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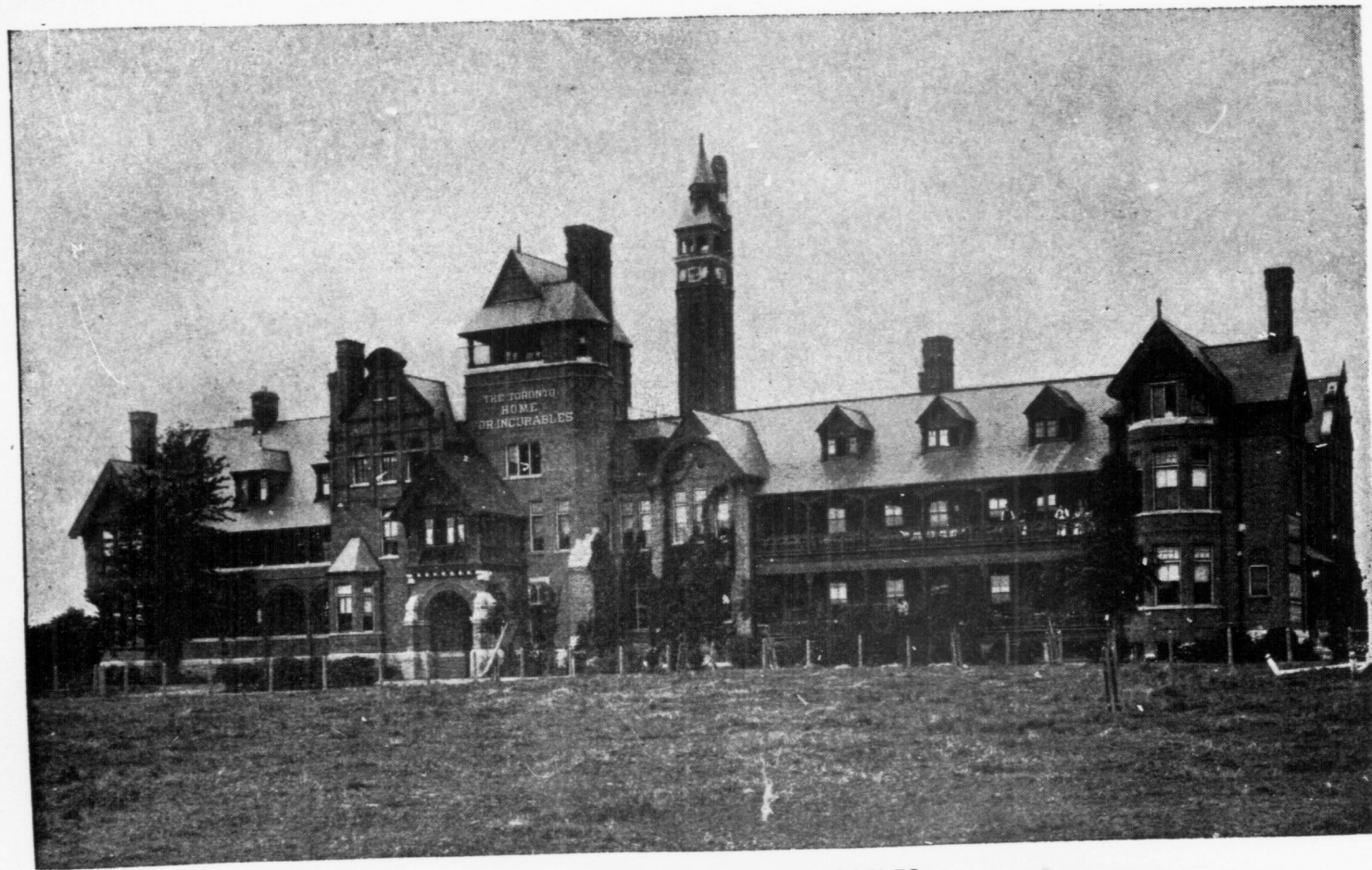

TORONTO HOME FOR INCURABLES.

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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

HOME FOR INCURABLES.

Amended and Adopted March 28, 1884.

I.—This institution shall be known as “THE TORONTO HOME FOR INCURABLES.”

II.—Its object shall be to afford maintenance, nursing and medical and surgical aid to persons suffering from incurable disease, and to provide for them while inmates of the Home the ministrations of the Gospel.

