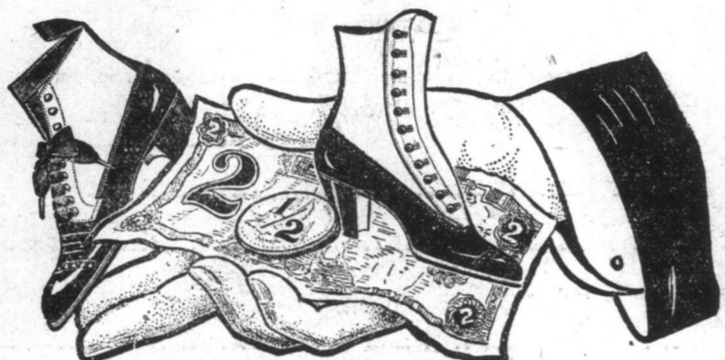

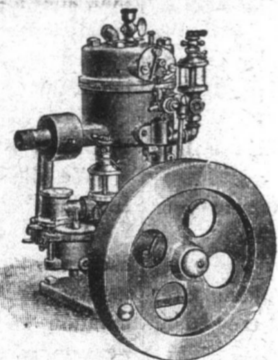

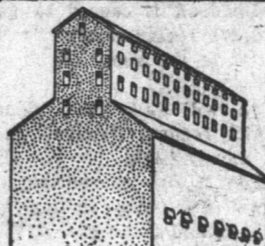

LONDON, July 6.—Brazil has definitely ordered from the Armstrong Co. a Dreadnought of 32,000 tons. The armament will consist of 12 14-inch guns and 28 6 and 4 inch guns.

MADRID, July 6.—Religious debates are raging in both Houses of Parliament. The Bishop of Madrid is leading the attack in the Senate that claimed that the laws of the church are the laws of the country, because the Constitution makes Catholicism the State religion. Canalejas, in reply, declared that the invasion of State sovereignty by the church was no longer tolerable. "I know that a conspiracy exists to accomplish my downfall," he said. "Whether it succeeds or not does not matter, as the time has come when Spain will place herself abreast of modern nations."

HONOLULU, July 6.—The release of four leaders in the recent sugar plantation strike caused great rejoicing among the local Japanese. The sentences of the four were commuted.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—At a meeting in this city of the Korean National Association resolutions denouncing the annexation of Korea by Japan have been ratified and money raised to send a cable protest to the Emperors of Japan and Korea. The Association, which has its headquarters in this city, has been very active in the revolutionary propaganda which seeks to free Korea from Japanese influence.

CAPE TOWN, July 6.—There is a widespread demand here for the prohibition in South Africa of the moving pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson fight owing to their effect on the natives. Signs are already evidenced among them of excitement on account of the victory of the negro.

NEW YORK, July 6.—Four men in a small boat, survivors of the wreck of the two masted schooner Garfield White, which sank 7 miles east of the Ambrose Channel Lightship, were rescued to-day by the Rockaway Beach life savers. The men, who had drifted about all night in their small dory, were so exhausted that they had to be carried up the beach, but were soon brought around all right.

PARIS, July 6.—A strong man has arisen in France and has come to grip with the hydra headed monster which for upward of a generation has been fattening on the nation's life-blood, growing in strength and evil till it seemed that none could affront it and live. Aristide Briand, present Premier, has dared to encounter it. He has seized the monster with both hands and for the time at least has shaken the breath out of its body. He is already hailed as a liberator, and his bold action is declared to mark the opening of a new epoch in the history of France. When a little more than a year ago Mr. Briand became President of the Council of the highest praise spoken of him was that the mantle of Clemenceau had fallen on his shoulders. For like Clemenceau he was a parliamentary socialist. Now Clemenceau has sailed for South America on a lecture tour, declaring with characteristic cynicism that he at least had not grown wealthy in politics, and M. Briand remains to struggle with that parliamentary system which proved too strong for his predecessor.

BELIEVES TRAP STOLEN.

Mr. John Wareham, sr., of Gunner's Cove, has suffered serious losses since the fishing season set in. In the big storm of a few weeks ago he lost a fine trap worth \$300 which he had set at Broad Cove, on the other side of Cape Spear. Yesterday morning on his men going there to haul another trap, which he had set in the same cove, and which was known to be filled with fish the night before they found that it had vanished, and there were evidences which would go to show that the trap was cut from its moorings by some evilly disposed persons. Twelve of the moorings and anchors and buoys were found, and are now at his premises at Gunner's Cove. It looked as if a hatchet or sharp knife was used to cut the moorings. Mr. Wareham believes that the trap was stolen by some person as his sons went out in their motor boat and surveyed miles of water but could not get a sign of it. We learn since that Robert Ware of Petty Harbor, picked up the trap this morning near there and some of the gear on it was marked with the initials J.W.M.H.N. This might be Mr. Wareham's property.

LAST PERFORMANCE.

The dominant feature of the closing performance last night in the People's Theatre was neither the play nor the players—but the attitude of the audience. "The Little Gray Lady" is a good play. The lines were well spoken, the settings were fine, and the action was smooth and easy. 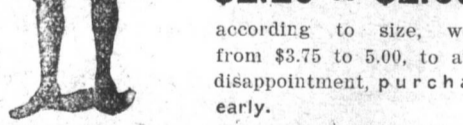

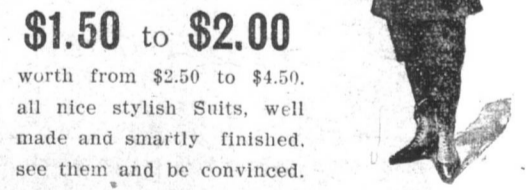

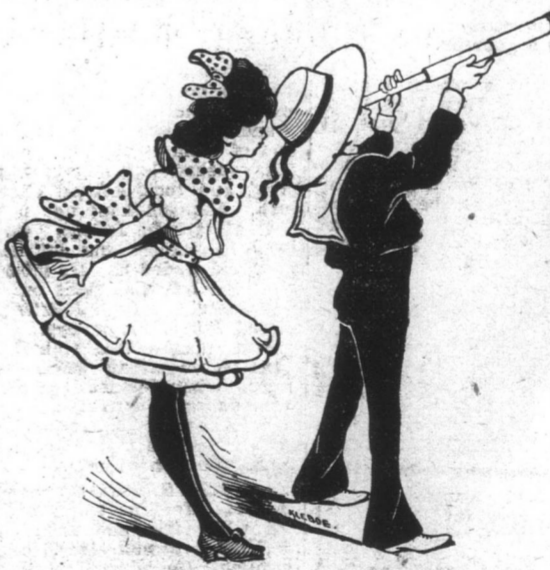
