



Unfortunately neither the late nor the present Government did any such thing. They are both altogether too short-sighted.





By whose authority did that person gain access to official and confidential military documents? Is any arresponsible person allowed to exam ine these documents. (and if these why not others) at the Militia Department? How long has this prac tice been in vogue and for how mu onger will it continue?

The real advantage of longer bouts is that they make for the use of ring generalship. It requires little headwork to carry a boxer over eight or ten rounds. Only one gait is required for the short dashes. But in boxing twenty rounds one must constantly guard against becoming exhausted and that is where headwork counts.

A boxer who knows how to feint properly can keep a less skilful op-ponent working at top speed, while he himself is resting. The long distance boxer learns to make no false or unnecessary movement. Every move he makes is the result of a well thought out plan of action. He cannot afford to swing wildly on the chance that he may happen to land a knockout, because if he fails it means that he is left in an exhausted condition with many rounds to go.



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
