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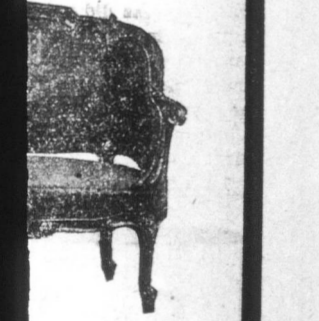

### Address to the King.

When the Legislature met for the first session of 19th General Assembly, 1901, and after the Speaker had read the Governor's Speech to the Assembly, before taking up the motion for the Address in Reply, the House proceeded to take special notice of a paragraph in the Speech that expressed an assurance that the House would "take an early opportunity of expressing your sympathy with the Royal Family in their bereavement, and your loyalty to His Majesty the King."

The references were, of course, to the demise of Queen Victoria and the accession of King Edward.

We understand that a similar course will be followed this afternoon.

In 1901, the Minister of Justice, (Hon. W. H. Horwood), who was then leading the House, moved the Address, which was seconded by Mr. Morine, who was leading the Opposition.

### Death of Mrs. Benson.

Last evening Fireman Thomas Benson, of the Central Fire Station, received a telegram from Mr. Grace announcing the death of his mother at the patriarchal age of 88 years. Mrs. Elizabeth Benson was the relict of the late Mr. William Benson, an old time planter of Harbor Grace, who fished on the Labrador for many years with the famous seal killer and merchant-planter, Capt. John Humphrey, who was his brother-in-law and of several years Mrs. Benson accompanied her husband on his voyage to the north. The deceased lady was held in the highest respect by all classes in Harbor Grace, as well as in Conception Bay generally. Like her husband, she was a native of Old Perlican, but had resided in Harbor Grace for the past forty years. Her remains will be interred in the Church of England Cemetery to-morrow, and her son, Mr. Thomas Benson, left this morning to attend the funeral. She has also left two daughters to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate mother.

### The Dreaded Black Hand.

Terrible Fate of a Woman of Great Beauty—Murdered in Naples—Crimes Mysterious and Ruthless—The Camorra Punishing Treachery.

The town of Viterbo, in Italy, about forty miles north of Rome, and three times that distance from Naples, is at the present moment the scene of a very remarkable trial. Thirty-one members of the infamous Black Hand Society, known as the Camorra, are on trial for two murders which took place nearly five years ago, one of them in Naples and the other outside

the city at a lonely spot. Almost an army of soldiers and police has been drafted into the peaceful little town. The trial is being held there on account of the renewed excitement at Naples on the reopening of the case, and the presence of large numbers of friends and sympathizers of the accused. It is a remarkable coincidence that this trial should open at the moment when London is so deeply moved by the Houndsditch crimes, which have many aspects similar to those committed by members of secret societies abroad. The history of the Italian crimes is startling in the extreme.

On the night of June 5, 1906, an Italian woman of exceptional beauty was found murdered in her bed in a house in one of the central streets of Naples. She was known to a wide

restless, with astonishment, apprehension, fear. The Camorrist leader arrested, named Erricone, a man whose reckless daring and inexhaustible cunning had alone raised him to his position of leader. He had been seen with three friends close to the scene of Cuccolo's murder, and on the same night, it was sufficient to justify his arrest. For fifty days he and the three men were kept in prison, but in spite of diligent search and inquiry no further evidence they were brought against them, and they were released. Even the populace went to cheer them as they left the hands of their custodians, and in time the two murders, of Cuccolo on the lonely road and of La Sorrentina in her bed at Naples, passed out of the popular mind. The release of Erricone and his companions did not, however, close the case, for, at any rate, one enterprising and enthusiastic Italian. This was a man named Capuzzo, a sergeant of the Carabinieri. It must be here stated that between the Carabinieri and the police of Naples there had always existed an irreconcilable rivalry. Capuzzo, in the course of his investigations, learned that in an Italian prison there was a man named Abbatemaggio, who, having been expelled from the Camorra, boasted, in revenge, that he knew the guilty hands that had done the foul murders of Cuccolo and La Sorrentina. After much questioning, threatening and other means, Abbatemaggio told a story to the effect that the Camorrist suspecting that Cuccolo was acting both for them and for the police, laid traps for him.

