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

If few beans, either lima or string have been left over, make them into a salad, add a few chopped olives, a few capers and some Spanish red pen per. French dressing is preferable to mayonnaise.

A tablespoonful of warm olive oil or camphorated oil poured into the ear and held there for a few minutes will lestroy a bug in the ear, and it will hen easily pour out, bringing with it he dead insect.

Browned flour makes delicious prown gravies. Put it in a pie plate and set on top of the stove or in very hot oven. When it begins to prown it should be constantly stirred intil brown all through.

In ironing the plait of the back o shirtwaist on which tiny buttons are ewed, try laying it on a flannel or neavy Turkish towel, as you do your mbroidery. The buttons sink in as he material is ironed.

When beating white of egg for ponge cake, when it becomes dry and ight, test its stiffness by turning the lish containing it upside down. If it is beaten to the proper point not a particle will become detached.

A delicious little appetizer for the supper table consists of large queen olives cut in half, and with the stones replaced with caviare paste. One is served to each person, on a lettuce leaf garnished with narrow sections of