III.—Every subscriber of two dollars and upwards per annum, shall be entitled to vote at the annual meeting, at which a board of managers shall be elected for the ensuing twelve months. Every individual who shall pay in advance, and at one time, the sum of fifty dollars, shall be entitled to the same privileges for life.

IV.—All money now in the possession of the Home, or which may hereafter be collected or acquired by it, shall be applied (unless otherwise directed by the donor) to the general objects, uses and requirements of the Home.

V.—The affairs of the Home shall be under the direction, control and management of the Board of Managers, of whom at least forty shall be ladies and twelve gentlemen, and who shall be elected at the annual general meeting of subscribers, qualified as set forth in Article III.

The medical staff attending the Home shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board of Managers.

In case of a vacancy arising, the Board may elect a member to fill the vacancy until the next annual general meeting.

The Board shall control and direct all the business of the institution, and their decision upon all points of management shall be final.

There shall be chosen annually, and by vote of the Board, a President and Vice-President, and, from among the Lady Managers, the following officers, viz. : First Lady Directress, Second Lady Directress, Third Lady Directress, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and Treasurer.

For the more convenient working of the Institution, the Board may from time to time appoint committees of not less than three of their number, such as an Executive Committee, and committees for visiting and superintending the Home.

The Board may also enact By-Laws for regulating the duties of the various officers and employees of the Home.

The By-laws shall not be altered except at a regular meeting, after notice duly given, at least a month previously.

VI.—The Board of Managers shall hold stated meetings at least once a month, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. At such monthly meetings the Board shall have power to make additional By-laws regulating its own government, and for the government of the officers and employees, as before provided, and, when necessary, after due notice, to alter and amend the same.

Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President and one of the Lady Directresses, or on requisition of five or more members of the Board. When a special meeting is called, the time and place of meeting, and the business for which it is called, shall be stated in the notice calling the meeting, and no other business shall be taken up at such meeting.

VII.—The annual general meeting of the subscribers, qualified as set forth in Article III., shall be held in the month of March.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Managers to make all necessary arrangements for said annual meeting ; to lay before the subscribers a report of the proceedings of the previous twelve months, and to exhibit a full and accurate view of the funds, property and effects of the Home.

VIII.—In view of the large contributions given by the citizens of Toronto, and the grant made by the City Council in aid of the Home, applications from the City of Toronto for admission to the Home shall have preference over others.

IX.—The Board will receive incurable persons from any municipality in Ontario outside of Toronto, on condition that a bond be given by said

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municipality to pay such sum as the Board may determine from time to time for the maintenance of each patient so sent. Provided always that a certificate as to general character and circumstances shall have been received from such persons as the Board may approve ; that a certificate be given by the gaol surgeon of the municipality, or by such other medical gentlemen as the Board may approve, that the person seeking admission is incurable provided also, that such certificate be endorsed by the medical officers of this institution, and that the application be approved by the Board at a regular monthly meeting.

X.—The foregoing Constitution shall not be altered, unless it be at the annual general meeting of subscribers, notice of such alteration having been given at least three months before the annual meeting, and approved by a majority of the Board of Managers.

BY-LAWS.

Amended and Adopted March 28, 1884, and March 20, 1886.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

I.—At meetings of Board of Managers the Chairman (elected as such from amongst the gentleman Managers) shall preside. In his absence the Managers present shall name a Chairman *pro tem*.

The Chairman shall be the judge of order, and his decisions thereon shall be acquiesced in without debate.

He shall direct the Secretary, when special meetings are ordered, to insert in the notices the import of the special business upon which the Managers are to convene.

II.—The Secretary shall keep fair and regular minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Managers in a book to be provided for that purpose.

She shall preserve all the records and papers of the Society which do not belong to the Treasurer.

She shall cause a notice of each stated meeting, and of each special meeting of the Board of Managers, to be sent to the address of each Manager, at least one day previous to the day fixed for the meeting.

The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in her duties when required, and act for her at meetings of the Board in her absence.

III.—The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to the Society, and shall give a receipt to the persons from whom she may receive money.

For the sake of regularity, and in order to establish the amount, all persons who may hand money to the Treasurer, are requested to ask for a receipt for the money so paid over.

When the Treasurer does not require the money in paying accounts which have passed the Board, she shall deposit the money, or such part

of it as may not be immediately required, in the Savings Bank, to the credit of her official account as Treasurer.

