St. Petersburg, Nov. 4. - The possibility that there may have been some misunderstanding of signals during the tragedy in the North Sea is suggested by a fact made public in an order of the day issued by Vice-Admiral Choukhin, commander of the Black Sea fleet, which records the fact that officers of the latter fleet are so unfamiliar with the new code adopted by the admiralty that during the recent maneuvers not a single ship understood or obeyed the admiralty's signals.

HER THROAT CUT

Brutal Murder of White Servant Girl - Two Men Suspected. Marshall, Mo., Nov. 4. - The dead body of a white servant girl of this city, who was found in a pasture in the suburbs of South Marshall, in a pasture. The girl evidently had been murdered. Her throat had been cut with a sharp stick, a piece of which still remained in the flesh; her left ear had been cut off, and there was a bullet hole in her head.

THE CINCINNATI MYSTERY

No Clue Yet to Perpetrator of the Brutal Murder. Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 4. - The awful death of Alma Steingeweg, the telephone operator whose body was found yesterday in a vacant lot near Spring Grove Cemetery entrance, still remains a mystery. The one thing certain is that the girl was murdered. Frank Limie, the conductor on whose car Miss Steingeweg rode on her way home Wednesday night, says that on Monday night, a short, stout man, a stranger, boarded the car with Miss Steingeweg and sat facing her. He slighted when she did, with other passengers. The same thing occurred the next night, but on Wednesday night the man alighted along with the girl. The conductor infers that this man committed the murder.

INQUIRY BEGINS NOVEMBER 16TH

North Sea Commission Will Sit in Paris—Composed of Five Admirals. Paris, Nov. 4, 5:55 p.m. - Foreign Minister Delcasse announced to the council of ministers today the details of the approaching session of the Anglo-Russian commission in the North Sea incident. The sessions of the commission will be held in Paris beginning about Nov. 16, or as soon after that time as a full attendance can be secured. The commission will be composed of British, Russian, French and American admirals, one from each country, these four to select a fifth admiral.

AS TO CONTRABAND

Russia Meets British Protest In a Conciliatory Spirit. London, Nov. 4. - Further correspondence regarding the question of contraband of war has been issued in the form of a letter by Foreign Minister Lansdowne dated Nov. 2, in which he says: "The Russian Government met all the representations made by his Majesty's Government and the United States in a conciliatory spirit, and it is understood that the Russian naval commanders have been recently furnished with supplementary instructions, which his Majesty's Government has every reason to believe will be interpreted in a liberal spirit, and result in their exacting no more stringent rights for the future in a less vigorous manner. Lord Lansdowne adds that so far as the Government has been able to ascertain Russia has given more favorable treatment to German vessels than was given to British ships, though German arms have benefited owing to the unwillingness of British owners to carry on trade with Japan under the existing uncertainty as to the Russian interpretation of their previous declaration regarding contraband, and Lord Lansdowne refers to the sinking of the Knight Commander, and the continuation of the question which the international commission is to decide. The Russian authorities are understood to desire to acquiesce in the settlement with the detailed report of Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky, which was brought here by the Russian steamer three comrades today, in order to ascertain whether any new questions raised by the report should be included. Both Capt. Clado and his comrades upon their arrival at the railroad station this afternoon informed a representative of the Associated Press that they had nothing to say for publication.

CHIEF LEGAULT IN HOT WATER

Head of Montreal Police Faces Serious Charge. MADE BY DISREPUTABLE WOMEN. Accused of Accepting Money From the Keepers of Disorderly Houses.