A Camorra tribunal held a meeting and decided unanimously, Erricone being at their head, that Cuccolo and his wife should die. Six of the most resolute of the gang were selected to carry out the dread sentence. Their plan was to waylay Cuccolo on the road, murder him, and take his keys from him and then return to Naples enter her house with her dead husband's key, and carry out the Black Hand sentence on La Sorrentina. These facts were communicated to the head of the Naples police. This man, jealous that a member of the Carabinieri had discovered them, declared that there was no truth in the story. The Carabinieri therefore determined to act on their own initiative. In short, they promptly seized every member of the Camorra who had any hand in the sentence of death passed on Cuccolo and his wife. Their action was entirely and enthusiastically supported by the people of Naples, who, but a short time previously, had cheered the released Camorrist, Erricone, who, on hearing of the proposed sentence, fled to America, was extradited, and placed in safe custody with the rest. All this was in the spring of 1907, and since then the authorities have been making the case stronger every day with fresh evidence. The case will probably last a considerable time, but it is certain that one of the greatest efforts ever made by the Italian authorities to deal once and for all with the scourge of the Camorra and its kindred hoodlums, is being developed. No less than one hundred lawyers are engaged in the case, a large number of them taking part in the defence of the thirty-one accused men.

**NINE HOUSES QUARANTINED.**

Hon. J. C. Crosbie had the following telegram yesterday afternoon from Magistrate A. Vatcher:—

"Two cases smallpox at Northern Bay; nine houses quarantined; need a doctor; will you appoint one?"

A half an hour after the message was received Mr. Crosbie had dispatched a physician, who was instructed to look after the patients, and has taken up his duties. People of the place must have had intercourse with the families where the stricken ones reside, this accounting for so many residences being quarantined. Though the disease is of a mild type every effort will be made to prevent its spreading amongst the people over there. No new cases are reported from Carbonear.

**Largely Attended.**

The funeral of Mrs. Dwyer, who died a couple of days ago at her home, Holyrood, took place Monday forenoon and was attended by a concourse of people from that place, Mr. Main, Avondale and other settlements. Before the funeral a High Mass of Requiem was chanted, the celebrant being Rev. Fr. Finn, while assisting at the sacred function were Rev. Monsignor Velch and Revs. P. S. Donnelly and Sheehan. Under the supervision of Mr. Dwyer, the late charge of the funeral arrangements had, went out by Saturday evening's train, taking a very beautiful casket, in which the remains were enclosed. The deceased lady was well known and highly esteemed in the District of Harbor Main.

**Is Doing Well.**

Mrs. Hy. Johnson, who was run down and hurt by Dr. Duncan's horse and some ribs broken with severe injuries to her face, is doing well in hospital. Mr. Johnson asks us to convey the report published by a contemporary that the accident was caused in a great measure by defectiveearing on the part of his wife. He says that her sense of hearing is perfect and that the unfortunate affair falls heavily upon him.

**Earth Frozen Up.**

The Council's men and others who had occasion to open up the earth for repairs to pipes and mains say that the frost has penetrated to a depth of four feet. This they say is due to the lack of snow, a couple of feet of which would shelter it and keep the frost from going so far down in the soil. Farmers would have welcomed a good snow fall in the early part of the winter to protect the ground from the frost, which tends to kill the young roots and must have a detrimental effect on grass and hay crops.

**Doyle Victimized a Second Time.**

People from the Goulds reported yesterday that Mr. James Doyle who lives alone in a house near the Goulds bridge, was the victim of another larceny Monday, when \$6 was stolen from his trunk kept in his room. He is absent from home when the larceny was committed, and on investigating found that a boy of the neighborhood had obtained a key which fitted his trunk, and gaining access to the house opened the receptacle and stole the cash. ST. PETERSBURG, RUSSIA.