She shall keep a fair and regular account of the receipts and expenditures, and her account book and bank book shall be open to the inspection of the Managers at each stated meeting.

Prior to the general annual meeting she shall prepare a statement showing the receipts and expenditures during the year, duly classified and audited, that a lucid, full explanation, or exposition of the working of the finances of the Home, may be submitted at the general meeting.

The Treasurer's accounts shall be audited by a Committee of the gentlemen Managers named by the Chairman or by the Board.

IV.—The Treasurer shall pay accounts for articles and services supplied to the Home only when duly certified, and in all cases of payment shall require a receipt.

Accounts shall be certified to be correct as to prices by the Managers who make the purchase of the articles, and shall be initialled "correct" accordingly. They shall then be initialled by the Matron or the Superintendent, to show that the articles were received at the Home.

The accounts shall then be laid before the Managers at the stated monthly meetings, and when payment is ordered, the order shall be entered on the minutes by the Secretary.

The Treasurer can then pay the accounts, and an entry upon the minutes will be a sufficient authority to the Treasurer to pay whatever accounts or disbursements the Board may have ordered.

V.—The Managers may appoint from time to time Committees from amongst themselves to attend to any special duties.

As a rule such Committees shall consist of not less than three, and not less than two shall be considered a quorum to act.

These Committees, for the sake of regularity and for future reference, shall as a rule report to the Board in writing.

VI.—The stated meetings of the Board shall be held on the last Friday of every month, at such hour as the Board may from time to time appoint.

VII.—The Superintendent and Matron shall hold their offices at the pleasure of the Board.

They shall do all in their power to promote the comfort of the inmates of the Home, and shall follow the instructions of the Board of Lady Managers for the week, and of the medical staff when orders are given.

They shall keep a book for entering all such things as they may con-

sider necessary for the use of the Home, and submit it to the weekly visitors. When disbursements are ordered, a regular account of the same shall be kept for the information of the Managers and the Treasurer.

VIII.—The Managers, deeming the point of admission of inmates into the Home to be a very important matter, decided that the following formalities shall regularly be observed.

1st. Applicants for admission into the Home are to state how long they have resided in the city, their residence, age, disease, and circumstances, also whether he or she has been attended by any medical man, and whether any clergyman has visited.

2nd. Thereafter two of the Managers shall visit the residence named (two ladies if the applicant be a woman, two gentlemen if the applicant be a man.) They shall look at the surroundings of the applicant, ascertain what can be practically known of the person's circumstances, habits and general character, in short, get all the available information about the case.

They shall see the clergyman and the doctor, if either have been in attendance, hear what each has to say about the applicant, and report to the Board of Managers.

3rd. That two of the medical staff of the Home shall visit each applicant for admission, and report to the Board of Managers the character of the disease and if incurable; and for any applicant outside of Toronto the equivalent testimonials shall be required.

Each application for admission to the Home shall be presented at the regular meeting of the Board, and if entertained, after due investigation, shall be acted upon at the following regular meeting of the Board.

But applications for consumption and cancer cases made at a weekly meeting may be acted upon at the next following meeting, and *vice versa*; applications at monthly meetings may be called in at following week meeting.

4th. If, after the name of an applicant has in due course been approved by the Board, a considerable time should elapse before the occurrence of a vacancy, and there is reason to apprehend that such a patient is at, or near, the point of death, then the resident medical officer shall be directed to visit the case and to report to the Board as to the advisability under the circumstances of removing the patient to the Home.

5th. All the inmates of the Home must distinctly understand that an admission confers no right of permanent residence in the Home, and at any time the Managers have the power of dismissing an inmate for what

they may deem a sufficient cause ; of its sufficiency the Managers are to be the sole judges.

6th. Any inmate who shall leave the Home without consent of the Directors, thereby forfeits all claims for residence within it, and will not be re-admitted.

IX.—No person shall be admitted as a free patient into the Home until he or she shall have first executed such an instrument as may from time to time be approved by the Board, providing for the disposition of his or her property then owned, or which may subsequently be acquired by him or her, for the benefit of the Home.

X.—Any members absenting themselves from three consecutive monthly meetings, except in cases of illness or absence from the city, shall have their names struck off the list of the Managing Committee.

XI.—Any applicant from Toronto for admission to the Home must have resided in the city at least one year in order to come in as a free patient.

