Water for Lawns. A motion by Ald. Wm. Ross that the city engineer be asked to submit a report to the council as to the reason why the supply of water is so short that citizens are forbidden to it for their lawns in daytime. Mr. Child explained to the council that this matter could easily be remedied by finishing the reservoir, which could then

filled at night, when there was not such a drain on the supply manufacturing purposes. There was also a waste of 2,000,000 gallons daily at the power house. If the reservoir were rip-rapped and the earth dams ted it would have a capacity of 16,000,000 gallons and could be filled during the night.

The local improvement bylaw as finally passed provided: 1. That when sewers are constructed along any street the property fronting on said street shall pay such proportion of the cost as may be determined by the several bylaws on the basis of a ten inch sewer, and that the city shall pay the proportion determined by the bylaw and also any extra cost above that of a ten-inch sewer.

2. Every corner lot which faces on two streets shall be entitled to an exmption of one-half the frontage on each street, the amount of exemption to be paid by the city at large.

3. The four corner lots at the interection of two streets shall each pay one-fourth of the cost of that portio of the pavement lying between two lines drawn across each street continuous with the property line.

4. That where the street railway is constructed along a paved street or avenue the said railway shall charged with the extra cost of the pavement required for the construction of said railway. There was considerable discussion on

His muse has failed him always. There is no need of mincing words about Mr. Austin. A man o who has whiten some respectable verse, he has so borne himself in the office thrust upon him by Lord Salisbury's government, as to justify the idea that post laureate nowadays is an anachronism. Even an anachronism may have a beauty of its own and a fair share of dignity, too. But Mr. Austin's "occasional" verses are never beautiful and rarely dignified.

O, loyal to the royal in thyself, And loyal to the land, as this to thee Bear witness that rememberable day. The advent of the Danish bride stirred. Tennyson to verses of undying charm, but Edward himself was not the sort to impel the minstrels to song. Perhaps he had all the qualities of his forebears on his mother's side-Plantagenet, Tudor and Stuart-which, if he had been born in another age, would have made him the glorified theme of poetry. It is doubtful if any English king ever looked better on horseback. The blood of great warriors flowed in his veins. But he was a man of the modern world and a peaceful epoch, fond of sport and dress and social gayety, with no visible heroic side. The onoration poetry fell far short of the mark. William Watson's ode was eloquent only with the expression of the doubts and distress of the Little Englander.

Nevertheless, there must be some thousands, of poets in .Great Britain who could turn out something more fitting to the sad occasion of the king's death than Austin's "The Truce of God." What contributor of verse to the odd corners of daily newspapers would care to father this hopeless passage-For peace he wrought,

His constant thought eing how to shield his realm against

strife's baleful star. Mr. Austin's perennial thought "being how" to earn his wages by produc-ing acceptable verse to suit great national occasions, he ought by this time to have skill enough to avoid that "being how." 


