NOVELLINE OF DEFENCE ADVANCED BY UNIONISTS

Dragged Admissions From Witnesses That They Extorted Money From Employers.

New York, July 24.—Counsel for Lawrence Murphy, the former treasurer of the Stonecutters' Union, on trial charged with appropriating the organization's funds, continued his novel line of defence before Judge Newburger today, in dragging from each witness admissions as to methods used by the Journeyman Stonecutters' Union in extorting money from employers.

By John Boyle, treasurer of the Stonecutters' Union, the prosecutor identified a contract between the six members of the Stonecutters' Union and the Lawyers' Surety Company, which was introduced to disprove the testimony of yesterday, that these same members divided \$200,000 among themselves. The document was a contract by which the members of the "Secret" Committee could not draw the money from the Lawyers' Surety Company unless they filed every two days a statement of their services rendered.

Several other witnesses testified that the trust fund was created by means against members of the union during a strike in 1898, which dates were paid by the employers under an agreement by the employers to end the strike. Donald Call, formerly president of the union, testified that the Secret Committee had demanded \$100,000 from the Brookline Stone Dealers' Association to settle the strike of 1902, and that \$100,000 might have been demanded. As a compromise, the committee agreed to accept \$100,000, which was paid.

William Morris, treasurer in 1902, and now president of the Stonecutters' Union, told of the Secret Committee turning over the cheques to Murphy, the treasurer. The trial was adjourned until Monday.

AN INGENUOUS OBJECTION. Lawyer Robbette Pleads Ontario Liquor Act is Ultra Vires.

In connection with the case of Andrew McTiernan, 6 Duchess-street, who was before Magistrate Denison yesterday, charged with a violation of the Liquor Act, T. C. Robbette, K.C., Mr. Tiernan's attorney, entered the following objection:

That under the British North America Act, the Province of Ontario could not enact the Ontario Liquor Act, particularly in so far as it imposes penalties and imprisonment in gaol, and for several offences and third offences, because by the provisions of the B.N.A. Act all matters of a criminal nature are reserved for the jurisdiction of the parliament of Canada.

Mr. Robbette held that the case is analogous to the Lord's Day Act of Ontario, which was lately pronounced invalid by the Privy Council.

The magistrate seemed inclined to treat the objection as "ingenious," but Mr. Robbette's appeal of appeal was granted, and the case will be argued further on Monday.

WALLACE HAD GOOD CREDIT

Was Able to Borrow \$115,000 From a Bank Without Security. DIRECTOR BECAME SUSPICIOUS

The affairs of the Atlas Loan Company were gone over again yesterday before Thomas Hodgins, Master-in-Ordinary, at Osgoode Hall, The National Trust Company, liquidators under the winding-up order, made an application for leave to enter an action against the Metropolitan Bank to recover certain securities of the value of \$91,991, and payments of \$25,000 and \$5000, which are alleged to have been handed over to the bank when the company was in an insolvent condition.

Will Amend Grain Act Purpose of Mr. Sifton

Present Measure Said to Be Compromise Between Growers and Shippers. Ottawa, July 24.—(Special.)—Mr. Sifton introduced a bill in the House to-day to amend the Manitoba Grain Act of 1900, which he explained was a compromise between the grain growers and the shippers.

Mr. Sifton asked whether the personal of the Preadgold concession commission had been determined upon. Mr. Sifton replied that the Preadgold Commission would comprise Judge Britton and B. T. A. Bell, secretary of the Canadian Mining Institute.

The Prime Minister laid on the table of the House a letter in which Sir William Van Horne declined to act as chairman of the proposed transportation commission.

Mr. Jordan again urged Sir Wilfrid to definitely inform the House as to when the transcontinental railway resolutions would be brought down. Sir Wilfrid replied that he expected to put the motion on the order paper to-day.

Mr. Jordan appeared to have but little confidence in the Premier's expectations. He said, "We have now four and a half months in session, and yet the government had not yet announced its policy on this most important question."

The Prime Minister answered gallantly that his reason for not giving a definite date was just because his expectations had been so often disappointed. The fact was that he was in the hands of the lawyers, and as a lawyer, Mr. Jordan ought to appreciate the situation.

UNIONS DISRUPT GUARD.

Members Cannot Take Oath of Allegiance in Texas. Dallas, Texas, July 24.—There is a serious disagreement in this State between the National Guard and the labor unions. The unions have positively declined to let their members who are also members of the militia take oath of allegiance and swear to support the constitution, as provided by the Dick National Militia law, which went into effect on July 1, and under which the Texas militia is now operating.

The information is given by reliable persons that a similar order has been sent to union men all over the State, and that 25 per cent of the heretofore active militiamen will muster out.

AGED WOMAN'S GREAT WALK.

Tramped 32 Miles to Visit Scenes of Childhood Days. Hanover, Pa., July 24.—Mrs. John Neely, seventy-three years old, of Philadelphia, accomplished a remarkable pedestrian feat yesterday, when she walked from Carlisle to Hanover, thirty-two miles, over mountainous country in one day. Mrs. Neely resided in Hanover forty-eight years ago, and this was her first visit since that time. She endured the trip well, for to-day she spent in sightseeing, and this evening she returned to Carlisle by rail, but not before arrangements were pending in opposition to her returning on foot.

WOMEN GAMBLERS.

New York Tribune. People who have made the matter a study contend that when the get-rich-quick microbe attacks women it is not easily exterminated or made harmless.

