TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS. Hon. Charles Langford has been nominated as the Liberal candidate for Bonaventure. It is estimated that during the Weyer regime 400,000 Cubans were starved to death. Frank M. Gray was arrested at Edmonton on Saturday, charged with having shot J. W. Sherrin in a disorderly house. Mr. Theodore Chabot, lock master of the dry dock at St. Joseph, has been dismissed. According to the Spanish Minister at Washington, the autonomy to be granted to Cuba is modeled largely after the system which prevails in Canada. The Conservative candidate has been elected in the Turtle Mountain district of Manitoba by over 100 majority. The temperance question was the main issue. A rumor that Hon. J. C. Patterson, Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, is to be transferred to the Governorship of the Northwest Territories is authoritatively denied. It is reported from Ottawa that Mr. Irving, B.C., will be appointed to the office of British Columbia in the place of Justice McCreight. The appointment of Mr. Phillips Laberge, Deputy Minister for the Registration Division of Quebec, is revoked, and Messrs. J. A. Remond and Joseph H. Roy of the city are appointed joint deputy registrars. Sir Richard Cartwright has received a voluminous and well-written report from Mr. E. E. Sheppard, Canadian Commissioner, on Uruguay and Brazil. Mr. Sheppard says there are good fields in many lines for a Canadian enterprise. Justice Burbridge of the Exchequer Court has confirmed the referee's report and given judgment to A. S. Woodburn for \$38,220 for profits on his contract for the book binding to the Government, which was given to others outside the contract. The deficit in the United States Treasury for November stands at \$8,752,100, while for the fiscal year the expenditures have been \$46,581,120 more than the receipts. The customs receipts fall considerably short of what the tariff makers expected. The Ottawa Citizen has passed into new hands. Mr. Wilson M. Southam, son of J. H. Southam of the Hamilton Spectator, being the managing director of the new company. 'Conservative' it was born, and 'Conservative' it will die, if such a thing as a party is possible for the future. J. J. Courtney, engineer, Port Huron, Ariz., was arrested on Saturday for the murder of his wife in Chicago. The prisoner's counsel objected to Judge Gary, and an effort is being made to transfer the case to another judge. Nothing was done. The English schooner Elite was discovered waterlogged and abandoned at sea by the Dutch steamer Veendam, which arrived at New York yesterday. The Veendam's captain, finding the schooner a hopeless wreck, ordered her destruction, and she was set on fire and burned. RUSSIA'S HAND SHOW. A seizure in the Thames, Which Shows Where the Afridis Got Their Supplies. London, Nov. 29.—Eight barges, loaded with cases of gunpowder, falsely labelled 'Arms,' have been seized by the customs officers in the Thames, they were transferred to the steamer Balmuccia for export. It is suggested that the ammunition was destined for the Afridis. Intended for Abyssinia. London, Nov. 29.—It developed to-day from the investigation made into the subject that the eight barges loaded with cases of gunpowder, falsely labelled 'Arms,' which have been seized by the customs officers on the Thames, were consigned from St. Petersburg to Jibuti, a port on the Red Sea, and were probably intended for Abyssinia. P. C. OSLER DROPS DEAD.

A Well-Known Policeman Expires While on His Beat on Parliament Street—Had a Good Record.

Policeman Arthur William Osler dropped dead on his beat on Parliament-street between Gerrard-street and Wilton-avenue, at about 10:30 last night. Heart disease was probably the cause and Osler died without holding an inquest. He was only 31 years of age and joined the police force on July 22, 1865. Since becoming an officer he was more or less unfortunate, having several times been the victim of assault while executing his duty. About 14 months ago he was brutally kicked and beaten by a gang of roughs near Eastern-avenue, and as a result was laid up for six weeks in the General Hospital. When the doctors found his heart was affected, very likely owing to the injuries he received. After Osler left the hospital he was removed from No. 4 division to No. 1, where he was put on a better wagon duty. His heart was too weak for him to go on the beat for several days, but he recovered sufficiently he went back to No. 4. Early last Sunday morning he received a nasty wound on the head from a stone hurled by an unknown youth. He had his injury plastered and refused to lay off duty. A few hours later he discovered a fire at rear of 284 and 286 Parliament-street, and after ringing an alarm and hurrying back to the fire to arouse the inmates of the premises he fell down unconscious and was in a critical condition for a considerable time. He did not recover until he was taken to the hospital, but he died before he could be carried into the doctor's home. The remains were taken to No. 4 Police Station, Wilton-avenue, and were afterwards removed to the home of the deceased officer's stricken wife and little ones. A number of his friends were present at a quiet disposition and was very popular with his comrades on the force. It was his wife, Mrs. James Hays, who immediately after the murder of John Corrigan at the foot of Parliament-street a year or so ago.

