No mem-ber shall practice except in his own name, or under the name of some duly qualified and authorized member of the said college. No member shall practice



The total percentage was 31 per cent., by ocean ports 44 per cent., and from the United States there was a decrease of 8 per cent.


### Wm. McFarland, Who Was Burned Now Out of Danger.

### BOURASSA FAILS.

Henri Bourassa, who resigned his seal for the Commons in Labelle to contest chasse with Hon. Mr. Turgeon, of the Quebee Government, is down and out He accused Mr. Turgeon of incapacity and impropriety in the management of hi office-that of the Ministry of Lands and Mines-and the result of the controversy was Hon. Mr. Turgeon's resignation and a challenge to Mr. Bourassa to resign his seat in the Commons and become his opponent in the contest. After on the question Mr. Bourassa could hardly do less, and in the election of yesterday the judgment of the people has been obtained. Hon. Mr. Turgeon has been elected by a majority of about 800, and Mr. Bourassa is out of both Houses. In Labelle Mr. Bourassa had a majority of 1,493 at the last general election, and it is probable that he will seek re-election to the Commons there. His course since 1904, however, is not calculated to strengthen him there, and the effect of his break with the Liberal party and the efforts he has made to cause the Government embarrassment will probably be seen in the returns should he run there. The victory of Hon. Mr. Turgeon will be a sore disappoint to the Tories, who counted much on Mr. Bourassa's candidature.

#### GUILE AND SPOILS.

The army of job-hunters and the Tory patronage committee in Woodstock, which had already divided up all the offices among themselves, are not altogether happy. #### LICORICE ROOT.

We Buy Half a Million Dollars Worth a Year From Asia Minor.

Licorice root grows wild in the fields of Asia Minor, and few attempts have been made thus far toward its cultivation.

Until fifty years ago it was practially unused, says Fur News. The root grown on the Meander plains is the best in the Syria, Mesopotamia, Caucasia, Siberia or China.

The exporters of the root lease licorice bearing lands for a period of from three to five years. Digging usually begins in October, and is done by peasants, who at the end of each day deliver the root to the various depots and receive payment according to the quantity they bring.

The root is piled up and exposed to the air until about May and June. It then weighs only half as much as orig-inally, owing to the thorough drying process to which it has been subjected. The root is sorted to obtain the qualities known as "debris" and "bagatelle," both of which are highly valued.

Licorice root is shipped in bales weigh-ing about 220 pounds each, pressed by hydraulic machinery and strapped with iron bands. The United States is the principal consumer of this class of licor-ice, which is shipped there in its natural shape as raw material.


## Stortage in the Accounts of H. Aletter,

New York, Nov. 4.—Six men were arraigned in the Police Court to-day charged with robberies from the Adams Express Company, which it is alleged will aggregate between \$30,000 and \$60,000. The prisoners were Charles McCarthy and Max Pope, employees of the company, and Jacob Levy, Wolf Levy, James Zuckernan and Henry Moskowitz. McCarthy and Pope are charged with larceny and the others with receiving stolen property. The plan under which the men are alleged to have operated was a rather novel one. It is charged that when McCarthy or Pope came in possession of packages addressed to per-sons outside of New York City they pasted another address over the one on the package, sending the package to one of the four who are accused of receiving the goods. It is said that parcels worth \$6,000 addressed to the four were found at the main depot of the express company to-day. All sk prisoners were held in \$5,000 company to day. BUTTER FROM WHEY.

Cheese Manufacturers Using By-Produc With Sucess.

Toronto, Nov. 5.—Cheese factories in the province are beginning to find a remunerative use for the whey fat, which has in the past been the cause of a unisance. A number of manufacturers, according to Mr. H. A. Putnam, superin-tendent of Farmers' Institutes, are mak-ing butter from the fat contained in

tendent of Farmers' Institutes, are mak-ing butter from the fat contained in the whey, which was formerly lost. Some of the butter, which does not differ from the ordinary output of the dairy, has taken prizes over the home-made butter, and even over the product of some creameries. One factory proprietor says he has made \$1,500 worth of butter from the whey. It will be only a matter  $\rho$  fime before all the factories are utilizing it in the same manner.

TORN BY A SICK LION.

The sighting of the vessel relieves anxiety over her, since the steamer Frit-jof sighted the wreck of a four-masted bark in the Straits of Magellan August 1. From the description of this wreck it was believed to be that of the Sewall, and high premiums were offered for her reinsurance at Lloyds. Since the Arthur Sewall is safe, the mystery of the wreck which the Frit-jof s crew saw in the straits remains. The wreck lay between Cape Pillar and Noir Island, halfway between Cape Horn and Cape Pillar, off the southwest coast of Terra del Fuego. Even if the crew of the wrecked bark reached shore it would have been difficult for them to reach eivilization. 





#### JAMES FORBES LOOKS BACK OVER TWENTY YEARS.

Incidents Connected With the Trial and

Imprisonment of Birchall Recalled-The Last Interview Between Birchall and His Wife.

(Woodstock Sentinel-Review.)

"In all these twenty years, I have never yet seen a man but had some good streaks in him, no matter how bad he might be," said Mr. James Forbes, ex-turnkey of the Oxford County Jail, who in the midst of packing up, for his re-moval from the turnkey's house, receiv-ed a Sentinel-Review reporter last even-Mr. Forbes has an interesting fund of

reminiscences at his disposal relating to the prisoners who have passed through his hands. He estimates that in the twenty years he has had charge of about four thousand different prisoners. Three years after he assumed the dut-

Three years after he assumed the dut-ies of turnkey, the famous Reginald Bir-chall case stirred two continents, and the prisoner was confined in the jail for eight months. Turnkey and prisoner got to be good friends, and about once each year Mr. Forbes receives a letter from' Mrs. Birchall, who went back to England after the execution, and writes to her at the same intervals. In one letter which he showed the reporter she wondered if it were possible that "six years and three months had passed since that terrible trial." Birchall was hanged on the 14th of November, 1890. During the trial and preceding the carrying out of the death penalty, Mr. Forbes relates, now with an amused recollection, though at the time

amused recollection, though at the time "There were reporters there from all over, and they filled the whole town and
