from Austria by Italy. LONDON BUDGET. LONDON, Aug. 23. German naval reverses in the Gulf of Riga and the Baltic Sea, German success in occupying the fortress of ossowetz, and the British naval bompardment of the German naval base at Zeebrugge, to-day furnished a seres of news features which tempor arily diverted attention from the gravity of the issues growing out of the sinking of the Arabic. The German version of the Riga battle has not yet been given out, but the definiteness of the official Russian repor on the sinking or crippling of the German battle cruiser Moltke, two other cruisers and eight torpedo boats, has set a wave of enthusiasm hroughout the country, and dispelled the depression over the Russian re treat on land. Aside from the loss of German ships, the naval engagement is regarded as chiefly important for its strategic effect upon the land operations, the German sweep eastward toward Petrograd, military observers

now consider as having been checked and possibly irreparably defeated. The German centre has pressed forward steadily, until Prince Leopold of Bavaria is now near the Russian new line of defence, but military observers say the entire campaign hinged on the vast enveloping movement of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's forces north. They had succeeded in pushing far beyond Riga, to Jacob staat on the Dwina, but the Russians hold on the Gulf of Riga and of the great naval base of Riga, which is a continual menace to Von Hindenurg's rear. This, the military observers say, led to the shifting of a number of German capital ships, in-cluding the Moltke, from the North Sea to the Baltic, with the purpose of controlling Riga, thus protecting the German land advance to Petrograd The result of the naval battle, as gleaned from the official report, appears definitely to have defeated the German objective, according to the observers, who say that aside from the loss of the ships, the Gulf and na-val base of Riga being still in Russian hands, menace Von Hindenburg's further advance toward Petrograd. The capture of the German fortress of Ossowetz gives them another stronghold, only Grodno and Brest Litvosk remaining in the central section. It also gives them the main point on the railway to Biclak and Brest Litovsk. Special reports from Petrograd indicate that the Russian position at Brest Litovsk is gradually becoming untenable, and that the public is being prepared for its abandonment. Only meagre details have been received concerning the British combardment of the German submarine base of Zeebrugge and neighboring points on the Belgian coast. Ber lin report forty British warships were engaged in it, but the British Admiralty as yet has made no statement. Firing lasted several hours, German heavy artillery answering the British





AMERICA'S WAITING GAME.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Four days have passed since the German submarine sunk the White star liner Arabic, with the loss of two merican lives. The American Govial information necessary to shape is course. The only notable developnent to-day was a break in the official silence which surrounded the White House. Secretary Tumulty, after conferring with President Wilson, issued this statement: "As soon as all the facts regarding the Arabic are ascertained, our course of action will be determined." Secretary Lansing declared all information so far in the hands of the State Department was fragmentary, that details still were being sought. While the situation still was awaiting one, official quarters reflected the strain which grows hourly, as no word comes from the German Government. The opinion of the State Department officials is that it is not now incumbent upon the American Government to ask Germany for an excuse for the conduct of the submarine commander who sunk the Arabic.

SAW STREAK OF TORPEDO.

Captain Wm. Finch of the sunken White Star liner Arabic last night gave the Associated Press a statenent, bearing on cabled reports of ome German officials, who claimed there was no proof the Arabic had been sunk by a German submarine and that she might have met disaster by running into a British mine. "There is not the slightest doubt the Arabic was sunk by a torpedo," said Captain Finch. Neither is there the slightest doubt it was fired at the Arabic deliberately. Quite true we never saw any submarine or any pericone but I saw the white streak made by the passage of the torpedo through the water, white streak that ommenced with air bubbles in the water 300 yards from us at a point where it was discharged at us. There was no mistaking the cause of that white streak which ended in a tor-nedo entering the ship and causing the explosing which sank the vessel. I was not alone in seeing it, the Chief Officer, Second Officer and many pas-sengers saw it. No one can doubt for a moment that it was deliberately fired at the Arabic. Those aboard the submarine evidently saw us and got into position ready to release the tor-The fact that nobody on the Arabic saw a submarine may be easi ly explained. Those in command of could submerge and leave only a small portion of the periscope show-ing above water. When the missile was sent at us under such circumstances it would be impossible for those on the Arabic to see either the submarine or periscope. The sugges-tion that a mine caused the explosion is perfectly absurd. I repeat there was only one thing that sent the Arato the bottom and that was a torpedo which left a clear white mark in he water 300 yards in length. Capt Finch was seen at his home in Liverool. He was in conference with the officials of the White Star Line, be-ore making the statement, and laughed heartily at the claim of some German officials that a British mine night have sunk the Arabic. THE NAVAL FIGHT IN THE GULF OF RIGA. LONDON, To-day.

