ENGLISH GUNBOAT SPHINX

Despatched an Armed Party to Sultan of Oman, But He Was Obdurate.

garding the action of the British authorities at Muscat, the capital of the Sultanate of Oman of a coaling station to France on the coast of Oman leaked out while the British political agent at Muscat, Major Fagan, was absent. He promptly returned to his post, but the Sultan refused to furnish himwith any information. The commander of spatched a lieutenant and an armed party to spatched a lieutenant and an armed party to Bandar-Jiosih, but the Sultan, hoping to receive aid from the French, continued to be recalcitrant. The arrival of the second-class cruiser Eclipse, flagship of the East Indies station, with Rear Admiral Edmund C. Drummond on board, threw the Sultan's subjects into a panic, though the Sultan inmest still remained obdurate. During the morning of Feb. 16 Admiral Drummond sent word asbore that unless the Sultan attended a burbar on board the Eclipse at 2 o'clock that afternoon he would bombard the forts at 2.20 p.m.



During its career of twelve years the scheme assumed various phases. It found favor with different sections of the community, but at no time was there unanimity as to what the scheme really meant, and what it really involved. Ras Wiman himself was a fakir pure and simple. He deliberately misrepresented and exaggerated the value of the American market to Canadians, and he deliberately concealed the fact that his scheme involved political union and the extinction of Canada as an independent state. Ras has apparently got it into his head that he could effect a consolidation of the two countries in the same way as he might be able to consolidate two big commercial corporations. That undoubtedly was the object he had in view, and we will not be surprised to learn when the great man's memoirs are written that he privately nursed the idea that the success of the scheme would one day make Erastus Wiman President of the Greater United States. The worst that can be said of Wiman is that he was a fakir. Having made a fortune in the United States, and all his interests being centred in that country, while he still was a British subject, it was only natural that he should look upon the union of the two countries as the greatest thing on wheels, especially if it were effected through the magnate of Staten Island. Although Wiman originated this scheme, which involved national suicide as far as Canada is concerned, he cannot be regarded in the light of a traitor. TAXATION OF CYCLISTS Is a Feature of the New York Bicycle Path Bill Just Passed

the Senate. Albany, Feb. 23.-Senator Ellsworth's bill providing for the building and maintaining of side paths for bicycles, passed the Senof side paths for bicycles, passed the Senate to-day. There is a fair prospect for it to pass the House. If it does, the Governor will certainly approve it. The bill provides that any county judge, upon the application of 50 resident wheelmen, may appoint a commission of five or seven citizens to act as side-path commissioners.

The commission is empowered to construct side-path for bicycles along any public road or highway, outside of incorporated cities, not less than three feet nor more than six feet wide. Before the path can be built the consent of owners of half of the abutting land must be obtained. No person will be permitted to ride on these paths without paying a yearly tax of from 50c to \$1.



Americal and Argentina. It now makes the aggregate quantity required by all imporing countries in 1898-19, 354 million bushes leis as a minimum.

The World's estimate has never varied since last August, continuing it always at seven million bushels per week, or about 364 million bushels for the year.

Beerbohm estimates the quantity likely to be furnished by exporting countries 354 million bushels, and says that this is not anything like the full quantity that could be shipped, if prices were attractive, but Russia and United States are likely to hold back a large part of their crop. 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
