

Saturday was the fifth anniversary of the Battle of Loos, in which a smoke screen was first used by the Canadians to conceal their action from the Germans, and to prevent the arrival of Hun reinforcements. Heavy machine gun and artillery fire was reinforced by the heavy smoke of burning wet straw all along the Canadian line, but particularly in front of the First Canadian Division, opposite La Douve Farm.


