THE VESUVIUS TERROR

Added to by the Collapse of the Market at Naples.

Twelve Dead and Over 100 Seriously Injured—Gay Spectacle in Market Place Suddenly Turned Into Scene of Horror—Volcanic Disturbances on the Increase—Fate of Children in Doubt—Brave Soldiers.

Naples, April 11.—As a result of the terrible collapse of the Mount Oliveto market yesterday morning 12 are dead, 24 are mortally wounded, and over 100 are seriously injured.

When morning broke yesterday, the outlook was promising, except for a vibration of the conditions consequent upon the activity of Mount Vesuvius.

The courtyard and 90 feet square and was roofed. The space within was unusually crowded with buyers and their children, the accident happening at the hour of the day when trade is most brisk.

Identification Impossible. The identification of the bodies of a number of those killed by the collapse of the market was found to be impossible, owing to their being absolutely unrecognizable.

Indignation of the people as a result of the disaster increased as each additional body was taken out, and disturbances approaching a riot in importance occurred.

The fate of many children at Ottajano is unknown. When the military carts arrived at the scene of the disaster Monday night the soldiers arranged to have the children and aged people get into the carts.

Several lads in Boscorecaze, who were unharmed when the danger following the eruptions of Mount Vesuvius seemed most imminent, subsequently ventured to climb the cooling lava.

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WRECK OF THE VALENCIA

Grounds For Censure Expressed in House of Commons.

Liberal Members Call Upon Government For Better Coast Protection—Hon. Mr. Brodeur, Minister of Marine, in Reply, Tells What Government Is Going to Do—Mr. Borden Shows Inefficiency From Liberal Statements.

Ottawa, April 11.—In the afternoon session of the House yesterday Mr. Macpherson (Vancouver) called attention to the serious wrecks that have occurred of late off the coast of British Columbia.

Mr. Brodeur's Reply. Mr. Brodeur, Minister of Marine, said a report has just been received which attributes the loss of the Valencia to the inefficiency of the captain.

Mr. Brodeur's Criticism. Mr. Borden thought it peculiar that the report upon the loss of the Valencia should only just have been received by the Minister.

Mr. Borden commented upon the wreck of the Valencia. Had the Salvor been supplied with proper boats and appliances, 75 people could have been saved.

MUNICIPAL REPRESENTATIVES APPEAR BEFORE THE PREMIER

Monster Deputation is Promised Prompt but Cautious Action Towards the Providing of Electric Power

CAREFUL CONSIDERATION OF EXPROPRIATION

Toronto, April 12.—Fifteen hundred delegates, a crowd that filled Queen street for three blocks, marched on the City Hall and Parliament Building yesterday morning.

"Cheap Power" was their watchword. Five special trains brought them to the Union Station. The trains were decorated with streamers and bunting, and each delegate wore a badge indicating what town he represented.

Amongst the members of the Cabinet present, besides the Premier, were Hon. J. J. Foy, Hon. Col. Matheson, Hon. Dr. Pyne, Hon. Dr. Reame, Hon. Col. Hendrie, Hon. Mr. Hanna, Hon. Mr. Montet, Hon. Mr. Cochrane and Hon. Dr. Wilmont.

At the Parliament Buildings. Preparations had been made for the reception of the big deputation on the steps of the main entrance of the Legislative Chamber.

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member of the Legislature a few years ago put on the journals a resolution (which was voted down) - a measure proposed to deal in a wise way with this magnificent question, regard it how you will, and I will recall the part which that hon. gentleman, and few with him, took in their earnest desire to anticipate and serve the interests of the people of Ontario.

On the position is that the Government should take up this question, consult experts upon it, decide whether or not the better plan would be for the Government to establish a plant at Niagara Falls and furnish electrical power to all the municipalities within 150 miles at cost, or whether the best plan would be to appoint commissioners and provide for a union of municipalities, but, whether one way or the other, it ought to be done.

"It is with proper humility and satisfaction, not often given to public men, that I find that the great majority of the people of this province are rallying round this very idea, expressed in practically the same words introduced several years before by myself.

"I have read here with wisdom when it was uttered, it is wisdom today. The circumstances and the various developments have changed, but I see very little, indeed nothing, to lead me to alter what I said, although there may be something which I desire to add. Naturally difficulties will be found in the way. We do not know what complications may arise between Great Britain and the United States, and the Dominion and the States, concerning the Falls. But the Government of Ontario will be day and night upon the watch in order to see that the interests of the people of this province are not sacrificed in reference to this question.

"Mr. Whitney went on to announce that the report of the hydro commission would be laid upon the table that afternoon, and that would enable them to take up that portion of that subject as soon as they had the opportunity. It was hoped that the report dealing with the eastern district would shortly be to hand. What they would have to consider would be how, in the west, most of the municipalities could be procured for the people of this province. It would be their duty to compare methods, selecting that one which may seem to have the best application towards the realization of the object they had in view.

"We will have to consider," said the Premier, "whether it will be our duty to invest from \$15,000,000 to \$25,000,000 in expropriation, and that cannot and ought not to be done without careful investigation of the probable results. This is the manner in which this question must be approached, and this is the manner in which all the gentlemen listening to me desire that this question shall be approached. Having shown that despite the years that have gone on the position is to-day exactly as it was, I repeat that we have seen no reason to recede from that position.

"We are ready to believe that as soon as we get through with our educational legislation, we should consider by what method this great power question can be settled, so that the people of Ontario can receive those rights to which they are entitled by the situation, and which will do away with the expenditure of from seventeen to twenty-five millions of dollars for coal from the United States, and which will also enable the workmen to breathe God's fresh air, free from the smoke nuisance. It is certainly the duty of the Government to step warily, so that the interests of the province may not be forfeited or injured in any way, and so that no mistakes may be made. Let our friends go away saturated with the idea that the Government of Ontario claims no patent. They are simply ordinary mortal men who, in consequence of their own wishes, have given for a certain time power to act. We look to the generous forbearance of the people of the province."

Prolonged applause ensued at the close of the Premier's speech, and with Mayor Coatsworth's thanks to Mr. Whitney for receiving the deputation, the proceedings ended.

COSTS OF CONTINGENTS.

Aggregated \$1,175,000—Collection of United States Silver. Ottawa, April 12.—The afternoon in the House was devoted to private bills and the House adjourned at 4 o'clock.

In answer to Mr. Worthington, the Minister of Militia stated that the entire cost for the first and second Canadian contingents to South Africa had been paid by the Dominion Government, and that it aggregated \$1,175,000.

Mr. Blain was informed that American silver had been collected by the banks for the Government to the extent of \$93,768.

York Loan Assets. Toronto, April 12.—Formal transfer of the property held by the City Realty Co. for the York County Loan Co. was made yesterday by Joseph Phillips at the instigation of the National Trust Co. According to the statement made by Phillips's counsel yesterday, it was nearly nine miles of frontage and is worth over a million dollars.

The National Trust got an order from Master-in-Chambers Cartwright stating that service of injunction on J. E. Jones, counsel for Phillips was sufficient, and this was carried out.

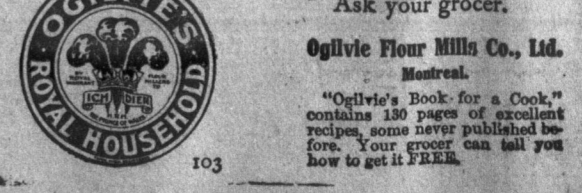