TRIED TO COMMIT SUICIDE.

Alexander McMillan of Carlaw-avenue Gashed His Throat With a Razor, But Not Deep Enough.

The bar room of Hulse's Hotel, at the corner of Pearl and York streets, was the scene of a very serious accident about ten minutes to 11 a comparatively tipsy individual lurched into the bar and developed a suicidal tendency, for he proceeded to cut his throat. William Kelly, a boarder, seized his hand and took the razor from him, but not before he had inflicted an ugly cut high up on the right side of his neck. The man, who was called, arrested and taken to the station, where his neck was bandaged. He gave his name as Alexander McMillan of 125 Carlaw-avenue.

Terrible Havoc From Storms on the English Coasts.

SHIPPING SUFFERED MUCH. And Many Luckless Mariners Went Down to Watery Graves.

The Norfolk Coast Struck With Wreckage—Disasters on the North Sea and Cornish Coasts—Houses Unroofed, Chimneys Blown Down and Trees Uprooted at Liverpool—The Worst Tempest Experienced in Years.

London, Nov. 29.—Reports from various points along the coast show that the gale which swept English waters yesterday and last night, and which had not abated its fury up to noon to-day, was one of the worst storms of recent years.

In the north the wind was accompanied by blinding snow and hail, that hid the lights and immensely increased the difficulties of navigation. Many ships are known to have foundered, in most cases it is feared, with all on board.

Scarcely a town on the coast has escaped without more or less injury, falling walls and flying debris adding to the loss of life. There have been pockets of successful rescues, almost without number.

Thrilling Escape.

Stories of thrilling escapes come from all points. On the Norfolk coast, between Backton and Happisburgh, five vessels, as yet unidentified, went down and the crews of all perished. A number of bodies have been washed ashore near Yarmouth. The British brig Roly was wrecked off Hensbury. The coast guard service made desperate efforts to save the crew and succeeded in getting a line on board. A dying woman was "rocketed" into the sea, and then the brig capsized, all the rest of the ship's company perishing.

A large steam collier dashed upon Flamborough Head, the famous promontory on the North Sea coast, floated off, and then foundered with all on board. A steamer not yet identified was wrecked on Bridlington Sands, with her entire company.

Last evening the ship Rose of Devon, Capt. Davis, went ashore, rocks near the pier, and the crew of 12 men perished. This morning the bodies of the captain and five seamen, all wearing life belts, were washed ashore.

Phenomenally High Tides.

Phenomenally high tides are reported in many localities. The district near the mouth of the Thames has suffered severely, several townships being partially submerged. The Smeethness dockyard and the Woolwich arsenal were inundated. At Southwark, the fashionable and desirable place, the sea wall was washed away. At Yarmouth, Lowestoft and other coast towns of Norfolk the esplanades were flooded.

At Liverpool the squalls blew off the roofs of several houses, threw down chimneys and tore up trees. The Mersey bridge is broken in on the Chesney side and flooded the shore district for miles.

Valuable Yachts Sunk.

Similar disasters occurred at Holyhead, where a number of valuable yachts were sunk at their moorings. Scarcely a vestigial remnant in sight of the wreck of Lord Nelson's old flagship, the Poudroyan, long fast in the sands of Blackpool. There is a great deal of wreckage near the Goodwin Sands. The British ship Larcha, Capt. Burgess, was driven ashore near Fleetwood, at the entrance of Moretown Bay, about 18 miles northwest of Preston.

