The Cambria from Rustico, belonging to W. Hodges, Esq., was lost near Cascumpec—all hands saved.

Picked up at Covehead on Monday the 6th instant, by Captain M*Mullen of Brackley Point, a schooner called the Brothers, Andrew Holmes, master, of St. Andrews, N. B., owned by Bissett & Holmes, of that place. All hands lost. Four dead bodies were found on board, which were decently interred by some of the inhabitants of Covehead. The hull of the schooner is sound, and is now lying dismasted in Covehead harbor. On the Memorandum Book found on board, where the following names of the crew :—Andrew Holmes, Robert Mitchelf; Edward Burns, William Batson, George Trot, Thomas Bissett and Thomas Neal.

Two dead bodies came on shore last Evening at Covehead, and another at Rustico Island; from their appearance, they were American Fishermen.
