
The secret of cooking sausages is to let the skins will not burst if they are fresh.

Place them in a bakhalf pint of milk, then put one quart of ing pan in a single layer, and bake in a milk on to boil, beat the whites of six moderate oven; turn them over when boiling hot, stir in the beaten yolks, and browned. Serve with pieces of toast bethicken as you would soft custard, then the same size as the sausage, and moisten pour it boiling hot on the whites, stirring it with a little of the sausage fat. Many
