Ottawa, June 2.-(Special)-From time to time complaints have been made that the trade and navigation returnsof Canada do not properly give the total amount of goods imported or exported. In many cases goods which are alleged to be imported into Can-British products and vice versa. The result is that Canada does not get the credit which it should of the trade done with the Mother Country. In order to overcome this drawback it has been decided by the Controller of Customs to make a change in the principal entry forms. Printers of these forms and importers are required to take notice that from July 1 the department will expect them to conform to the new forms.
