tors - The Investigation. Torento, April 11 .- "The Liszt Plano Co. have quietly assigned their assets to us for the benefit of the York Loan, and we are now in possession," was the statement made by an official of the National Trust Co., liquidators for the

York Loan, yestarday afternoon.

morning. An officer of the National Trust Co., iquidators of the York Loan, made an nsuccessful attempt to serve notice on

unsuccessful attempt to serve notice on Joseph Phillips of the writ that has been issued, asking that he be restrained from disposing of his Toronte Life stock. The court intimated that the writ must be served on Phillips only through his counsel.

C. E. Stacey, an inspector of the York Loan and Toronto Life, acknowledged that Phillips had given him permission to write up Toronte Life insurance as a "side line" while traveling for the York Loan. From August, 1903, to December, 1904, witness received \$2,000 to \$3,000 for writing up insurance. From Nov. I, 1904, up to the present he had received \$3,000 as commissions from the Toronto Life, besides \$20 a week salary.

Commissions Paid Stock. The 60 shares of stock on which he had paid \$1,720 had been paid out of commissions he had from the York Loan and Toronto Life, and en the 10 per cent. of his salary that had been held back by the York Loan. tence declares to be forfeited in law. Outlaws become incapable of bearing testimony; they can neither sue nor defend an action, civil or criminal; they cannot act on a jury, nor can they be appointed tutor or curator of another They, in short, cannot claim any per-sonal benefit whatever from the law. They have lost all the privileges of

ritish subjects.

The sentence of the court is also a warrant for the denunciation of the accused as a rebel, the result of which is that his movable estate is forfeited to the Crown, and if the outlaw remain for a year and a day in the condition of a rebel the profits of his heritable estate, if he have any, for his lifetime

The "denunciation at the Horn" takes place at the Market cross of Edinburgh. Three "Oyesses" are proclaimed, the sentence is read, and three blasts with a horn are given, by which the outlaw is understood to be proclaimed rebel to the King. The sentence is then fix-ed to the Market cross and thus pub-



THE VESUVIUS TERROR

Added to by the Collapse of the Market at Naples.

Twelve Dead and Over 100 Seriously Injured-Gay Spectacle In Market Place Suddenly Turned Into Scene of Horror-Volcanic Disturbances or the Increase-Fate of Children In Doubt-Brave Soldiers.

Naples, April 11.—As a result of the derrible collapse of the Mount Oliveto market yesterday morning 12 are dead, 24 are mortally wounded, and over 100 are seriously injured. When morning broke yesterday, the

outlook was promising for an ameliora-tion of the conditions consequent upon the activity of Mount Vesuvius. The hopefulness of the populace, however, was short-lived, and the Neapolitans were plunged into a condition bordering on frenzy by the collapse of the Mount Oliveto market, from the weight of cinders from Mount Vesuvius. From Life to Death.

From Life to Death.

The courtyard covers 600 feet square and was roofed. The space within was unusually crowded with buyers and their children, the accident happening at the hour of the day when trade is most brisk. Rival displays of flowers, fruits and vegetables contended for buyers while market woman account. buyers, while market-women screamed their wares and joked with their cus-tomers. Little children played about the stands, adding galety to the scene, the line of which is not to be witness-

ed outside of Naples,

warning, there was a terrifying crash

Among the dead are many children who had been sent by their parents to do the

morning's marketing.

Indignation of the people as a result of the disaster increased as each additional body was taken out, and disturbance. ances approaching a riot in importance occurred. The people loudly insisted that the authorities were aware that the roof of the market was unsafe, and that they were so excessively economical that they would not appropriate the funds necessary to repair the building. Terrifying news reached the city yesterday morning from points throughout

terday morning from points throughout the district surrounding Ottajano. The reports indicate that an enormous area is buried beneath ashes and cinders. The present disaster is looked upon as a repetition of the catastrophes to Pompeli and Herculaneum, except in this instance the loss of life is less.

carts arrived at the scene of the disascarts arrived at the scene of the disaster Monday night the soldiers arranged to have the children and aged people get into the carts, but when the vehicles had gone a few hundred feet it was found that, although there were four horses harnessed to each wagon, they could not pull their loads through the deep ashes. This caused a panic among the children, who expected to be buried in the ashes from the volcano, and they fied in all directions in the darkness and blinding rain, and have not since been heard of.

Several lade in Boscotrecase, who were unharmed when the danger following the cruptions of Mount Vesuviüs seemed most imminent, subsequently ventured to well and the venture of the several to the subsequently ventured to well and the soldiers.

The flow of lava from the volcano which had almost ceased during the night, recommenced early yesterday, and the fall of volcanic ejecta in the Vesuvian communes has been enormous. It is feared that the weight of ashes on roofs will cause the collapse of many more buildings, both here and in the towns and villages near the volcanic.

The scenes at Ottajano when the first victims were unearthed there were most horrible. The positions of the bodies showed that the victims had died while in a state of great terror, the faces being convulsed with fear.

Many tales are told of heroic rescues on the part of the soldiers sent to the assistance of the sufferers at Ottajano and elsewhere. One man rode his horse through the ashes, reaching up to its flanks, at Ottajano, calling out, "Who wants help?" He was rewarded by hearing a woman's voice reply in weak tones, and, springing from his horse, found her 'n a ruined house, with three children dead beside her. The soldier picked the woman up in his arms and carried her to a place of safety, where it was found that both her legs were broken and that she had been badly crushed about the body.

The number of dead taken from the church at San Gluseppe, which collapsed Monday, while a congregation of about 200 persons were attending mass, is 26. There were 79 severely injured.

He also recommended that Government vessels be fitted up to patrol the dangerous portions of the coast.

One-half of the warriors at Pine Ridge were selzed with the Messiah craze. They danced the ghost dance and put on the ghost shirts. The opehalf stampeded from the agency, and with it went Crazy Wolf, as savage in heart as he was when he fought the Pawnees on the frontier of Nebraska. Little Scar stayed at the agency.

One day after the battle of Wounded Knee had been fought a band of twenty Sioux braves broke away from the main body for the sole purpose of raiding Pine Ridge agency and killing the children who were gathered in the schoolhouse—the children of their brothers who had succumbed to the white man's ways. In the band was Crazy Wolf, his heart full of the lust of kill-

ng.
The warriors came within sight of the schoolhouse. It stood on a bluff and on one side was absolutely unprotected. Crazy Wolf knew the location of the room in which the little ones gathered daily at their lessons.