Montreal, Nov. 4. - Some grave accusations were made in the recorder's court today against Chief Legault, of the police force. Some three weeks ago Legault Deschamps was arrested for conducting a disorderly house. The case was postponed several times until today. Two witnesses for the defense, Mary Desjardins and Emma Bougie, furnished a great sensation by their deposition and her deposition was backed up by a written declaration, that during October, 1901, she went to Chief Legault's office and told him she intended to conduct a disorderly house, and asked him how she might avoid arrest. He told her to pay him \$25. In November she came to his office accordingly and laid \$25 on his desk. On Dec. 25, she came again to the chief's office and laid an envelope containing \$25 on his desk. He put the envelope in his pocket. In January she was unable to pay the stipulated sum, hence, on Jan. 26, she was arrested and has not dared to keep her house open since. She said that every time she gave the chief money he said she was doing nothing wrong. Mary Desjardins, being sworn, said that in 1902 she was keeping a house. She escaped arrest by paying money which went to the chief. In May, 1902, a man named Joseph Jurenaud came to her place and told her he had seen Chief Legault and had arranged that she would not be molested if she gave up money regularly. So, on May 15 of that year, she paid \$10 to Jurenaud, who said the money would go to the chief. During the following week Jurenaud paid her another visit, and she gave him \$20 for the chief. She was asked whether the money reached the chief or not; so one day she followed Jurenaud to the city hall without his observing her. He went into the chief's office, and then she felt sure that the money reached the chief. She wished it to, she continued to pay \$20 a week until July 1, 1902, when financial reverses crippled her resources, and she failed to remit \$20. Her house was raided and she was sent to jail the same month. Chief Legault was called this afternoon and swore there was not a word of truth in the woman's statement. The police committee will investigate the charges.

STRANGE SCENE AT EXECUTION

Prisoner Stood With Head in Noose for 52 Minutes. AWAITING GOVERNOR'S DECISION. Black Cap Was Removed to Give Him First Sight of Messenger With the Expected Reprieve.

Montgomery, Ala., Nov. 4. - One of the most dramatic executions in history was that of Jeff Allen, negro, on Monday, charged with the murder of a member of his race, at Marion, this state. So strong was the sympathy of the community for him that, even after the rope was put around the prisoner's neck and his arms and legs had been pinioned for the death fall and the black cap was ready for adjustment, 29 of the leading citizens, who were among the spectators, gathered around the scaffold, telegraphed to the acting governor asking a reprieve of 30 days and stating that new evidence of the man's innocence would probably be presented. The appeal for clemency, so strongly made, failed, but while it and the governor's answer were being transmitted a period of 52 minutes—the prisoner stood in silence. No words were uttered save in whispers, and there were few tears. All eyes were turned away from the time on the negro who was playing the star part in this extraordinary tragedy, part of the time on the warden through which the messenger who would bear the telegram that meant life for the condemned man. As the time passed the sheriff watched the clock and saw the last few minutes of the hour being ticked away. The black cap was held back in order that Allen might get the first sight of the messenger. Presently a boy was seen in the distance bearing a yellow envelope which he waved as high in the air as his little arm could reach. The messenger reached the scene and delivered the message to the sheriff, who read it to the end amid the painful silence. Folding up the message he shook his head and said: "It's no use, Jeff. The governor will not save you. Get ready to die, and be thankful for the time lost there is little more of life for you." The negro inclined his head for the cap, the noose having been placed already, and confessed his soul to his God. "I am ready," he said in answer to the officer's inquiry. All the arrangements being made, the crowd fell back at a silent signal from the hangman, the minister breathed a last prayer, and the long white sheet was shot toward the earth, the law's collection of the awful debt incurred when he took the life of another of his fellow-creatures; the ignoble end of a man who hoped, and many hoped with him, that at the last moment there would come a respite. Probably there had never been a more determined effort in the history of the state to save the life of a murderer. Some weeks ago papers were sent to the capital seeking a commutation to life imprisonment, and the case was carefully looked into by the pardon board, which recommended a commutation be granted. Auditor Sewell and Attorney-General Wilson voting in the affirmative and the governor, Acting Governor Cunningham, who was about to leave for St. Louis to meet Mrs. Cunningham and the Exposition. He explained that he was on the train while on the way to the Exposition City, and came to the conclusion that there was no compelling argument presented in favor of interference.

A \$10,000,000 Mortgage

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 4. - The Republic Iron and Steel Company filed a mortgage in the county recorder's office here today for \$10,000,000. The mortgage dates from Oct. 1, 1904, and states that the company proposes to issue 20-year 5 per cent gold bonds.

"KNOCKING" THE ONTARIO FARMERS

A Whitby Man Says Children From England Are Ill-Treated. London, Nov. 4. - H. B. Willing, of Whitby, Ont., writing to the Manchester Guardian, implores the people of Manchester not to send their children to Canada until they are able to look after themselves, as in traveling through Ontario County Mr. Willing was greatly struck by the miserable manner these poor homeless ones were treated. They are neglected, do not get proper education, are made slaves from sunrise to sunset, and thrashed for the least offense. Mr. Willing does not wish to say this always in the case, but in nearly every instance he followed up his ill-usage and neglect. Arnold White, in an article in the Bristol Mercury on "The Burden We Bear for Untaxed Colonies," says that at the present time the colonies reverse Nelson's signal; they expect so fast of imperial defense is concerned that England will do her own duty and the Canadian, Australian and South African duty as well.