Naval operations in the Gulf of Riga is described in a semi-official statement combat between the old Russian battleship Slava and German dreadnoughts. The importance of this fight the statement says consisted in preventing the Germans for a certain ime from forcing our position. Calm, foggy conditions favoured the enemy's operations, enabling him to escape our observation and proceed more quiety with the work of mine destroying. The operations nevertheless cost the Germans some vessels and one cruis-er which blew up our mines. On the night of the 17th the enemy sent into the Gulf two of his best torpedo boat destroyers to attack the Slava, which had prevented his operations at dawn. These boats unable to find the Slava but while proceeding in the region of their squadrons encountered our tor-pedo boat destroyer Movik which immediately engaged them. After twenty minutes fierce fighting, the leading enemy torpedo boat had her funnels demolished and suffered severe damage, which compelled her to take to flight. The other torpedo boat which went to the assistance of her consort also gave up the fight and soon after-wards a more seriously damaged vessel apparently sank. It is reported that in addition to the German losses, between the 16th and 22nd, already announced, in official communications another German auxiliary cruiser was sunk. The Slava, a vessel of 13516 tons, was laid down in 1902

COAL MINE SITUATION. LONDON, To-Day.

The decision of Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, who cted as arbitrator on numerous dis-outed questions in the South Wales coal strike, was announced last even-ing. A despatch from Cardiff indiates his decision is likely to meet with vigorous opposition from the miners. The decision is highly techical, but a number of the miners emands relating to working conditions, hours of labor and arbitrations are rejected, although wage conces the miners' leader, telegraphed from Cardiff to Runciman that settlement was impossible; even if the leaders ccepted it the workmen who do not benefit by it would refuse it, and they can hold up the whole field. Runci man has taken away what David Lloyd George and Arthur Henderson promised the miners and brought about a dangerous crisis. One of the principal disputed points was whether any icrease in wages granted at the present time was to be regarded merel as a war bonus and as a permanen adjustment. Mr. Runciman decides that the new agreement is applicable only to abnormal conditions prevailing during the war and is not intended to form a precedent or to apply t normal times.

NO WORD OF STEFFANSON.

NOME, Alaska, To-day. The United States coast guard cut-cer, which carried mails to Point Barrow, the most northerly point in Alaska, returned here last night, reporting that no word of Steffanson, the explorer, and his two companions has been received. The belief is growing that all three perished.

BERLIN APOLOGGIZES.

LONDON, To-day. The Danish Legation at Berlin, Copenhagen, has received from the German Secretary of State, a note containing an apology and expressions of sincere regret for violation of neutrality involved in an attack upon a British submarine within the territorial waters of Denmark.

For the interest of the public I am writing a short account of our jour-ney from Stob's, in the South of Scotland, to Aldershot in the South hundred miles. Unfortunately most or our journey was done during the would have added interest to this nar-

At 6.30 p.m. the advance guard of the Newfoundland Regiment, consisting of fifty-eight men, including two Sergeants, a Corporal and three Lance Corporals, under command of Capt. Rowsell and Lieut. H. Rendell entrained at Stob's Station to begin their journey to Aldershot. There was a little bustle at first but in a few minutes all was settled and we were As we are still amongst scene familiar to us, I will give you a de scription of the cars and how we were placed. We took up the two rear cars on the train, each car is divided into eight small compartment able to seat eight persons; in each there are two seats well cushioned and comfortable. As we had our equipments, rifles, kit bags and rolls of blankets, with us, we were to sit four in a compartment; though we got six in ours we were not crowded. 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


