United States Must Grant More Liberal Treatment or Expect Retaliation.

He found that Manchuria, especially in the Laopo valley is very fertile and with a dense Chinese population. Much money, the consul says, is being spent between Vladivostock and Port Arthur in the erection of many permanent buildin the erection of many permanent buildings. None of these buildings, however, are on the east of the China railway as has been reported. Traffic between Vladivostock and Port Arthur is very heavy, calling for the operation of thirty trains daily.

London, Dec. 11.—Sir William Vernon Harcourt, speaking to his constituents at Tredegar tonight, drew a parallel between a speech delivered in Birmingham in 1885 by Joseph Chamberlain and the present policy of the former colonial secretary. "In 1885," said Sir William, "Mr. Chamberlain spoke as follows: It is improbable that the working classes of this country will ever again submit to the sufferings inflicted by the corn laws. If this is the policy of the Tories, we have only to recall the history of the time when protection starved the poor and the country was brought to the brink of revolution."

Sir William said he would leave Mr. Chamberlain with his present and his "topical conscience," and deal with that gentleman's immediate policy.

He did not think it was worth while to take up time with Mr. Balfour's plan. The government this time was nothing that could really be called a recommendation.