FORM OF BEQUEST.

*I give and bequeath to the Board of Management of the Home
for Incurables, Toronto, Ont., the sum of \$.....(or

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HOME RULES.

Visiting days : Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, from 2 till 5.

I.—No person shall be admitted to the Home for Incurables until the Board is satisfied as to his or her character and respectability.

II.—The inmates must at all times show proper respect to the Managers and Lady Superintendent, and a strict regard for the rules and regulations of the Institution. They are also urged to cultivate kind and cheerful dispositions, thereby making a happy Christian Home.

III.—Those inmates who are able will be required to keep their own rooms in order, and to assist in such other domestic duties as they are able to perform.

IV.—All such inmates as are able to leave their rooms are requested to take their meals at the general table, and for sanitary reasons none will be allowed to carry food or drinks to their rooms; good manners and cleanly habits are particularly requested at table.

V.—All who are able are expected to attend morning prayers, prayer meeting and Sunday services at the hours appointed.

VI.—Inmates shall not leave the premises without the consent of the Lady Superintendent. Any inmate wishing to be absent for more than one day must obtain the consent of the Board.

VII.—Male inmates shall not be allowed in the rooms occupied by females, nor female patients in those occupied by males, unless in special cases.

VIII.—Inmates desiring to make a request or complaint shall inform the Lady Superintendent, who will thereupon bring the request or complaint before the Weekly Board.

IX.—The inmates shall not receive wines or spirits or other stimulants without the knowledge of the Lady Superintendent.

X.—The inmates may be visited by their friends on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays in each week, between the hours of two and five o'clock. No visits at any other time except in special cases.

XI.—Should an inmate become dissatisfied or unhappy, he or she is at liberty to leave the Home, taking with them only such articles as they brought to the Home.

XII.—If any inmate shall not conform to the rules of the Home, or behave rudely or improperly, such inmate may be discharged by the Weekly Committee at their first meeting after the insubordination has been duly investigated.

XIII.—That every parcel for an inmate shall be submitted to the inspection of the Matron before received by the inmates, and that every person bringing a gift for an inmate shall submit it for inspection. That hereafter any patient guilty of drunkenness shall be reprimanded by the President of this Board, and on the second offence shall be dismissed from the Home. That any person visiting friends within this Home, and secretly conveying intoxicating drinks, shall not again be granted admission to the Home.

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INADMISSIBLE APPLICANTS.

MEMORANDUM.

*For the Guidance of the Members of the Medical Staff and Visitors,
adopted at a General Meeting of the Board of Management
held 27th May, 1881.*

THE FOLLOWING CLASSES OF APPLICANTS ARE NOT ADMISSIBLE.

1. Any one who has not actual incurable disease, which prevents the person from earning a livelihood.
2. No one merely infirm from old age or from debility.
3. No one merely blind.
4. No one whose disease is venereal in its origin.
5. No one suffering from mere functional disease.
6. No one suffering from epilepsy.
7. No insane persons.
8. No one under seventeen years of age.

TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Toronto Home for Incurables,
For the Year Ending March 1, 1894.

The Board of Management of the "Toronto Home for Incurables" have, this year, the privilege of presenting their Twentieth Annual Report, and in so doing would offer sincerest praise and thanksgiving to the unchanging God who has so prospered this work during the years that have passed.

The year never closes without some loss through death in our membership, and to-day we mourn two tried and faithful friends—Miss Dick, who passed away just one week after our last annual meeting, and whose loss is sadly felt by the Board and inmates to be irreparable, and Mr. Geo. Goulding, who also had the interest of the Home close to heart. Amongst the life-members we also deeply regret the loss of Lady Macpherson and Mrs. Riddell.

The number of inmates in the Home at present is 117, fifty-four having been admitted during the year. Thirty-three deaths have occurred; eight have returned to live with friends; one was dismissed for insubordination; one went to the House of Providence.

We are encouraged from time to time by hearing, from outside sources, of expressions of content and satisfaction from

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inmates to their friends, and those who leave the Institution, in almost every case, endeavor to return.

We have entire confidence in Mrs. Craigie, the Lady Superintendent, and the other officers in charge, that everything conducive to the comfort and well-being of the inmates will be attended to; and the work of alleviation of suffering under Dr. Wickson, Miss McTavish and our medical staff, leaves nothing to be desired.

