WELSH HARD COAL HOTTER THAN U.S. Less Ash and Much Better Heat, Says Ottawa. GREAT DIFFERINCE

Six Tons of Welsh Gives Same Heat as Seven Tons U.S. Coal.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.-That the Welsh Anthracite delivered already in Ottawa has a much lower ash content and a much higher heating value than American anthracite received in this country for the past few years, that it is a true anthracite but breaks easier on handling and produces more fines than past few years, that it is a true anthracite but breaks easier on handling and produces more fines than Pennsylvania anthracite coal, are the summarized results of an analysis of samples of Welsh coal submitted to John McLeish, director of the mines branch of the Dominion Government for testing. The report of the analysis is signed by R. E. Gilmore, chief engineering chemist, and B. F. Haanel, B.Sc., chief of the division of fuels and fuel testing.

An equal quantity of the lump and "fines", or dust, as some Ottawans who have received a delivery of the Welsh anthracite are disposed to call it; were submitted to the director of mines for testing.

From the analysis given and from conversation with an official of the testing branch, it is claimed that the fires have excellent beating properties and should be extramely expressed.

have been used burning the Welsh anthracite has practically 10 per cent. less ash and about 10 per cent. The British thermal unit is the amount of heat required to raise the temperature of a pound of water one degree. Under this test it is found that the calortic value of the Welsh anthracite is given as 14,860 as compared with 12,490 for Pennsylvania anthracite "as received," or 15,200 for Welsh as

compared with 13,000 for Pennsylvania when dried at 105 degrees Centigrade.

According to these tests therefore the Welsh authracite has from 17 to 19 per cent. more heat producing properties than that from Pennsylvania, so that six tons of Welsh anthracite should produce as much heat as seven of the Pennsylvania coal.

THE FIRST CABLED MESSAGE.

Two weeks after. Ripley reached St. John's and took this old-timer un- choker collar and cuffs and down the der his wing as Secretary and operator to be-and we left for the mine in the Telegraph steamer "Victoria," Captain Stephen Sluyter. The passage was a pleasant one of thirty hours, and when we entered the Bay, Sluyter kindly pointed out some of the notable harbors on the route-Pinch Gut, Famish Gut, Haystack and Cock-Eye. Arrived at LaManche 8 p.m., and were boarded by 20 Cornish miners, in full forehead and sidelights and giving off a full perfume of genuine Jamaica. In three weeks after, John Murphy (Capt. John of Cape Race notoriety) had the branch line built! and office in working order. Things worked very satisfactorily and checks were large. About 9 a.m. August 5th, 1858 three gents of the Cable Staff, Knight, Smythe and Hoye, arrived from Bay Bulls Arm, laden with telegrams, for the cable fleet had arrived there the evening before. Capt. M. D. Field hugged each in turn, and





### Kemal Pasha's Victory

Mustapha Kemal Pasha has change ed the whole world-outlook by a-mass terly turning of the tables in Ana tolia. At the end of July the Greeke were proposing to occupy Constanti nople in order to force peace with Turkey; at the end of August, Kemal Pasha delivered at Afium Karahissen the first of a series of smashing blows at the Greek positions in Asia Minor. and by the middle of September the Greeks had been driven even from Smyrna, three parts of which have been consumed by incendiary fires. Kemal Pasha has converted the unratified Treaty of Sevres into a scrap of paper, and the dreams of Greece have ended in tragedy and disaster, opening the resibilities, though it is hoped not the wobability, of a new war in South-Eastern Europe. Kemai Pasha's future movements, unless his hand is forced, depend no doubt on what Great Britain and France may do. Neither wants war, but Great Britain promptly sent naval and military reinforcements to the Dardanelles. Anzac memories make Gallipoli sacred ground, and the response of Australia and New Zealand to the British Government's inquiry whether they would wish to lend a hand if the worst should happen, was instant. Kemal's terms are the evacuation of Constantinople and the restoration of Thrace, including Adrianople. The Allies insist that whatever else is conceded the Straits must be free. What Kemal demands is practically what the Indian Government suggested in March last in the telegram which led to Mr. Montagu's resignation. Moslem views have been re-stated with emphatic 'brevity in messages to Lord Reading and Mr. Lloyd George. This new anxiety has for the moment eclipsed interest in the question of German reparations and Allied debts. To save Germany from collapse, she has been given time to the end of the year. Her Treasury Bonds maturing at six months, with due guarantees, will be accepted. Needless to say, Germany is watching events in the Near East closely, and in no direction is the failure of the Allies to impose their will on the vanquished in the war likely to have a greater repercussion than in Berlin.-United Empire.
