On Saturday he was sentenced to twelve years in the county prison, and to pay a ine of \$12,700—a heavy punishment but not a whit heavier than this prince of swindlers deserves. The

Judge Davis sentenced the prisoner on every four counts in the entire 204 counts in the indictnent. One year was inflicted for every four of the first 62, or twelve years' imprisonment in the county gaol in Ludlow ***rect.
