

They infect themselves in filth an decaying substances, and by carry ing the germs on their legs and bodie they pollute food, especially milk with the germs of these and other dis eases and of decay. No fly is fre

Don't Let Them Breed.

lecomposing vegetable and anima matter and excrement. They brees chiefly in stable refuse. In cities this should be stored in dark fly-pro chambers or recentacles, and should be regularly removed within six days in the summer. Farmya manure should be regularly remove within the same time, and either spread on the fields or stored at distance of not less than quarter mile, the further the better, from



When the woman was dying Miss C'Reilly sent for her husband. When he came, he brought with him a girl of fourteen, who had been put into a convent at the time of the trouble and had been brought up there.

Miss O'Reilly took the girl under her wing and started off with her toward her mother's room. The girl looked about her in surprise and said: "What a queer looking hospital." Naturally it didn't take the quick-witted commissioner long to realize what that meant. The daughter had never been told of the mother's shame and the father was still making a desperate effort to hide it from her.

Of course Miss O'Reilly tried to cooperate and the girl might never have known, if a squad of prisoners in prison garments had not come down the corridor at just that moment. The girl started and shrank back and then before the commissioner could

stop her, ran straight up to one of the squad. "What place is this?" she demanded. "This is Sherborn Prison Miss," answered the prisoner. With a cry the girl turned and ran straight back to the office. The father who had been as terribly wronged as a man could be, made up his mind to forgive and went to his wife. She sent back a message pleading with the girl to come.

As they started off in the motor ome one called after Miss O'Reilly by her prison title, "Commissioner." The woman looked up quickly What did he call you?"

"Commissioner," said Miss O'Reilly The woman thought a, moment, ' never knew but one commissioner. she said, "and she was a prison com missioner. "That is what I am," said Miss

O'Reilly, and was ready to comfort the woman. But the woman did not weep. No during the forty miles to the prison



Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 6 .- Mr. Redmond has scored again. "I have pointed to the difficulty of voting, for the budget while the conference over the veto bill was proceeding and the veto struggle held up for weeks." Mr. Four Persons Redmond once more was face to face Redmond once more was face to face with the same perplexing situation as that of some months ago namely, the impossibility of reconciling Ireland to the acceptance of the Budget unless Ireland was convinced that a strenuous and hopeful campaign against the House of Lords given as compensation. With the Veto guns silenced for the moment by the cor ference and the budget with no relief on the whiskey tax coming on im-mediately, the situation for some days was decidedly menacing. If the Government had insisted on proceeding through all the stages of the ndefinitely prolonged the conference and the pause on the veto fight, Mr. Redmond would have been obliged to yote against the budget and destroy the Government and the budget Such a step though inevitable mus brought some grave calamities such as the postponement of the fight against the Lords, the postponement of Home Rule, the exasperation of the Liberals and therefore the creation of two anti-Irish parties in British politics instead of one. There accordingly many anxious hours for Mr. Redmond in the past week. The situation has now enormously cleared. Mr. Asquith's promise of a winter session coupled with a postponement of the later stages of the budget of these sittings leaves Mr. Redmond master of the

I could not help but feel sorry for the big white man as he fell at the champion's blows. It was the most piti-able sight I ever saw. As a matter of fact I thought away down in my heart that Jeffries would be the win ner of the fight."

By the Time-Keeper.

Reno. July 4.-By George Hartling, official time-keeper:
"Time was called at 2.45. Johnson entered the ring at 2.26 and Jeffries entered four minutes later. The fight lasted 15 rounds. The time for the last round was 2.27. The fight was stopped at 3.41.

"In the 15th round there was three knock-downs. The first two of these were each of nine seconds duration. The last one was eight seconds. Then Jeffries seconds rushed in and the referee gave the decision to Johnson. There is no doubt that independent of this action Jeffries would have been counted out."

By Jack Johnson. Reno, July 4.—"I won from Mr. Jeffries because I outclassed him in every department of the fighting game. Before I entered the ring I was certain I would be the victor. In never changed my mind at any time "Jeffries' blows had no steam behind them. So how could be hope to defeat me. With the exception of a slight cut on my lower lip, which was really caused by an old wound being struck, I Am unmarked. I heard people at the ringside remark about body blows being inflicted upon me. I don't recall a single punch on the body that caused me any discom-fort. I am in shape to battle again to-morrow, if it were necessary.
"One thing I must give Jeffries credit for is the game battle he made.

He came back at me with the heart of a true fighter. No man can say he did not do his best.
"I believe we both fought fairly

There was nothing between us which him. I told him I knew he was a bear, but I was a guorilla, and would defeat him.

"For the next few weeks I shall play in vaudeville. Then I shall go to my home in Chicago to rest. I do not think I shall fight for several months because I do not know a man now who could give me a good battle. No attention shall be paid to Sam Langford's challenge by me, as I do not consider he could give me a fight that would draw."
