Is it because we compel our ministers to be engrossed in departmental drudgery? If so, a remedy is needed, for ministers are only ministers because they are politicians, and it is not fair to expect men to be it is not fair to expect men to be civil servants and commanding poli-

civil servants and commanding politicians as well.
"Perhaps it is because the people, acquiescing in the increased facility of the press, have become accustomed to obtain their political food from writings, and do not demand the direct utterances of party leaders. If this be so, it is not wholly satisfactory. It is quite obvious that in Ontario the understandings and collaboration between great parliamentarn between great parliame for virile and definite politics, largely a thing of the past.

The Party and the Press.

"It is said by some that great newspapers do not care to be tied up to party; that the party paper is not a money-maker. If this view is correct we have no right to quarrel with any more than we would criticize any other man for the way he conducts his business. But the result is that the slashing newspaper article must be dispensed with. Editorials will be laden with caution, and items of po-litical news written with a view to litical news written with a view to acceptation by the opponent as well as the friend. The ardent party-man will find himself bereft of the strong meat required by a taste for fair invective. If he depends on his newspaper alone, he may fast become indifferent to the joys of party conflict. Therefore it seems to me that there

Dealing first with the cost of plants, it would be interesting to learn why the system at Windsor, with 698 telephones, should cost \$35.00 per phone more than that of Toronto's 12,832 telephones; \$30.00 more than Winnipeg with 4121 telephones; or \$55.00 more than London. Ont., with 1930 telephones. Or again, why the plant at Calgary, with 460 telephones, could be built for \$59.40 per telephone, when St. Johns, Que., with 300 telephones, cost \$94.58; and that in Cornwall, Ont., with 274 tele-

phones, \$116.72. Comparisons of Cost. Taking the cost of maintenance and operation, per telephone for 1904, it is difficult to understand why in Windsor 698 telephones cost \$37.00 per phone, per annum, St. Johns, with 300 telephones. \$33.71, and Lethbridge with 113 telephones, \$36.83; when Toronto's 12.-832 telephones cost only \$29.22, Winnipeg's 4121 telephones, \$30.22, and London's 1930 telephones, \$20.31 each per annum. Or to make closer comparisons, why in St. Johns 300 telephones should cost \$33.71 each, when Cornwall's 274 telephones cost only \$20.56 each; or why in Lethbridge 113 telephones should cost \$36.83 each, when Winona's 85 telephones cost only \$13.69 each per annum. You will also notice that the rates at Windsor vary from \$20 to \$35 per annum, while the cost of operation and maintenance is \$37 per phone. 



THE LESSON OF JAPAN.

With the awakening of Japan, and particularly since the recent war with Russia, came the determination of the Japanese to do for themselves what | they had largely been employing the ndustrial nations of the west to do for them. Altho densely populated, Japan was in this respect in a similar situaon its career. The statesmen of Japan perceived the necessity that existed for the nation to become self-contained and to become as independent as possible of the outer manufacturing world. They saw also that native industries could only be fostered by a protective duty and by liberal government support, if they were ever to compete successfully against the imports of countries further advanced than Japan in industrial development.

Notwithstanding the tremendous burden imposed by the late war, totaling in all upwards of \$1,000,000,000. which necessitated heavy internal taxation and the negotiation of large external loans, most extraordinary progress has been made in every department of national activity. This is strikingly brought out in the Financial and Economic Annual of Japan. recently issued under the authority of the Japanese minister of finance. "The outbreak of hostilities encouraged the practice of thrift among the people," says the finance minister, with the consequent result that the savings in the ordinary banks rose to over \$5,-000,000,000 by the end of 1904, an increase of \$1.300,000,000 in the year, while in the postoffice savings banks, an institution holding the savings of the working classes, the deposits rose to \$20,000 .-000, an increase of over \$5,000,000. CALL MONEY RATES AND THEIR SIGNIFICANCE. World Office, Wednesday Evening, Sept. 5.

World Office, Wednesday Evening, Sept. 5.

Irregularity, which had become a more important factor in the Wall-street market last week than at any time since the bull market began, came into greater prominence yesterday, and again today. With stocks dipping 10 to 15 points, as in the case of American Smelters, it is palpably evident that distribution has begun. This week's irregularity thus far is suggested as directly chargeable to high rates for call money. Quotations of 25 per cent. to 40 per cent. sounds ridiculously high, but wherein such rates figure is difficult to place. The Wall-street commission house is prepared to carry all classes of securities at 5 per cent. to 6 per cent.; the insiders who control the banks make their own rates, and there is only left the trading brokers, who do their own business, to stand the strain of the high interest charges. Even these may throw their accounts into commission channels, so that the call loan rate has very much the appearance of a myth. Whatever its design, it is part of the regulation market manipulation, and has found frequent counterpart in previous bull and hear movements in Wall-street. Extremely high money rates, drawn, down to more normal figures, is an excellent method of shaping a buying sentiment, and its application is not unknown to those who rig the market. The high rates for call money on Wall-street have little significance otherwise than that intended by those who dictate the quotations.


