SIR,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 8th inst. submitting for my opinion as Chairman of the Board of School Trustees for the Town of Belleville, the following questions :- "Have the Board of School Trustees power under the new School Act, 13 and 14 Vic., chap. 48, to raise money at their discretion for the purchase of school sites, and the erection of school houses. without reference to their constituents? And I have to inform you in reply, that the 3rd and 6th sub-division of section 23, of the School Act 13 and 14 Vic. cap 48 would seem to leave it wholly at the discretion of the School Trustees in incorporated towns, to determine what money it may be expedient to provide for the purposes mentioned in your letter-and the Common Council of such town are required by the 6th section to provide for the estimates made in that respect by such Trustees.