Pantchenko, whose speciality has been the treatment of undesirable relatives, has been brought out to-day's session of trial of how he secured the sentence of death. The admission brought out in connection with testimony of medical witness Pantchenko, in connection with the case of de Lassy, is charged with the murder of de Lassy's brother-in-law, Bouturlin, the heir to a fortune which it is alleged de Lassy had for his wife.

**RUSSIAN DOCTOR'S SPECIALTY WAS POISONING.**

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 3. — Dr. Pantchenko, whose speciality he admits has been the removal by poisoning of undesirable relatives and enemies of those who could pay his fee, trial of how he secured his instruments of death. The admissions were brought out in connection with the testimony of medical witnesses.

Pantchenko, in common with Count de Lassy, is charged with the murder of de Lassy's brother-in-law, Count Bouturlin, the heir to several millions which it is alleged de Lassy coveted for his wife.

Dr. Henrich, a veterinary employed at the Post Laboratory in Kronstadt, testified that the poisoner twice visited the Laboratory, where he obtained several tubes of cholera ondo-toxin which he represented were required for scientific purposes.

At this point Pantchenko explained to the court that de Lassy had furnished him with money for the trip to Kronstadt, and he added that he gave the tubes of poison to the Count.

Dr. Seabolotny, the plague expert who recently returned from an inspection of China, was then called. He testified that Pantchenko had applied to him for diphtheria germs.

The witness gave him diphtheria in a fluid form. Later on he ascertained that the fluid lacked killing power, but this was unknown to Pantchenko.

Then the counsel asked the prisoner what he did with the fluid and the latter replied that he threw it away.

Another to whom Pantchenko went for poison was Dr. Zharshovaki. The latter being called, testified that the doctor came to the Institute of Experimental Medicine and asked for diphtheria toxin. The witness gave him several assay tubes and told him the minimum non-fatal dose.

The presiding Judge interrupted to inquire what Pantchenko did with

this supply of poison. For a moment there was the first silence in the court room as the notorious murderer hesitated. Finally he evaded the question, saying that he would reply to it later.

The result of the autopsy and a microscopic examination of the internal organs from the body of Bouturlin were then laid before the court.

**Death by Poisoning.**

The public prosecutor addressing the four medical experts, asked whether they could determine the

death as revealed in the autopsy on the body of Count Bouturlin speaks of death by poisoning. The poison employed could have been diphtherial toxin. If the blood infection had been due to the use of an unsterilized hypodermic needle the picture of the illness and death could have been very different.

Throughout the report of the experts, Pantchenko's face lost its color and heidgetted nervously in his chair as he watched them. The prisoner's

The professors retired for a consultation. A half hour later they returned to the court-room and Professor Tchistovitch, on behalf of himself and colleagues, said:

"The picture of the malady and agitation heightened when the prisoner announced the result of medical evidence. In addressing the presiding Judge said:

"Pantchenko during the trial postponed his explanations until the testimony of the medical experts had been concluded. Perhaps Pantchenko will find it possible to answer the question whether he infected diphtherial toxin into Count Bouturlin."

## Bear's Fight for Liberty.

New York Zoo Keeper's Triumph Through Chloroform—Polar Trip Sequel.

A giant Polar bear brought to New York by Captain Bob Bartlett put up a big fight for liberty.

Captain Bartlett is the Englishman who went nearest to the North Pole with Commander Peary, and since then he has made another trip to the Arctic with Paul R. Rainey and Harry Whitney, the American sportsman. This bear is described as weighing nearly a ton and standing eight feet high on its hind legs. It is undoubtedly the biggest bear in captivity.

With dogs to distract the animal's attention, he was captured on an ice floe in the Arctic. Rainey, operating from the right flank, lassoed the bear, who has been christened Silver King, and Whitney working from the left flank, swung his rope simultaneously. All hands of the hunting party were requisitioned. It was a sort of tug-of-war between Rainey's and Whitney's teams, both pulling in opposite directions, the main object being to pull the struggling and desperate captive from the ice floe into the water.