He took an active part in the controversy over the admission of Dr. Briggs to the Episcopal ministry, and soon afterwards he withdrew from the Episcopal Church and became a member of the Roman Catholic Church. He was ordained a deacon, and on Nov. 29, 1890, he was ordained a priest. He returned to this city to engage in parish work, but his health failed, and he has been in the hospital for several months. Dr. Decosta was the author of more than thirty religious and historical works.

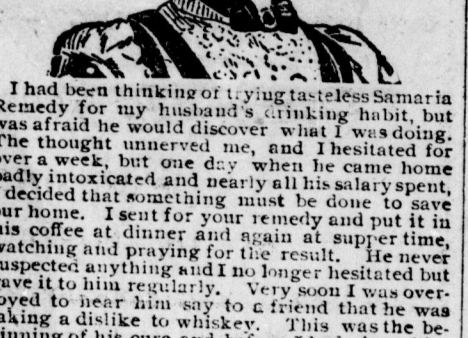

A TRIP TO THE MOON: WHAT ONE MIGHT SEE

How would you like to take a trip to the moon? It would be a long journey, taking more than six months if you went with the speed of an express train; or if you traveled with the swiftness of a ball from a modern cannon, it would take about as long as a trip across the Atlantic in a fast steamer. Under average atmospheric conditions, a large telescope gives up view of the moon as it would be without the telescope at a distance of 500 miles from us.

The necessary outfit for the journey must be much more extensive than for any trip on the earth, even the trip to the north pole. There will be no chance "to live off the country." In addition to warm clothing and food you must carry with you all you need to drink, and the problem of keeping it from freezing or thawing it out if frozen will not be an easy one to solve. There is practically no air on the moon, and you must take along a supply of oxygen. If you expect to make a fire and cook your dinner you must take, in addition to fuel, an adequate supply of air to keep your fire going.

But suppose that in some way you should land on the moon with supplies of things necessary for sustaining life. If you are on a part of the moon on which the sun is shining you will have, perhaps, first of all, at the dazzling brilliancy of the sunlight and the intense blackness of the shadows, every object in which the sun is shining will total darkness, as there is no air filled with little dust particles to scatter the

CURIOS FEATURES OF HINDOO WEDDING

GIRLS OFTEN MARRIED WITH A NECKLACE OR THALI.

In many parts of India Hindu girls are wedded, not with a ring, but with a necklace of a leading native at Madras were present among the numerous guests at Hindu marriages and here, where suits had not so far progressed to their satisfaction. While the wedding ceremony was in progress the young man suddenly went up to her, and before any suspicion was felt his object was pulled out from his pocket and quickly fastened around her neck. A correspondent, writing on the general use of the Thali, says:

"I was a guest of a Christian family in South India, which had as far departed from the ordinary rule which prevents women from appearing before strangers that the mistress of the house had deputed her young daughter to represent her at a wedding. The young lady was profusely decorated with jewelry, some of which was unique in its nature, and she had not the slightest objection to its being admired. At dinner she was suddenly struck with the absence of the wedding ring from her finger, and on my asking her the reason she shyly pointed to her neck.

"This seemed somewhat strange, but I thought that probably for some reason she had attached the ring to the chain which was wearing around her neck. I, however, saw no trace of it, and I somewhat puzzled till her husband explained that no wedding ring was used on the occasion of a marriage, but that it is substituted the Thali, to which my hostess had drawn my attention.

"Among the Dravidians of South India the Thali plays the same part as the wedding ring among the Christians in other parts of the world. No marriage is solemnized without it, and it is a small piece of gold leaf in the shape of a comb or comb, which is attached to a necklace of worsted thread or silk. The bride, who celebrates her marriages according to Hindu rites, having adopted its use, and after the sacred fire is prepared by the priest, her jewelry, including the blessings of the gods are included in the Thali, which is tied around the neck of the bride by the bridegroom.