**THE JEWISH NURSERY.**  
Institution of a Worthy Undertaking in a  
Poor District of Toronto—its Ob-  
jects Clearly stated.  
A charity which will be sure to commend  
itself to all lovers of children is the Jew-  
ish Nursery, which has been established at  
103 Elizabeth-street, by the women of  
the Jewish Council, whose president is Mrs.  
J. S. Cohen. The idea of the nursery is  
to found a sort of daily home for the chil-  
dren of the working Jewish women, where  
they may be cared for and fed and kept  
away from harm during the hours of the  
day while the mothers are at work.  
They will be kept from 7 in the morning  
till 6.30 in the evening. When their  
clothes are ragged and dirty through the  
poverty of the parents, these will be taken  
away and nice clean, whole garments will  
be substituted. Their little bodies will  
be bathed and kept warm, and they will  
play in a pleasant, warm room under the  
eye of the matron or nurse in charge.  
Not only will the little ones learn  
cleanly habits, and experience the bodily  
comfort which means so much to the  
health of children, but wholesome moral  
influences will be at work, and many other  
well neglected children will be trained in  
this daily nursery in lessons which will  
be of incalculable benefit to them as they  
grow up and become workers in the world.  
The Jewish Nursery is a semi-detached  
small brick building situated on the east  
side of Elizabeth-street, chosen for its  
proximity to the many wretched homes  
which the poor strive to keep open for  
heads in this quarter of the city. For a  
merely nominal sum, the washerwoman,  
charwomen and other workers will be able  
to have their little ones cared for during  
their absence, and on their return will be  
able to lay them with them during the  
night.  
The nursery will be made as self-suffi-  
cient as possible, and already the ladies,  
through their energy, have raised the sum  
of \$150 with which to provide the house,  
to be occupied by the nursery, which will  
be suitably furnished with all that is  
needed for so excellent a cause.

**BIG BOOM FOR NOVA SCOTIA**

800,000 Tons of Coal Per Annum to  
Be Sent to the City of Boston.

The Contract is for a Long Term and Will  
Double the Output of the Nova Scotia  
Mines, Thus Adding Substantially to  
the Revenue of the Province—Nothing  
of a Criminal Character Charged Against  
the Mining Real Estate Man—Montreal  
News.  
Montreal, Nov. 29.—(Special)—A deal has  
just been signed which means a great boom  
to the Nova Scotia coal industry, as well  
as to the revenue of that province. The  
deal is for the sale of the coal mines, with an  
output of 800,000 tons, composed of W. L. El-  
kins, Philadelphia; Hollister & Babcock,  
New York; Rockefeller and Rogers, H. M.  
Whitney and others, have signed a contract  
with the Dominion Coal Co. for delivery  
of 800,000 tons of coal yearly in Boston,  
with the right to receive 1,500,000 tons at  
the same figure. The contract is for  
twenty years, and will double the output  
of the mines, as well as give a big boom  
to the revenue of Nova Scotia.

**Mr. Lewis' Disappearance.**  
Judge Dugas has authorized the state-  
ment that there is nothing of a criminal  
character charged against Albert Lewis.  
Information which the Judge received was  
not given him in his judicial capacity, and  
it was given him under pledge of secrecy.

A CIVIC ELECTRIC PLANT.

City Engineer Keating Submits an Estimate of the Cost. About Half a Million, According to His Calculation—An Important Change to Be Asked For in the Local Improvement System—Western Cattle Market Finances—Spence's Prohibition Legislation—Important Business Transacted at Yesterday's Meeting of Council.

Interest in the proceedings of yesterday's session of the City Council must centre largely in the adoption of a report of a special committee, involving legislation to make important changes in the local improvement system as it presently applied.

The long-looked-for report of the City Engineer upon the cost of installation and operation of a civic plant to light city streets, parks and to supply municipalities with electric street lighting, and gives statistics on the subject.

The estimated cost of installing and operating a plant in Toronto of sufficient capacity for street lighting, including all municipal buildings and parks, is \$490,000. The estimate is made for a plant of 1300 lights, which will permit of the installation of capacity to run 1500 lamps, besides all the incandescent lights and street lighting.
