the from 4 o'clock this afternoon, and it is possible the crisis of the new revolution will quickly follow.

Details of the situation throughout Germany are somewhat obscure but there seems to be reason to believe the Ebert Government is still holding control in the southern and western sections, while the Kapp regime is rather firmly intrenched in Northeastern Prussia and in Silesia, where many towns and cities are reported to have declared their adherence to the new gorvnement. Fighting is reported at various points throughout Germany, and it is said there was bloodshed in suburbs of Berlin yesterday, but it would seem the clashes so far reported have been between militia units and disorderly crowds. So far as known armed forces of two governments have not come

into collision.

EBERT HOPES TO AVERT REVOLUTION. Washington, March 16 .- Restoration of the authority of the Ebert Government, with sporadic Spartacists outbreaks throughout Germany, are expected by military officials here who interpret dispatches from Col. Edward Davis, military attache at Berlin, as Indicating that the coup d'etat is not so serious as had at first been supposed. ### **ESTIMATES FOR** SCHOOLS PASS CITY COUNCIL

\$163,730 For South London Collegiate, \$274,000 For Public Schools.

SOME OPPOSITION

Two Aldermen Object To Issuing Debentures Pending An Investigation.

School buildings entailing an expenditure of \$163,730 for a collegiate in South London, and \$274,000 for additions to public schools, was approved by the city council last night. A bylaw authorizing a debenture issue to cover these amounts will be intro-

Chairman Harry Hayman, with sev-

eral trustees and officials of the board of education, appeared to support the request of the board. No discussion took place on the proposed public school building, but the advisability of a South London collegiate was questioned. Ald. C. G. Moorhead, seconded by Ald. G. B. Drake, moved that no debentures be issued for this purpose until the proposal had been more carefully investigated. They were the only supporters of this amendment.

Ald, E. R. Seabrook thought a portion of the Normal School grounds could be used instead of the proposed site adjoining Tecumseh school. Chairman Hayman replied that the Normal School grounds was already congested, but that the board would be willing to consider the suggestion. Ald. O. I. Cunningham said the two sites were only two blocks apart, and there would be little gained by placing the new school on the Normal grounds. In fact, this would destroy the only bit of open space which South London residents had at their disposal.





The report, which covered the period from May 18, 1918. to December 31, 1919, sets forth that Canada's work in vocational training compares most favorably with that of

the United Kingdom. Hospital and sanatoria directly op-erated by the department numbered forty-four and partially operated, six. The department had agreements for a certain number of beds in each of fifty-four hospitals. The number of inpatients treated was 6,520, out-patients 1,634. The average number of outside clinic treatments per week during

Beirut, March 8-(Via Constantinople March 15) .- By the Associated Press .-The independence of Syria was pro claimed here today by the representa-tives of the Syrian people. Emir Fisal was declared king, with Palestine part of the kingdom.

The Syrian banner consists of a seven pointed white star placed in the red field of the Hedjaz flag. Two similar stars placed in the same way will compose the pennant of Mesopotamia, which is reported also to have declared its independence with Emir Abysmal as king 80 and Emir Zed as regent. They are the 48½ third and fourth sons of King Hussein. Lebanon has adhered to this program and apparently a sort of Arab federation has been arranged.

Emir Fisal, in accepting the kingship, said he purposed disinterested service.







OUR RURAL SCHOOL SYSTEM. To the Editor of The Advertiser: Our rural educational system is inefficient for present day needs. We

and note some of its most serious defects. First of all, why not teach our children such things in the school serious described in the school serious describe

longer our own custodians, but must come and go as the state directs. In fact, we are slaves to the state; then, if the state is our custodian, it should in all fairness, give an equal chance to all children, whether they be fich or poor. But under the present system it is not so. The poor man's child in the rural district gets only a very limited education.

Its education has to stop at the very limited education has to stop at the poor man's child in the urban district may avail itself if a high school education because the expense of boarding away from home is removed and his child has the home influences and does not run wild in the streets. Why this discrimination between the rural and urban poor? Why should the child of the poor man, who helps provide food and clothing for both rich and poor of urban districts, not have the same chance in life?

The consolidated school has been as school where there is but one teacher for all classes that are in a rural school, but the expense of building schools, but the expense of building schools all over the province and equipping consolidated schools all over the province and equipping consolidated schools all over the province and carrying pupils to and from school is no small item. Particularly at this time, when wages and everything are so very high. I doubt whether it could be done for lost that now hangs over our heads? I think we must look for some. Think less expensive, and when properly worked out, just as efficient. I will offer a sketch of a plan which I think would be feasible and efficient, Let our school sections and schoolhouses remain as they now are. with competent teachers to teach such subjects as would be most useful to them in rural sections. That the pupil should remain in this school until qualified to pass an examination similar to high or collegiate entrance.

Then, I would say, have a centralized

Then it behooves us to find a system which is fully adequate and retain our brightest young men and women in our rural communities.

We should have a system that is available to the rich and poor alike. We have seen by late events that the citizen belongs to the state, that we are no longer our own custodians, but must come and go as the state directs. 