This manoeuvre was accomplished, and by means of a derrick the animal was finally hoisted on board. He lay in the hold, starving for a few days, and was at length tempted into a strong cage, where provisions had been placed.

At New York, however, Silver King made his last struggle for liberty, and was not subdued until five pounds of chloroform had been placed into his cage. The latter was swung successfully from the ship into the pantech-nicon, the bear growling and protesting, flinging himself against the bars at the sides of the cage all the time.

A large crowd had assembled at the ship's side, says the Telegraph correspondent. Suddenly, when twenty keepers from the Zoo were congratulating themselves, the giant bear succeeded in getting his paw through the back of the cage, and in a few minutes would probably have freed himself.

A race now ensued for two-inch planks and nails. The Zoo keepers fought the battle with hammers and nails against the teeth and claws of Silver King. As the bear gashed and ripped they boarded him in, closing up the holes as fast as he could make them. Suddenly, while the Zoo laborers rested, the bear's massive head with his red tongue rolling out like a dog's, and his big amber eyes blazing, shot from a hole in the roof.

The Zoo keepers swiftly hammered the bear over the head with an iron bar, and in a second half a dozen men, with boards and hammers, were on the roof, ready to close the hole. The bear, however, was too quick for them, and he rose up, and the men fairly fell off the roof.

Then the Zoo curator, while the keepers piled the creature with iron bars, and policemen stood around with big revolvers, keeping the crowd back, had a sudden inspiration. He dashed away on his motor car, ransacked several druggists' stores, and returned with five pounds of chloroform. He saturated lint with four pounds of the opiate, and forced it into the cage, every hole of which was now closely covered with canvas, and Silver King succumbed very speedily to the Zoo. Mounted policemen went in front, and more mounted policemen in the rear. The Zoo keepers rode on the top of the pantechnicon, and the Zoo curator courageously stuck to the bear's cage, and at intervals renewed doses of an anaesthetic.

By the time the Zoo, several miles distant, was reached, the bear was more dead than alive, so he was easily transferred to a big cage, where he was welcomed by several other natives of the frozen North.

London, Jan. 31.—Sir John Jackson, the head of the firm of John Jackson & Company, contractors, has signed a contract with the Turkish Government-General of Bagdad, on behalf of the Ottoman Government, for the construction of a great dam at the Hindu section of the Euphrates. The dam is part of the scheme for the irrigation of Mesopotamia.

## PREFERRED SUICIDE TO POORHOUSE.

Detroit, February 1.—Preferring death to the poorhouse, to which he was to have been sent to-day, Frederick Scott, 80 years old, of Kalamazoo, committed suicide with a shotgun yesterday.

Scott came to Michigan from Sorel, Que., several years ago, to stay with a son, who died recently, leaving the father without means.

Pieces of eight, with which every reader of "Robinson Crusoe" is familiar, are also in circulation. They are simply Spanish dollars of eight reals. A doubloon dated 1787—there are said to be only six of that date in existence—sold a year or six ago for \$6,200.—New York Press.

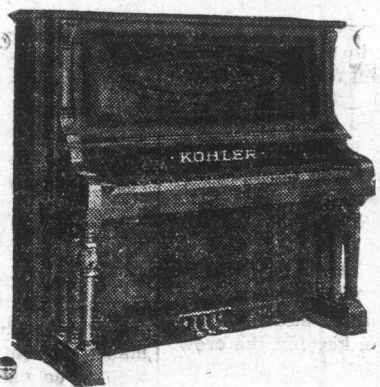



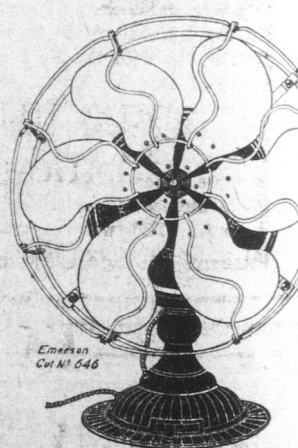
