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portion of the frozen deep which lies be-tween the northern coasts of Siberia and the Pole. It was in the latter part of August, 1872, that the *Tegetthoff* was last seen in a violent storm, off the Is-lands of Nova Zembla, and since then no word of her fate has reached Europe, either through the whalers whose track she might be expected to cross, or the Siberian tribes with whom her boat and sledge parties it was hoped would com-mitmicate during the winter of 1872-73. The region which she attempted to ex-plore has been memorable for three centuries by deeds of heroism and endur-ance. Capt. Weyprecht intended to double the icy cape at the north end of Nova Zembla, and seeking the open wa-ter supposed to lie on the east side of the islands, push eastward till he reached the Pacific. That is precisely the course which the sturdy Dutch navigator Wil-jiam Barentz laid down for himself two hundred and eighty years ago; and the story of his sufferings, his courage, and his death forms one of the most interest-ing chapters in the history of the earlier Arctio voyages. Barentz, seeking a route to Cathay by way of the Sea of Kara. was wrecked on Nova Zembla, ra on Saturday, 15th inst., and accorded a grand reception by ty Council. The next summer he and his men took to their hoats a in desperate effort to reach the European continent, and after a long voyage twelve of the crew arrived at a Russian settlement, but Barentz died on the way. Only three years ago a Norwegian whaler found the hut, built in 1595, on the scene of the wreck, and brought away numerous relies of that ancient expedition.



The village school house is of brick, and fitted up in the most approved man-ner, the latest acquisition being a set of new maps. It is divided into two de-partments. The senior department is presided over by Mr. Petric, who has taught here for the last seven years and is considered a very good tacher. The junior department is under the care of Miss Wallis, who has given good satis-faction. The average attendance in winter is over one hundred, and in sum-mer over fifty. This village is situated in the midst of a fine agricultural country. The settlers are principally Scotch from Aberdeen-shire, with some English and a few Gormans. They have good farms, and a look at their houses, barns, &c., shows they are doing what is called a proitable farming-business. The greater part of the township was settled by the descend-ents of the Pennsylvanian Dutch and Germans, who are all hard workers. In Woolwich and Waterloo townships, which are now old, there is more bush standing than is to be found in some of our new townships ; hardly a farmer has less than 20 acres of bush land.

The people along the line have had great patience, but it is now all but exhausted, and their condemna-tion of the shiftless, dilly-dallying policy of the Company is expressed in the strongest language. They have been most unjustly dealt with, and greavously disappointed in their expectations. We trust for the sake of the section of country throuch which this road runs' that this last difficulty will soon be removed and that the Great Western Railway Company, for the sake of their own interests, will make arrangements for opening it at an early day.

The United States and Canada. It has often been remarked of late that quite a change is observable m the sentiments of the people of the United States in reference to Canada, the sentiments of the people of the United States in reference to Canada, especially m regard to their now all but vanished dream of the annexation of the Dominion to the Republic. They have now-with but fow excep-tions—a better and more correct appreciation of our present position and future prospects. We now search in vain for the bluster and bombast which once formed the staple of the stump speeches across the line, and even the New York *Herald* has ceased threatening to gobble us up if we do not annex ourselves. 'As an evidence of this change of sentiment, we give the following conclusions arrived at by an intelligent American, who was present at the late meeting of the Dominion Board of Trade, at St. John, N. B., and who, after hearing the speeches delivered on that occasion, and mixing with the mer-chants and business men from all parts of the Dominion, forme the following pretty accurate estimate of our position, which he embodies in a letter to the N. Y. Tribune:-

Tribine :--"A review of the situation after a week of profitable and certainly delightful as-sociation with the most intelligent and successful business men and entizens of Canada leads no to these conclusions : " 1.
