tween Gerrard-street and Witton-avenue, at about 10.30 last night. Heart disease was probably the cause, and Coroner Greig will not hold an inquest. Deceased resided with his wife and family at 20 Frichot street. He was only 31 years of age and joined the police force on July 22, 1895. Since becoming an officer, he was more or less unfortunate, having several times been the victim of assault while executing his duty. About 14 months ago he was brutally kicked and beaten by a gang of roughs on Eastern-avenue, and as a result was laid up for six weeks in the Geleral Hospital, where the doctors found his heart was affected, very likely owing to the injuries he received.

After Osler left the hospital he was removed from No. 4 division to No. 1, where he was put on patrol wagon duty, as his heart was too weak for him to go on the beat for some time. When he recovered sufficiently he went back to No. 4. Early last Sunday morning he received a nasty wound on the head from a stone hurled by an unknown youth. He had his injury plastered up and refused to lay off duty. A few hours later he discovered a fire at rear of 234 and 286 Parliament street, and after ringing an alarm and hurrying back to the fire to arouse the inmattes of the

house.

The remains were taken to No. 4 Police Station, Wilton avenue, and were afterwards removed to the home of the dead officer's stricken wife and little ones.

Osler was a handsome fellow of a quiet disposition and was very popular with his comrades on the force. It was he who arrested James Healy immediately after the murder of John Corrigan at the foot of Parliament street a year or so ago.





This is the first appearance of this comedy in Toronto, and the Cummings Company deserve great credit for the able manner in which they have interpreted it. It is a satire on a London society scandal, in which the devoted wife of a once-devoted husband becomes, for the nonce, estranged because of his attentions to another woman. The wife, in a moment of deep chagrin, accepts the love of one Lord Darlington and leaves secretly in the dead of night for his house. The woman whom she thinks is the cause of all her trouble, but who turns out to be her unknown mother, follows and induces her to go home as secretly as she came. She does so, but in her agitation leaves her fan, a birthday gift from her husband. Before she can get away her husband arrives on the scene, and comes on the fan. The unknown mother compromises her character by declaring she had the fan and left it in the room. This necessitates her leaving for the Continent and the husband and wife become reconciled. The play has been carefully worked up, and the cast of 15 characters is particularly strong. The scenery is magnificent, especially the Japanese room in Lord Darlington's house. The play is, in many respects, the best this company las yet given. At the foronto.

"For Liberty and Love," a lively military romance, was produced at the Toronto Opera House last night before an audience which lacked the fulness of appreciation only because it was not American. The plot of the piece, supposed to be enacted on Cuban soil, centres about the Judas-like betrayal and death of the patriot hero General Macco. It presents with a vividness which the war correspondents could never hope to portray, the darker phase of the death struggle between the friends of "Cuba Libre" and the Spanish butcheries. The play is replete with a series of pathetic situations, in which Miss Lillian Lewis is the dominating feature. As Carlotta Cassonava she is made, the influence which partly prevails upon the traitor Zertuche's accomplice, Capt, Mori, to conspire against his country's liberty and to throw suspicion from himself upon Carlotta's lover, Capt, Mario Navarro on the grounds of his previous allegiance to Spain. Miss Lewis was handicapped somewhat by temporary hoarseness, but her work, as well as that of her support, was of a high order. The result of the election will be announced from the stage to-night.





The estimated cost of installing and operating a plant in Toronto of sufficient capacity for street lighting, including all municipal buildings and parks, is \$400,000. This estimate is made for a plant of 1300 lights, which will permit of the discontinuance of the gas lamps, but is of sufficient capacity to run 1500 lamps, besides all the incandescent lights needed for city buildings, which are estimated at about 6300. The estimate includes a sufficient amount to cover the cost of underground work in the central part of the city, and also provides for ornamental lamp posts in the business districts. The estimated cost of operating this plant per annum is \$70,655, which, after deducting the cost of operating the incandescent plant, is qual to \$52.21 per arc lamp per annum. The above estimate, however, does not provide for insurance, interest and depreciation; if proper allowances are made for these items the total estimated cost per annum amounts to \$105,-165; and after deducting an amount fairly chargeable to the incandescent plant the estimated cost per arc lamp per annum becomes \$74.76. The present contract price for these lamps is \$74.86, but in the event of the city installing a plant there would be the advantage in all probability of better lights being furnished and the discontinuance of a number of poles and overhead wires. The present cost of lighting the streets, parks and city buildings is \$110,353. If the city should decide to operate their own plant the saving, as shown above, would therefore be about \$5188 per annum.