The phantom pictures which rise and fall with the click of a ticker fascinate them, and they play the game of chance with the recklessness of veterans gamblers. Hundreds of women give their orders clandestinely, and the fact that they have an interest in the stock market, that their daily examination of the market report is prompted by anything beyond a desire to be informed, is not known to them. They save their brokers. These are good customers for brokers. A sign over a statement showing a balance on the wrong side, a vow "never to do so any more" or an order given "just to get even" is the usual sentence.

There is another class of women stock gamblers in which the bad loser is largely represented. This class supports bucket shops in the residence parts of the city, like the one which was raided a few days ago. When these women win they are happy, but when fortune frowns on them they are "horrid." They want their money back from the bucket-shop proprietors. They cry, scold and finally threaten to "tell on the mean things" who look their money. In order to shield themselves the threat is not often carried into execution, and the bucket-shop continues to do business at the old stand, taking money from the women who succumb to the temptations of the tape. It is refreshing to know that once in a while a woman gets so thoroughly angry because of her losses that she does her share toward breaking up the bucket-shop business. She would never do such a thing if her speculations were successful—hence all good citizens should rejoice when she loses.

SIX IN KING'S HUNDRED CANADIANS SHOOT WELL

J. A. Simpson of Canada Won City of London Prize for Colonials.

Bisley, Eng., July 24.—The shooting of the second stage for the King's prize was concluded this afternoon. Private Gray of the London-Scottish volunteers, who won the bronze medal in the first stage of the competition, won the silver medal, after a tie with three others, with a score of 188.

The following Canadians qualified for the King's hundred: Major Searling, with a score of 180; Corp. McGregor, 179; Pte. McNaughton, 179; Lieut. Vroom, 178; Sergt. Bayles, 177; Capt. Crow, 177.

J. A. Simpson of Canada won the Corporation of the City of London prize, open to Indian and colonial volunteers. Simpson secured 28th place in the Grand Aggregate, winning £2, and the N.R.A. bronze cross; Bayles was 46th, winning similar honors; Vroom 80th, Searling 125th, Stuart 133rd, and White 143rd, all of whom received £2 and the bronze cross.

This year there are no Canadians in the Volunteers' Aggregate. This is a series of prizes offered for those whose aggregates total the highest in the Maritz cup, King's first stage, and the St. George's first stage. The first prize is a challenge trophy, valued at £1000, at St. George's Vase.

In the St. George's vase, first stage, Simpson was 142nd, winning £2; Searling 183rd, winning £2; Neil Smith 225th, winning £2; Hayhurst 335th, also £2.

Clock in City Hall Tower How Its Face is Lighted

Something of the Mechanism of the Big Chronometer Which Works Night and Day for the Benefit of the People.

One of the features of this city which strikes the visitor with more than ordinary interest is the City Hall clock. Its brilliancy and the perfect illumination are commented upon by all who take trouble to look at it with more than a passing glance.

The citizen, too, the man who must pay for the erection and maintenance of the clock, is highly delighted with the result of Chief Engineer Bannan's scheme of illumination. Of the thousands of public timepieces throughout the continent there is none which shows up to better advantage during the dark hours of night than the one which adorns the tower of Toronto's civic pile. It can be seen quite distinctly from the Don and Bathurst-street, and as far north as New-street, the hands of the clock are plainly visible, and no trouble is encountered in telling the time of night from that distance.

On May 17, 1902, when the Mayor, Mr. Bannan, had worked unceasingly toward the completion of the clock for July 1, and on that night at about 8:15 o'clock the Mayor, Mr. Urquhart, Mr. Bannan and a few guests ascended the tower.

Just as the big bells rang out the quarter hour past eight, Mrs. Urquhart connected the current, and the huge clock was ablaze with light. Mr. Bannan's work was successful, and there was no more happy moment in the city.

The Construction.
Speaking technically of the construction of the clock lighting The Canadian Electrical News says: "James Bannan, chief engineer, has installed the tower clock lighting. As the result of considerable experiment, he has devised a system which he believes will give splendid satisfaction. He uses 450 8 c. p. in-candescent lamps, 120 on each dial, placed 17 inches apart, and fitted up with 22 gauge galvanized iron reflectors properly stayed and braced to the present wind brace. The lamps are 20 inches distant from the dial and each individual lamp is handled separately and seen from the inside, so that they can be replaced in a moment's notice in case of accident to any of the circuits. The holes in the reflectors which the lamps are inserted are 2 1/4 inches in diameter and will permit sufficient daylight to light the present room, also the necessary circulation of air inside the reflector when the lamps are lighted.


The lamps are perfectly insulated by means of wood fibre strip. The mains of the clock lighting are open wiring to the base of the tower, then conduit until the tower shaft is entered, then open wiring again to the dials. In the installation enough copper has been provided to meet the requirements for outside illumination at any time, it being possible to tap the line at any point for this purpose.

The dials of the clock are 20 feet 6 inches in diameter and are placed 295 feet from the sidewalk. The usual custom is to light clocks of this size by means of arc lamps of 16 c. p. incandescent lamps. Mr. Bannan found, however, that in most cases the individual lamps could be discerned from the outside, he obtained which he decided to make use of lamps of eight candle power, by means of which, he claims, a more even distribution of light and more satisfactory results will be obtained. By a proposed treatment of the glass in the dials, it is expected that the lamps will not be discernible from the outside, as is usually the case. It is estimated that the cost of the lamps will be \$1500 per year for maintenance, and cost in the neighborhood of \$3000 to light originally. Walker.