We are glad to have this opportunity of thanking the many kind friends who have helped us in this work, especially acknowledging the disinterested legal advice of Mr. W. Mortimer Clark, the services of the Parkdale clergymen, and the courtesy of the press of the city.

During the year the following sums have been received as legacies :—

The expenditure has been \$17,233.71.

This work, with its small beginning of twenty years ago, has outgrown every expectation as to its scope, and with the growth is the necessity for more outlay of money. The strictest economy is striven after, but the annual expenditure is large, and it is not possible to keep up the work adequately if collections fall short, as they have done this year.

Owing to the financial depression many are economizing at the expense of charitable institutions, and this should not be the case if the charity is worthy. An institution such as the "Home for Incurables" is a necessity and benefit to any community, and its support should be shared by all, not by a comparatively small number. We, therefore, earnestly ask the

public for a greater and more sympathetic liberality, remembering that the sick and the poor are a sacred legacy to the world, and require our helpful consideration, even if it should entail a little self-denial.

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20TH ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT.

From March 1st, 1893, to March 1st, 1894.

MR. PRESIDENT, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—

I have the honor of presenting on behalf of the Medical Staff of the Toronto Home for Incurables, their 20th Annual Report.

During the past year there have been in all, fifty-four admissions. Of that number, twenty died; one within twelve hours after being admitted, and five within three weeks. The average life of each patient, however, after admission, was nearly three months. The mortality for the year has been about the average, the number of deaths totalling thirty-three. One point we particularly notice is that more than twice the number of phthisical and cancer patients were admitted during the past year than ever before, and that more than half of the thirty-three deaths were due to those two diseases; as out of the nine cancer patients seven died. We sincerely hope that those applicants for admission who are incurable more from advanced age than from any disease, or those disabled permanently from earning a living from what may be some disease, not necessarily incurable, will be rigidly excluded from the Home, because the occupancy of our wards is demanded (as the name of the institution itself indicates) for only genuinely *incurable* patients, there being at present a large number of other charitable organizations throughout our fair city, each one being suitable for its own particular kind of case. Another thing we would strongly oppose is the admission of any cases whatsoever, where, in all human probability, death must result in a very short time; as not only does each such occurrence

have a most depressing effect upon the other patients, especially in the same ward, but each death entails so much more expenditure upon the Board of Management for funeral expenses. As to re-admission of patients after being discharged, we do not consider such to be wise, except under most peculiar circumstances, as it interferes with the internal management of any institution of this character, and fosters imposition on the part of some so disposed.

On a recent visit of inspection through our wards and corridors everything was found in a perfect state of order and cleanliness, the same, we consider reflecting great credit on the excellent management of the Lady Superintendent and her efficient staff of nurses. The general health of the Home has been, with very little exception excellent. No cases of an infectious character have arisen during the past year, excepting two cases of diphtheria amongst the nurses, and a few cases of suspicious sore throat, probably of the same nature, but much milder in character. Thanks to Dr. Wickson, our resident physician, the diphtheritic cases were promptly removed to the isolation hospital, and any and all cases which were at all suspicious in appearance confined in a room on the top flat of the Home. In order to see that the entire system of plumbing throughout the building was all that it should be, under the able supervision of our Medical Health Officer, Dr. Charles Sheard, the smoke test was applied, with the result that several defects were found, thus allowing the escape of deleterious gases into the wards. This will indirectly prove salutary, as now the plumbing is being thoroughly renovated, and all leakages carefully attended to, so that in future we will have no cause for complaint in this direction. The two nurses are now perfectly convalescent.

To give a synopsis of the nature of the fifty-three cases admitted during the past year; I may say that

Of the eleven patients who left the Home, one went to the House of Providence and died there; eight went back to friends; one was dismissed; and one went away on a visit and died while away.

The fact that we always find our patients happy, contented and thankful for their many comforts and privileges, we consider largely due to the kindly words of good cheer of not only Mrs. Craigie and her untiring staff of nurses, but also to the zealous and conscientious medical superintendent, Dr. Wickson, who has in every way proved ever courteous to the members of the medical staff, and most careful to carry out their instructions in every minutiae. This is and should be the case, as the occupants of such a building as this are indeed a brave army of martyrs, suffering pain with patience and fortitude, and merely awaiting their rapidly approaching call to the tomb.
