PAPER COMPANY STARTS ABOUT MIDDLE OF 1925

Montreal.—It is anticipated that the new mills of the Newfoundland Power and PaPper Co., will be in operation by the middle of this year. Construction work has been under way since 1922. Railway yards have been installed and there are employed some 8,000. When the construction gangs leave, Cornerbrook will remain a town of, about 6,000. It will be run by the company. When completed the normal capacity of the plant will be 400 tons of newsprint per day. There are four machines, each of a 100 tons capacity and built for a width of 234 inches, These machines are designed for a maximum speed of 1,200 feet per minute, but the operating speed will be about 900.

The raw material is on the spot The raw material is on the spot. The company have the timber rights for over 2,000,000 acres which will yield at least 50 years' supply. It will require 120 tons of sulphite and 360 tons of ground wood daily to feed the machines.

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




