THE EAST YORK CAMPAIGN.

MR. W. F. MACLEAN ADDRESSES HIS CONSTITUENTS. A Good Meeting in Boston's Hall Last Night—The Liberal-Conservative Candidate is Cheered When Speakers Refer to His Straight and Manly Record as the Representative of East York.

East Toronto Conservatives assembled last night at a meeting in Boston's Hall in the interest of Mr. W. F. Maclean, the Conservative candidate for East York. Mr. Dudley presided and also on the platform were Messrs. D'Arcy Hinds, Frank Powell, B. F. H. Cross, James G. Cheeseworth and George Kappela. In opening the meeting, the chairman stated its object, and said that Mr. Maclean had done the best for the people of the district for the past five years and upheld the principles laid down by the late leader, who now lies silent in an honored tomb. Time was not given to the speaker, as he had conformed to the wishes of his constituents and would do so again.

Acquitted Himself Creditably. Mr. E. F. H. Cross said that in considering the candidate it should be remembered that five years ago Mr. Maclean stated his platform and asked for the support of the people of East York. Whether or not he had acquitted himself creditably, it developed on the platform of the Conservative party, and the death of Sir John Macdonald, which was the result of the advantages of preferential trade with Great Britain and the inestimable amount of good it would be productive of.

The Candidate Speaks. Mr. W. F. Maclean was received with a warm and cordial welcome at the meeting which was held in Boston's Hall. He addressed the meeting and spoke of the confidence placed in him in 1891 and produced the record. He told of what the National policy had done for East York, and stated that he was prepared to change his policy if he should have the votes of the majority of the people in the district.

Several Lively Speakers. Mr. Frank Powell supported Mr. Maclean as the unanimous choice of the East York Conservative Convention, and as a man who had a mind of a creative character and ability. He showed the necessity of the Conservative party's platform, and reviewed the progress of the Conservative party since Confederation. Remedial Bill could be settled, in his credit to the constituency and to the country. The speaker upheld the National Policy and spoke briefly regarding the school question.
